Some 1800 scien tists, including many in Texas, are at work on the problem and their work has already made cancer cures possible that were not possible ten vears ago.

The seven danger signals for cancer were listed as: Any sore that does not heal; a lump of thickening in the breast or else where; unusual bleeding or discharge; any change in a wart or mole; persistent indigestion or difficulty in swallowing; persistent hoarseness or cough; any change in normal bowel habits. It was pointed out that those signs may not mean cancer, but they should be checked by a phy-


