ng and the work is progres- New Health Officer Warns of Disease Called 'Hepatitis'

Austin. May 14 - Increasing numbers of cases of a disease called "infectious hepatitis" are being observed in Texas, state health of ficials say. Over 800 cases of the debilitating illness have been reported by private physicians so far this year. That's substantial increase over the number reported for the same time period last year, says Health Department Epidemiologist Dr. Gordon Grace.

Most medical authorities believe the disease is spread by person to person contact through nose and throat discharges, Dr. Grace pointed out. But he said a number of cases have been traced to contam-

nated food and water. Infectious hepatitis literally means "infectious inflammation o the liver." It is a virus infection which occurs sporadically all year ong, but which subsides somewhat during summer months.

Grace said there are no experi mental animals on which tests can be conducted, and the virus cannot be "cultured" 'or grown in a laboratory. Older people, he said, are apparently immune. Sub-clinical cases -people who have the virus but are not sick, are not uncom-

The disease is characterized by a flu-like onset, accompanied by low-grade fever of 99-101 degrees for two or three days. The liver erea is tender, and the patient has little appetite. Later the skin turns yellow, fever returns, and the liver area is sore and tender Walking increases pain because the inflammed liver is thus aggra-

Gamma globulin in the proper dosage give a temporary immunity, Grace said. The blood fraction e made available through the State Department of Health to private physicians who administer t to family contact of patients

nd to institutional cases. An outbreak in a community usually lasts two or three months,

Dr. Grace commented. He said the best individual and community defense against the weakening condition is scrupulous personal hygiene and good environmental sanitation.

Proper garbage storage is on of the most important factors in good sanitation. Garbage should be stored in water tight, galvanzed metal containers with a tight lid. Dispose of all cans, bottles and other rubbish. Proper disposal of garbage collected is equally important in the prevention of fly

preeding areas. Another measure in proper control is proper screening of homes Each householder should check the screens on his house for holes that will allow flies to enter. Repairing of screens will help to protect food from contamination by ty borne disease organisms.

The importance of fly control can be realized when it is known that flies carry and spread such diseases as typhoid, the dysenteries, infant diarrhea and other diseases. Fly control is an individual and community duty. It is the job of every person and every locality and the results will benefit every-




