We are a poor lot when we beseech our fate without getting up and digging for a new way to let the world know that we are not shipped. This town has had its share of hard knocks but that is no reason why we should keep our chins up and put on our work clothes.

We have seen too many stories in the daily press which would indicate that there is no hope for Sanderson. It is time the Sanderson business men and citizens generally get the defeatist attitude out of their systems. We have not seen the time, and we have seen some hard ones, when we didn't feel that the more pressure that was put on us, the more we had to fight and dig. Maybe that's just the Irish in us.

A few days ago there were 11 sp-outch representatives from various brotherhoods employed on the railroads in Sanderson. They met with the local members of their respective brotherhoods and it was voted unanimously to propose the terminal move which has been proposed by the T&NO. Those men have a great deal at stake and they do not intend for the company to force them to take backing by their discriminating methods. Sanderson and all of Terrell County stands one hundred per cent behind those men who are our neighbors and friends.

It will be some time before the highway traffic will be restored anything like normal, but we will make the best of it and get our heads together for doing the things that we can do. It is disgusting to hear some people talk all the hardships that have come to our lot. We hate to see the population dailies headlining town as a "Ghost Town." If we will just get to work, the outlook will think we are the liveliest of "ghosts" they ever saw. And while we are sitting here in our state of mortification, we could easily make this the cleanest cemetery in the world which would give us a distinction all of its own, as well as that which we should have as being the only ghost town in the world with electric lights and paved streets.

Terrell County Designated To Receive Disaster Relief

A telegram was received by W. W. Sudduth Tuesday morning from Gov. Allan Shivers confirming a telephone conversation in which local citizens were given assurance that Terrell County

would be put in the Southwest Texas flood disaster area. The designation was for relief by the American Red Cross and the Civil Defense Administration. County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, Red Cross Chairman Mrs. Jettie P. Peavy, Disaster Chairman R. E. Corder and Home Relief Chairman Sudduth had been in touch with state Red Cross officials and state officials for several days seeking the designation for Terrell County.

Clean-Up Drive Is Progressing Toward Spraying

The clean-up drive continues in Sanderson this week. Although the original plans called for only one week of extensive clean-up measures, various factors entered into the unexpected results of the planning and this week finds many property owners and renters working on the weeds and accumulated trash on their premises in an effort to give their full cooperation to the project.

C. G. Riggins, head of the sanitation and health committee of the local chamber of commerce, stated this week that he was highly pleased with the results of the clean-up drive so far. He stated, however, that until a more thorough clean-up was made, the spraying would not accomplish the desired results. The vacant lots in the community seem to present the biggest problem to the committee. With a pear-burner made available to the committee, it is hoped that some plan may be worked out to burn all of the weeds from vacant lots this week end. After the go-signal is given the inspection committee, the spraying will start and it is hoped that the crews who are to do the spraying may be able to begin their work next week. Following recent rains, there have been more flies and mosquitos than usual here and the spraying to follow the clean-up will give effective relief from the flies and mosquitos and also rid the community of their breeding places.

If any piles of trash have not been hauled away, a call to the block captain will bring a solution to that problem. Additional trucks and men have been at work during the clean-up and many additional truck loads have been hauled off, as well as more frequent pick-ups made. Civic pride and interest in the health and sanitation of the community should spur every resident to cooperate to his fullest extent in cleaning his premises.

Pct. 4 Road Work Showing Results After High Water

Charlie Turk, commissioner of Precinct 4, has been busy for the past several days rebuilding roads in his precinct which were washed out and away by recent flood waters. Other precinct commissioners of the county have sent all available equipment into Precinct 4 for use and it is estimated that the roads in that precinct will be negotiable within the next few days.

A pickup road has been completed out of the Banner and Brown ranches and from the Chandler ranch by the ranchmen. The most serious trouble has been on the Dryden-Sheffield road where extensive damage was done by deposits of gravel on the road bed and complete sections of road were washed out.

Water from seep springs in some of the draws has necessitated the installation of culverts or flumes in the present road bed to make it passable.

Mrs. Doc Turk was in town from the ranch Tuesday and reported that the roads in the Independence country were again passable but that it would be months before the roads could be restored to their original condition following recent floods in that area.

Mrs. Turk commended the co-operation that was extended to her son, Charlie Turk, commissioner of that precinct, by the commissioners of other Terrell County precincts and also the Iraan precinct of Pecos County in supplying equipment and men to assist in rebuilding the roads.

That portion of the county is still without telephone and REA electric service.

STATE REVEALS PLANS FOR BRIDGE ON PECOS RIVER

Greene Cooke, chairman of the U. S. 90 committee of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce, contacted Dr. C. L. Basslett, president of the highway association last week end in connection with securing information on the construction of a bridge on the Pecos River to alleviate the stoppage of all traffic on the scenic border route across Texas.

It was revealed that a temporary structure was to begin this week with a completion date of 60 to 90 days contemplated. The structure, it was said, would be sufficient to take care of both light and heavy traffic and would relieve the traffic tie-up on the transcontinental route.

Definite plans for a permanent structure have not yet been revealed, but in a story issued from the Texas Highway Department in Austin, that department is now considering a single-span structure to span the Pecos River Canyon.

Cooke stated that a meeting of the Travel U. S. 90 Association which has been planned for Sunday in San Antonio is post-poned until other business until plans are made for the organization's action concerning the Pecos River bridge.

The organization, he said, will use all influence possible to try and influence the State Highway Commission and the Texas Highway Department to expedite the construction of a permanent structure, request a bridge large enough to take care of anticipated traffic in long-range thinking, and extensive advertising program of the opening of U. S. 90 as soon as the temporary bridge nears completion and another extensive advertising campaign when the permanent bridge nears completion.

These moves are planned to advise nation-wide travel agencies, travel information centers and people of the nation that U. S. 90 is again open to traffic of all kinds and later plans are to use the new and permanent bridge as a means of attracting additional travelers on the transcontinental route.

July 15, the council of directors of the wool council is to consider a proposal to amend the constitution and by-laws of that group. President H. W. Steiwer, Fossil, Ore., is to preside.

Jan Moolman Middleburg, Cape Province, South Africa, chairman of the board of the Wool Bureau Inc. has been invited to attend the meetings. Max F. Schmitt, New York, president of the bureau, also is to attend.

The meetings are to follow the annual convention of Arizona Wool Growers' Assn. on July 13, which is to be concluded with a barbecue. Members of the executive committee of the National and of the council of directors are invited to attend the barbecue.

Attending the meetings from Texas are to be Willoughby, Walter F. Pfluger, Eden, president, and Ernest L. Williams, San Angelo, executive secretary of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association, and S. L. Stumberg, Sanderson, who is a director of the Wool Council.

Permanent Bridge Over Pecos To Top Agenda Discussion At Meeting In San Antonio Sunday

Word was received this week from Ralph DeSola, secretary of Travel U. S. 90 Association, that the first thing on the agenda at the San Antonio meeting Sunday would be urging the immediate construction of a permanent structure on the Pecos River to replace the one washed out by recent high water.

The towns represented in the West Texas and South Texas portions of the nation-wide organization are feeling the full effects of the automobile and truck traffic along the scenic border route since all highway traffic has been stopped and feel that immediate action should be taken by the State Highway Commission and Texas Highway Department to relieve the pressure on business men up and down the highway.

Shivers' Highway Record Reminds Texans of Progress

AUSTIN, July 7. — During the last five years, 16.65 miles of roads have been built in Terrell County. It was Texas' greatest period of road construction history, Highway Department files show.

The breakdown by counties as well as state totals prepared by the department showed that \$1-356,796.81 was spent in the county for maintenance of present roads and for the gigantic construction program.

Meanwhile in Austin Governor Shivers cited the impressive figures "as evidence that the state's construction program is giving Texas motorists the best roads that engineering can provide."

The report showed that 14,926-10 miles of roads added to the state highway system over the period covered cost \$575,158,577.32 more money spent for construction than in any other comparable period.

Figures also showed that Farm-to-Market roads came in for a lion's share of the total. The roads were named a priority because they give farmers needed routes to markets and access to towns surrounding rural areas, a highway official said.

Shivers, who said he was very proud of the excellent way Texas roads have improved in the last half decade, listed dollars and time saved as two prime benefits to Texas motorists.

"State drivers have been able to save countless hours and money through good roads that provide the ultimate in safety and design," he remarked.

He also pledged that he "would do everything in my power" to continue the present rapid pace of road-building and maintenance. "A road system worthy of its name must provide its motorists with swift, safe routes," he said.

Members of the Travel U. S. 90 Association, especially active from Castroville to Marfa in promoting travel along the Mexican border and in the colorful Big Bend and Davis Mountain country are greatly concerned that the four-laning of the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Seaway will continue on US 90 from Rosenberg and run through San Antonio and their section of South and West Texas on the way to the Pacific. The four-lane highway has been completed in some sections of Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas, but because of local indifference and lack of organizational support it has already by-passed the historic and scene-filled Evangeline country of Louisiana and places like Castroville, Hondo, Uvalde, Brackettville, Del Rio-Acuna, Langtry, Dryden, Sanderson, Marathon, the Big Bend, Alpine, and Marfa may be by-passed.

South Texan places of importance that may suffer similar by-passing include Columbus, Weimar, Schulenberg, Flatonia, Waelder, Luling, and Seguin as well as towns as far west as Del Rio on the Mexican border. Invitations have been sent to all points in Texas along the route of US 90 and the four-lane super-highway.

Floral beautification of US 90's entire route in Texas will also be discussed before the membership meeting in the South Texas Chamber of Commerce offices in San Antonio on Sunday morning, July 11th, at 10:00 a.m., Ralph DeSola, secretary of the Travel U. This year's campaign for the governorship is boiling down to an old-fashioned political battle.

Governor Allan Shivers and his opponent Ralph Yarbrough are touring the state and throwing punches.

Shivers calls Yarbrough the "hand-picked candidate" of the CIO political action committee.

Yarbrough accuses Shivers of running an anti-labor campaign.

Yarbrough asks for sportsmanship and fair play in campaigning.

Shivers replies that he is happy to learn that Yarbrough is going to quit telling "untruths and run a clean campaign for a change."

Yarbrough criticizes Shivers for seeking a third term and pictures him as a Democrat-Republican.

Shivers also drew a jab from the Texas State Federation of Labor at its convention in Corpus Christi. The Federation urged his defeat for re-election and termed his record "obnoxious."

Shivers says his labor opposition is originating from the big party bosses and not the rank and file of workers.

The tempo will increase with the temperature as July 24 approaches.

Meanwhile Shivers will be using newspaper ads and radio time to get his message to the public. Yarbrough will concentrate largely on radio and TV.

Dudley T. Dougherty, candidate for the U. S. Senate, pounded away at the incumbent Lyndon B. Johnson's voting record, declaring Johnson "absolutely unfit to be nominated for Senator."

Dougherty listed nine counts to "indict Johnson before the bar of Texas public opinion."

Former Gov. Coke Stevenson, who now is helping to mastermind Dougherty's campaign, reports that the response to his appeal to voters to help elect Dougherty "has been heavy."

Jabs at Vice
 Doug Crouch of Fort Worth, candidate for Attorney General, charged that opponent John Ben Shepperd was going easy on friends and prosecuting his enemies.

Crouch also lashed out at what he called flourishing vice organizations in Galveston and guaranteed that he would start his clean-up campaign of the Island City in 24 hours if elected.

 High-school age youngsters at the State Orphans Home in Corsicana will enter Corsicana public schools — for the first time — in September. The state provides these girls and boys with everything but spending money.

Members of the Austin Professional Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi became concerned about this unhappy situation and decided to do something about it.

"A little spending money, that's all they want," said Bill Gardner, chapter president. "Just enough to jingle in an otherwise empty pocket. Enough to buy a cold drink, or an ice cream cone, or a candy bar — just like other boys and girls."

So SDX invited Robert Boyd, superintendent of the school, to come to Austin and talk to the chapter.

As a consequence the journalists have promised to raise enough

cash to keep these 60 young orphan boys and girls in spending money until they finish high school and it will be a continuing program for the benefit of the new ones who enroll each year.

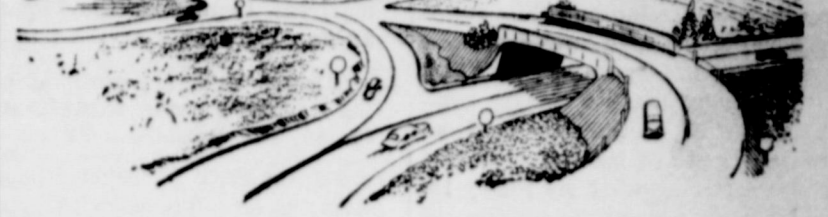
