LISTEN TO LUKE

Last week this column briefly mentioned the need for more fire plugs in the business district of Sanderson as was demonstrated in the fire of Sunday. We are asking the citizenship to renew their memories on that subject each week until something is done by someone to get the move started.

But for the cooperation of the yard employees of the railroad and the use of their plug and water, there is no telling just how far the fire might have spread. Mr. J. F. Tronson, yardmaster, was prompt to take the yard men from their work to assist the local fire boys in checking the flames which was threatening the entire block of business houses. To Mr. Tronson and the yard employees Sanderson owes a debt of gratitude.

Well the long dreaded hearing on the application for permission to move the terminal is now a matter of record. The transcripts of the testimony are now in the hands of the Railroad Commission of Texas. This commission consists of three men, the integrity of which we have no reason to doubt. Action on the testimony, and nothing more, is all that the people of Sanderson desire. If that is done, there is no reason to doubt the outcome by any who were able to hear the entire presentation.

We would not presume to take an attitude of complacency about the outcome of the hearing, but we can feel a sense of satisfaction in the assumption that the members of the commission will give a ruling in line with the testimony presented.

Whatever the outcome of the hearing, Terrell County still has a job to do. There is more than ever reason for the people of this county to remain solid in unified action for the things needed to build a better community.

The unity of purpose displayed at the meetings at Alpine shows what can be accomplished in any endeavor for civic improvement.

It is regrettable that Sanderson can get nothing but adverse publicity in a San Angelo newspaper. A reporter for the newspaper in San Angelo sent in a story from Alpine to the effect that the Sanderson group in attendance at the hearings there were boisterous and created confusion. There was no such demonstration in the courtroom at any time during the hearing. There were times when everyone, including the examiner, saw a bit of humor and the entire staff of attorneys as well as the audience took a good laugh. The behavior on the part of the Sanderson crowd was commendable notwithstanding the large attendance. Why can't we get an even break in the daily newspaper columns?

Gaines School Land Rates Two Projects

Amerada Petroleum Corp. has filed application to drill an outpost and a stepout to production in the Amrow (Devonian) field of Gaines County, 15 miles southeast of Seminole.

The projects will be drilled to 13,000 feet with rotary.

The 1-A R. Whitaker, 1/2-mile southeast, is 1,655 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 2-311-Gaines csl.

The 1-A Terrell County School Land, one location northeast, is 3,700 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 308-Terrell County School land.

Conference Held In Methodist Church Here Last Friday

The first quarterly conference of the Methodist churches of Sanderson and Dryden was held here Friday evening with Dr. L. B. Trone of Pecos, district superintendent, presiding.

A supper, served in Fellowship Hall and consisting of sandwiches, tomatoes, pickles, potato chips, cookies and iced tea, preceded the conference.

In his remarks to the group, Dr. Trone brought out the fact that the membership in all churches in the United States is now 90 million, and the rate of church membership increase is faster than the population increase. During his five-year period as superintendent of the Methodist churches of the Pecos Valley district, there has been an average of 1,000 additions each year over the district.

LEROY WALLEN TAKEN HOME FROM HOSPITAL

Leroy J. Wallen, manager of the Big Bend area of Rural Electric Cooperative, was taken to his home in Marfa last week end from the Nix hospital of San Antonio where he was hospitalized for surgery following an accident near Sheffield on Saturday, July 10.

Mr. Wallen had gone from his home to supervise the reconstruction of power lines that had been washed out during the flood in that area. He had climbed to the top of one of the tall poles, and the pole broke at the base. Mr. Wallen fell to the ground, the pole falling across his leg, breaking it between knee and ankle.

After receiving first aid at the scene of the accident, he was brought to Sanderson for X-rays and from here to San Antonio where he underwent surgery.

Directors for the establishment were selected at a stockholders meeting on Saturday, July 3. Those chosen by the stockholders to serve as directors were Frank Harrell, James Kerr, Joe Kerr, Jr., W. J. Ferguson, Jr., N. M. Mitchell, John T. Williams, H. A. Couch and Jack Hayre.

Jack Hayre was elected vice-president and Troy Druse was named cashier by the directors.

The bank has a common capital stock of \$50,000; certified surplus \$85,000; and total liabilities of \$1,947,630.31, according to the statement of condition at close of business June 30, 1954.

Pecos River Bridge Work Progressing

Work on a low water crossing of the Pecos River on Highway 90 has started.

Construction crews are working day and night to build the temporary contour winding roadway down the steep canyon walls to the water level.

It is estimated the crossing will be completed about September 1, depending on weather conditions.

M. B. Hodges, division engineer for the State Highway Department in that area, stated that work was started on the bridge last Thursday. He said Luther Turner of San Antonio is building the concrete and steel low water crossing at the Pecos and the structure is expected to cost between \$125,000 and \$150,000.

The new crossing will be 700 to 800 feet upstream from the old location, Hodges said.

The steel and concrete bridge that spanned the Pecos River before it was swept away in the flood on June 26 was 450 feet in length. Built in 1923, it stood 50 feet above the water.

The men at the site are working down the embankment on the east side of the Pecos, Hodges said.

Sections of the old bridge were dumped downstream after they were washed out by the flood.

"The high water mark at the Pecos River shows the water rose to 89 1/2 feet," Hodges said.

The river in that section flows between high canyon walls which rise 329 feet at the railroad bridge over the river.

LT. PIERSON IN KOREA ON LANDING EXERCISES

Marine 1st Lt. Earl F. Pierson, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl F. Pierson, participated with the 7th Marine Regiment in the 1st Marine Division's recent amphibious landing exercises on Korea's east coast.

The exercises, dubbed Marlex Five, involved several thousand Navy and Marine Corps personnel. It afforded training in the planning and execution of an amphibious landing under combat conditions in a mountainous terrain that characterizes the entire eastern coast of Korea.

The three-day ship-to-shore movement of troops and equipment landed the Marines near Sokcho-ri, their pre-truce debarkation point north of the 38th parallel.

BROTHERHOOD TESTIMONY COUNTERS T&NO CLAIMS FOR SAVING IN OPERATING TIME

A ten-hour session in Alpine last Thursday wound up the two-day hearing on the application of the T&NO Railroad to discontinue Sanderson and Valentine as terminals along its line between Del Rio and El Paso and to establish a terminal at Alpine.

Bernard Sines, vice-president of the T&NO which is the eastern operating unit of the Southern Pacific, was on the stand most of Wednesday. In direct questioning and cross examination he said that the move had become necessary as a time element in order to meet the competition of four other large trans-continental railroad systems operating across Texas.

"Changes in railroading since the line was built more than eighty years ago has made the move necessary," Mr. Sines stated. "Freight trains that once moved across West Texas at speeds of 20 to 30 miles per hour now travel at twice those speeds and steam locomotives have given way to modern diesels that need less servicing and fewer inspections."

Wednesday was a holiday in Sanderson with all of the business firms of the town closed in order that employees might attend the hearing. A motor caravan with police escort went to Alpine to be on hand for the opening session.

Examiner Charles Pettit of the Texas Railroad Commission presided over the hearing. The two-day hearing in the crowded district courtroom at Alpine ended Thursday night at 8:00 o'clock with a motion by the opposition that the hearing be recessed to be resumed again in Sanderson. The motion and transcript of the hearing will be presented to the full commission by Mr. Pettit for action.

Tom Davis, general counsel for the S. P. and Frank Ray, Alpine attorney, presented the railroad's viewpoint at the hearing also. Judge Bryan Montague of Del Rio represented Sanderson and the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce. Bennett Smith, attorney for the Community Public Service Company at Fort Worth, assisted in the cross examination of Sines Wednesday. Seventeen Sanderson railroad employees and one from Valentine took the stand Wednesday afternoon and were unanimous in opposition to the proposed changes and all were in agreement that they would suffer a great financial loss in sacrificing their homes if they had to move to El Paso or Del Rio as their home terminals.

testimony when he told the examiner that the railroad had decided to not eliminate Sanderson as a home terminal point for passenger train crews. The new freight proposal would have crews operating from Del Rio to Alpine, a distance of 216 miles with Del Rio as the home terminal, and then operate crews from El Paso to Alpine, a distance of 221 miles, with El Paso the home terminal.

Thursday seventeen Sanderson businessmen, three union representatives, four persons from Alpine, two railroad men from El Paso, a clerk from Valentine and Mr. Sines took the stand in the final day's hearing. The loss to the community if the terminal was abolished was presented by the businessmen who not only cited the loss of business economy but also the loss to the schools, churches, etc.

The last witness, Regan Ferguson, general manager of the Order of Railroad Conductors, stated: "This is definitely a test case and every railroad in the country is watching it very carefully. There will possibly be thirty applications such as this in Texas alone if the commission rules favorably for the railroad."

Vice-president Sines stated in direct testimony that the S.P. had already spent \$100,000 at Alpine on new lines in anticipation of the move and had planned to spend \$930,000 for new terminal yard facilities if the move is granted. Sixty-eight families would be brought to Alpine, leaving only three freight and yard employees at Sanderson and three at Valentine. Several jobs will be abolished at both places.

AUSTIN. — The State Highway Department has accepted a bid from Cage Brothers of San Antonio for construction of 17.8 miles of roads in Pecos and Terrell counties.

The contract provides for the grading, structures and surfacing of Farm Road 1749 from Sheffield to the Terrell County line and from the Pecos County line southeast 18 miles. The San Antonio firm bid \$173,088.

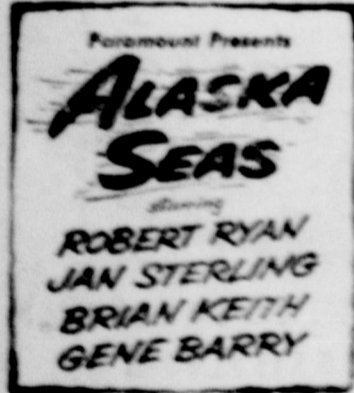

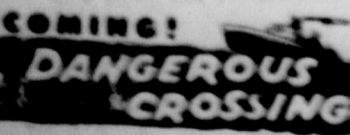

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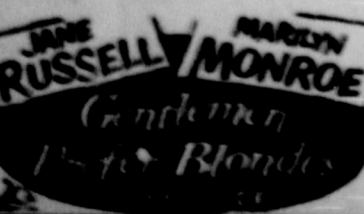
