Diablo Dam Site On Rio EAGLES, SAN FELIPE RAIN IS GENERAL OVER

By Clarence J. LaRoche From San Antonio Express

Austin - An area known as 'Site No. 1" some 15 miles by road up-river from Del Rio has been the Buster Brite ranch. selected as the area for the longawaited Diablo Dam.

This was disclosed here Monday by Col. Leland H. Hewitt, commissioner of the U. S. section of the International Boundary and Water Commission.

Hewitt made his disclosure in an address before the tenth annual meeting of the Texas Water Conservation Association.

Diablo Dam, said Hewitt, will be approximately eight miles long this is about three miles longer than Falcon Dam. It will be 280 feet high, compared to Falcon's 150 feet of height. It may be either concrete or earth-fill construction.

The I. B. W. C. commissioner said the Diablo Reservoir is planned to centrol completely all of the floods of record on the Ric Grande at the Diablo Site.

With Falcon Dam, the Diablo Dam will represent the harness necessary to control and store the vast emount of water that has historically poured down the Devil's River and Rio Grande.

The site apparently was decided upon at a meeting in Del Rio last week between U. S. and Mexican officials. It is one of four sites the

Instead of two power plants, on on the U.S. side and one on the Mexican side - as at Falcon one large power plant might be constructed in the middle of the

Initial studies show, said Col Hewitt, that 350 million kilowatt hours of primary energy could be developed annually, in addition to those that can be generated at Falcon.

"The interconnected operation of power plants at Diablo and those at Falcon," he said, "is particularly advantageous since irrigation water for the Lower Rio Grande Valley would pass through the power plants at both dams."

Commenting on the selected site Hewitt said there would be a number of "holes" in the limestone formation that would have to be

The field studies have been un usually intensive because of the character of the formations underlying the dam and reservoir site. Limestone is subject to honey combing, and you can appreciate the necessity of having a tight reservoir and solid foundation.

"The office studies that have been made to date have been the ireliminary designs and cost estimater required for the comparison of the many dam sites studied.

"The dam may be either a concrete or an earthfill dam in the main river channel with long earth dikes extending back from the river on both sides. The location pend upon the type of dam finally

FM-1217 Completion **Scheduled For Early** Part Of Next Summer

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Road Program for Texas. the Texas Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this program are being derived from the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1954, matched with State Highway funds on a dollar-to-dollar basis.

R. L. Faltinson, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Pecos, has stated that the following farm-to-market road in this area is scheduled for work under this program

Construction of a road in Terrell County from the South end of FM 1749 South of Sheffield to the north end of FM1217, a distance of approximately 10 miles, at an estimated cost of \$160,000. This road will complete the connection between Dryden and Sheffield.

Faltinson stated that this year the Commission has authorized the development of some area roads which will serve the dual purpose of service to the adjacent land as well as aiding in the development of the entire area of the State.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects fust as soon as final planning is completed and right-of-way secured. Resi-Engineer J. W. Whitson will be in charge of the work in this





"(d) To develop a program for the rapid and complete terminaments and the initiation of a program of trade among all non Communist nations which will ther strengthen the security of the free

"(e) To develop an overall dynamic program for the defeat of the international Communist con

:That peaceful coexistence b clearly identified as a Communist myth. It should be rejected on the grounds that it is impossible for civilization based on a belief in Almighty God, to coexist with an aggressive criminal conspiracy dedicated to the destruction of civ ilization and to the enslavement of all mankind"

The committee issuing these owerful recommendations is made up of calm, deliberative Congressmen of both parties. Their findings and recommendations deserve serous consideration.






