Word was received here last week that Lon Garrison, superintendent of the Big Bend National Park, has been named by Washington Park Director Conrad Wirth, to head a new office of conservation and protection for all national narks He will work within the National Park Service at Washington.

The appointment has not been made official by confirmation of Interior Secretary Douglas McKay and until such confirmation is received is subject to change or can-

It was expected that Garrison would have no trouble securing the post since Wirth said that Garrison had been chosen for what he termed one of the most important positions around here and one that has been needed for some time.

J. T. Allen, assistant director of National Parks, would not disclose who would be Garrison's successor as superintendent in the Big Bend National Park.
