Whether it is the continued dry weather, the season of the year, or just my age and condition, I find that I am unable to untangle some of the intricate developments in the happenings of late.

My stand for President Eisenhower is so well-known here that many people think I am a dyed-in-the-wool Republican.

Now the bubble has blown up and I stand here gaping wild-eyed and wonder just where I do stand. I don't favor this and I don't favor that until I get to wondering just what I do favor. Well, one news editor stated last week that he didn't want to stand in the corner with the Communists but got in just the same in order to be with what he thought was a majority to be against Joe McCarthy. I will much prefer to be in the corner with McCarthy and no one else there than to get in a corner with the Communists even though President Eisenhower and all the Democrats got in there with them for this one issue.

Many of the things that have been said and done by McCarthy have not been according to the lines I would select, but none of them have been as flagrant as the covering up job done by the Pentagon where investigation of Communism was affected. Sure, Joe is a Republican, and is expected to be in that party — I am a Democrat, but that doesn't mean that I have to endorse everything the big leaders of the party do. It was considered something nearing sacrilege back yonder when I was outspoken on the mass murder committed at Pearl Harbor when the information could have been given by commanders to have prepared them for the attack. I was a fool to even suggest that Roosevelt's administration was responsible for the sneak attack. But now the facts are out and the blame is not on the commanders in that area.

Let's be sensible about the terrible facts we must face. There is a need for hysteria, but there is a need for constructive thinking. ASC Office Tells Of 1955 Program

The Terrell County ASC office has released information to the ranchers of the county for the program of work scheduled for approval for 1955.

The sign-up period for the 1955 program is from December 15 to January 1, 1955.

All producers that are interested in participating in the 1955 program are asked to come by the ASC office to file an application for assistance during the first sign-up period in order that the committee may allocate the fiscal finances more efficiently for the entire year.

There will be two additional sign-up periods in 1955: — one the latter part of May and one in the latter part of August.

The approved practices for Terrell County are as follows:—

Control of competitive shrubs. Lechuguilla, pear and cedar only.

Pitting pasture land to improve water penetration.

Drilling or deepening wells for livestock water.

Installing pipelines for better distribution of livestock water.

Construction of permanent cross fences to control grazing.

Deferred grazing to encourage regrowth of better grasses.

It was pointed out that anyone desiring aid in planning conservation practices for 1955, should inquire at the ASC office or contact A. T. Whitte, Jr., Soil Conservation Technician.

SP Places Order For 163 New Diesels

Houston — Southern Pacific has placed orders for another 163 diesel locomotive units to go into service in the first five months of next year, raising the total diesel horsepower on the railroad to more than 2 1/3-million, D. J. Russell, the company's president has announced.

Within the last six months the railroad has authorized the expenditure of \$30,000,000 for diesel power, he said, raising the total postwar investment in 1,520 diesel units to approximately \$245,000,000.

The new locomotives will be purchased from Electro-Motive Division of General Motors Corp.

The new diesel units, first of which are scheduled for factory release later this month, will be placed in service throughout the railroad's transportation system. Russell said that at latest count, diesel locomotives were handling 85 per cent of gross ton-miles of freight, 78 per cent of passenger train miles, and 81 per cent of the yard switching service on the railroad's system.

S. L. Stumberg, Terrell and Brewster County ranchman, was re-elected to the post of director of the Wool Bureau, Inc., this week at the annual meeting of the council of directors of the American Wool Council in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Stumberg is expected back this week end from Salt Lake City where he and Mrs. Stumberg attended the meeting. They went to Salt Lake City from New York City where he attended a meeting of the Wool Bureau, Inc.

Stumberg has been very active for the past several years in the wool industry and related organizations on a national and international scale, having returned only recently from a six-weeks tour of Australia and New Zealand where he made a study of the wool producing and marketing industry in those countries. He was a guest of the governments of those countries and was the leader of a party of men connected with the wool and sheep industry in America.

Stumberg was also named on the predatory animals committee.

Re-Surfacing On US 90 Slated Soon

Word was received last week that extensive work was planned for re-surfacing of U. S. 90 east of here for next summer.

From 2.5 miles west of Langtry, to 1.5 miles west of Shumla, a distance of 12.1 miles, the placing of additional surfacing is planned at an estimated cost of \$35,000.

The placing of additional surfacing on U. S. Highway 90 from 1.5 miles west of Shumla to 1.6 miles west of the Pecos River, approximately 6.5 miles, and an estimated cost of \$29,000 is in the plans.

An additional \$68,000 is estimated to go into the cost of having additional surfacing done on two stretches nearer Del Rio, covering approximately 24.1 miles.

Mrs. Kellogg and her late husband, S. J. Kellogg, were former residents when he was a freight conductor on the T&NO railroad. Their home is now the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cargile.

Survivors include a son, General Henry K. Kellogg, of Hollywood, California, one brother, one sister, and two grandchildren.
