

## **Land Owners' Bill** Offers Protection To Area Ranchmen

House Bill No. 256, co-sponsored y Rep. George Thurmond of the 100th Legislative District of Texs, is designed and intended to be f aid to land owners in the proper nd lawful control of their propery, and not designed and will ot interfere with legitimate oil mpanies and exploration commies. It will not interfere with il and gas leaseholders

The bill proposes;

Section 1. Unlawful without conent of owner of land to enter upon fly over the land or water for oes obtain geophysical, seismographical,, gravity metrical, or any character of geological informaion or data whatsoever pertaining

Section 2. Same provision on ads and highways without conent of owner of land abutting

Penalty is not more than \$1,000 or not more than six months all or both such fine and im

Section 3. In addition to actual mages to the land occasioned by ich trespass and regardless of ther or not any criminal charghave been filed against any viotor the land owner would be enitled to damages to the extent of not less than \$100 for each unlawful act. The act does not apply to insold public lands.

When the 101 passengers crew of 48 came ashore at Plymouth Rock from the Mayflower colony of buildings to live in. In the center of the colony they built the "Common Storehouse." Then, community officials for the pur pose of maintaining order and defense agaist the Indians. Parcels of land were assigned each colonist in the name of King James of England. All the produc from all these parcels went into the central storehouse and equal shares of everything were doled out to the colonists.



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#### **Blood Pressure Is** Symptom, Not Disease

Blood pressure - what does it mean?

Nothing more, says State Health Officer Henry A. Holle during this annual observance of heart disease control, than a measure of pressuragainst artery walls as blood courses through the body.

Everyone's blood pressure, according to the explanation, is high est when the heart pumps a fresh load of blood into elastic-walled arteries and lowest when the heart pauses between beats for refilling The high level is systolic, the low est level is diastolic pressure.

Physicians measure blood pressure by wrapping an inflatable rubber cuff around the patient's arm When air is pumped into the cuff a column of mercury is forced into a glass tube. The height to which it climbs indicates the pressure inside the cuff and the compression brought against blood vessels in the arm.

Then, using a stethescope, the physician determines systolic presaure by listening to the sound produced by blood flowing through the artery when the pressure in it is just above that in the cuff. The characteristic change of sound at the diastolic level is easily recognized by the physician.

No clear-cut line can be drawn between "normal" and "abnormal" blood pressure, the health official emphasizes.

"But it is generally agreed that a systolic pressure exceeding 140 or a diastolic pressure above 90 de serves further checking."

Although age does not bring an automatic increase in blood pressure, high pressure - called hypertension - is most common in midale or advanced years.

Like temperature, high blood ity. pressure is only an indication of certain diseases, rather than a disease itself. Only a physician, after often live long and active lives careful study, can determine what
