Faith . . . The inner being of man is constantly prodding his actions in daily tasks and under the most disheartening circumstances to look up and look on to the things which ultimately must come.

An example of faith was displayed this week when 13 directors of the Del Rio National Bank, 12 of them are ranchmen who have weathered seven long years of unbroken drought, signed a contract authorizing the one non-ranching director, Executive Vice President Harry Walker, to have the seven-story bank building "waterproofed."

Which reminds me of hearing a local resident ask another who had been here only about two years if he knew the house in which he lived had a leaky roof.

Citizens of Sanderson, in a mass meeting called by the Chamber of Commerce officials Monday night, expressed enthusiasm and a willingness to work with the committee from the local chamber to stage a fitting celebration here on July 14. That date marks the 50th anniversary of the organization of Terrell County.

Knowing full well that the cost of such a whing-ding would be enormous, and knowing that this community has had many setbacks which have affected the economy of the area, the group nevertheless spoke out with faith and enthusiasm for the continued plan to go all out for the big event. Terrell County has suffered more than some counties from the continued drought . . . unstable conditions caused by the attempt to move the railroad terminal facilities . . . the wash-out of the Pecos River bridge last summer . . . all these except the drought are temporarily in the past. Now we look forward with the eye of hopeful faith in the people of Sanderson and Terrell County to carry on all the activities of a normal wide-awake community.

The "ghost town" talk that was started by some area newspapers does not now apply to Sanderson. Last week this columnist made some pretty extensive searches to find housing facilities for seven families coming here to make their homes for the next 18 months or longer. It was a job to find even temporary quarters. Sanderson is not on a boom, by any means, neither is it a "ghost town."

We are inspired to greater things and to continue with all that is attached to the words of Texas' beloved poet, Grace Noll Crowell, who said her "Songs of Faith" has written.

The year will keep its promises to me; fulfilling the days will come and go, and I will take their sure course to the sea; and when harvest, these will come I know.

The stars will go their quiet silver way; there will be sun and rain and wind and dew; there will be breathless beauty in each day; there will be old loved tasks for me to do.

The year will keep its promise. Oh my heart, we must not, dare not fail to do our part."

Lions To Sponsor 'Broom Sale' On March 25

The Sanderson Lions Club will sponsor a "broom sale" on Friday, March 25. The sale will last all day.

One of the major projects of the Lions Club is sight conservation and help to the blind, and the local club is sponsoring the sale of the brooms, which were made by blind people, to bolster the income of those handicapped people and to help in the local club's sight conservation program.

The local club will receive 25 per cent of all proceeds of sales of brooms, mops, whisk brooms, and the like on March 25.

A truck will set on the corner by the Turner Hotel all day on March 25 and local people may come to the truck to pick out their needs or local Lions will call on people at home to push the sale of cleaning implements that day.

Local Lions Club members will carry a broom with them for several days to remind local people of the coming sale, and housewives are asked to take inventory of their supply of cleaning implements to prepare for the broom sale.

More details of the various items in this line to be available will be given later.

Fiftieth Anniversary of County To Be Observed on July 14

Plans for a county-wide celebration here on July 14, commemorating the 50th anniversary of the organization of the county were discussed at a public meeting in the courthouse here Monday night.

Clyde Griffith, president of the local Chamber of Commerce, presided when heads of the various clubs and organizations of the county were on hand to represent their group. It was unanimously decided to name a central committee to complete plans and arrange the various duties and assignments for each organization participating.

Dudley Harrison had compiled a list of the various clubs and had obtained commitments from most of them who were willing to assume a role in making the celebration a success.

The central committee, in charge of plans for the entire program, were: Dudley Harrison, Jimmie Caroline, Clyde Griffith, Webb Townsend and O. T. Sudduth.

It was stressed by President Griffith that this undertaking would be a means of letting the people of West Texas know that Sanderson and Terrell County are still here. "A program of this kind will go a long way to counteract the adverse publicity occasioned by the threatened railroad terminal move, and will cause the people of this area to recognize again that Sanderson is not a 'ghost town,'" he stated.

The committee will get more definite program plans arranged next week and those plans will again be submitted to the citizens at another public meeting, Griffith said.

SALE OF 1955 CAR TAGS SLOW

Terrell County residents are procrastinating in the buying of 1955 license plates for motor vehicles with the result that some of the local citizens will have to stand in line at the last minute to try to beat the April 1 deadline for purchasing the current tags.

Miss Sue Burchett, deputy tax collector, has issued a plea for motorists to buy their license plates "now". With no office help this year, it will be impossible for her to issue as many tags as for now appears will be sold to date, it was pointed out, and it will mean a lot of unnecessary trouble for the purchasers, as well as the deputy, for further delay in the purchase of tags.

The new tags may be placed on vehicles any time but must be on all vehicles in operation on April 1. To secure a 1955 license, the vehicle owner must present his certificate of title and last year's license receipt.

Some car owners are of the opinion that cars must have the inspection stamp to secure a license tag, but such is not the case, Miss Burchett advises.

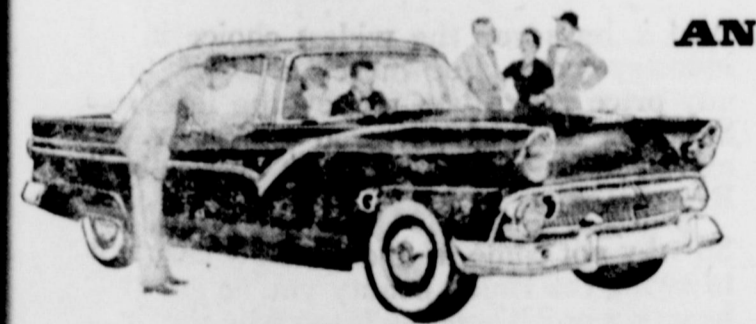

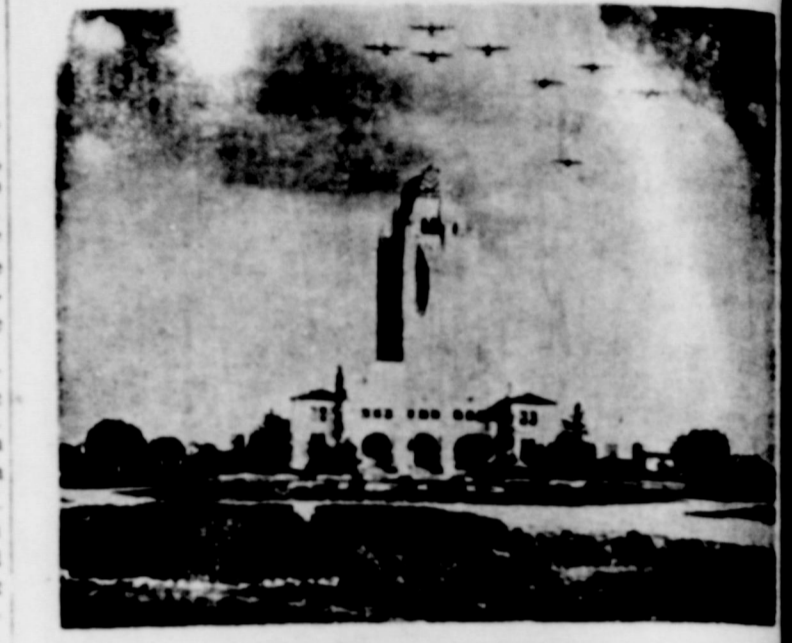
