Be a Good Citizen' Urges State Bar Assn.

Using the theme, "Good Government is Your Business," the State Bar of Texas is observing March as "Be a Good Citizen" month. It was announced by its American Citizenship Committee.

Texas newspapers, radio and television stations have been asked to cooperate in the program by publishing, broadcasting and telephoning constant reminders to the citizen that he has "duties and responsibilities to discharge if he is to keep his freedoms and his liberties."

Citizens are being urged to take an interest in their town, their school and county government by attending meeting of school boards and commissioners. They are also urged to watch newspaper, listen to broadcasts, then write to their representatives in the legislature and the Congress setting forth their personal views. It takes more than just voting on election day to be a good citizen," the reminder.

SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS LOSS IN 1955 SCHOLASTICS

The final figures on the 1955 school census which were released this week reveal that the total number of scholastics for the county has continued to drop for the past three years.

In 1953 Terrell County had 684 scholastics and in 1954, 655, a loss of 31. This year's total of 601 shows a loss of 54 over last year.

There were 297 boys and 304 girls of scholastic age residing in the county at the time of the census which was taken by Mrs. W. J. Ferguson.

Since the 1954 census was taken, Terrell County showed a gain of 84 scholastics but, at the same time, also show 138 deletions. With the present enrollment and attendance, the prospects of being able to add another teacher next year is on the border line, as it was last year, with the attendance for the remaining weeks of school being a vital factor in the final decision.

There will be a beginners' class of 45 six-year-olds in September. In 1954 there were 71. The lowest number of scholastics in the 10-year-olds with only 33; while the largest number is in the 11 and 12-year-olds with 57 each.

Despite the loss of scholastics in the annual census for the past two years, the enrollment in the schools has remained practically the same with the moving in of new families to offset the ones moving from Terrell County.

Gov. Shivers Names Easter Seal Month March 10 - April 10

Governor Allan Shivers named March 10 to April 10 the "month for crippled children" in a proclamation issued from the State executive office last week in Austin.

The proclamation was issued in support of the 1955 Easter Seal campaign, scheduled to open in Texas last week and continue on through Easter Sunday.

"It is a privilege to proclaim this month for crippled children," Gov. Shivers said in a statement accompanying the proclamation.

"No greater work can we engage in than giving aid to crippled and handicapped children."

"I urge every citizen of the state to have a part in this worthy humanitarian program. Let each of us individually do what we can to help a crippled child attain his rightful place in society."

"Also let us all contribute liberally to the Easter Seal campaign, so that the services of the Texas Society for Crippled Children can be expanded to reach every handicapped individual who needs care and treatment."

"May we not slacken our efforts until our goal is reached."

NEW WELL ADDS \$ TO SCHOOL INCOME

Another producing well adds to the permanent school fund of the Terrell County Independent School District with the completion of an oil well in the Gaines County school land.

Amarada Petroleum Corp. No. 2 Terrell, 3-8 mile northwest extension to the Amrow field, was testing after flowing 216 barrels of 55.4 gravity oil and 5.97 barrels of basic sediment and water in 15 hours.

Flow was through a 30-64-inch choke, for one hour, and 3-4-inch choke for 14 hours, from open hole between 12,619 feet where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 12,654 feet, the total depth. The gas-oil ratio was 26.1.

The well is 15 miles south of Seminole.

This is the sixth producing well on the Terrell County School Land.

Local Bank To Close On All Saturdays Beginning April 2

The Sanderson State Bank will be closed all day Saturday, beginning April 2, it was announced this week by Jack Hayre, executive vice president.

Mr. Hayre stated that banks can use their own discretion in closing on Saturdays and the directors of the local bank decided in favor of the week end shut-down.

Legal holidays for state banks in Texas are now lowered to six. Mr. Hayre stated, and include New Year's Day, San Jacinto Day, July 4th, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas. A holiday which falls on a Sunday will not be observed by the banks on the following day, as has been the custom in the past.

License, Inspection Deadline Nears

Owners of motor vehicles are required to have their vehicles inspected at a state approved inspection garage once each year and the deadline for the present inspection period is April 15, 1955. The Texas Highway Patrol warned that less than 50 percent of the motorists in this area have had their vehicles inspected at this time.

All owners of vehicles found operating upon a public road on or after April 16, 1955, without a valid (green) inspection sticker will be subject to arrest and upon conviction may be fined not to exceed \$200.00 and costs of court.

A person is required to register his car in the county in which he resides.

A resident of Texas must register their motor vehicles in Texas. Any person who is a resident of Texas and registers his motor vehicle in a state other than Texas is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction may be fined not to exceed \$200.00 and costs of court and their out of state license plates are null and void.

Any non-resident who takes up residence in Texas is required to register their motor vehicle in Texas within 30 days. After 30 days their out of state registration is null and void and they may be fined not to exceed \$200.00 plus 20 percent penalty on costs of Texas license.

The dead line for displaying 1955 license plates on your motor vehicles is April 1, 1955, and any person found operating a motor vehicle upon a public road on or after April 2, 1955, without 1955 plates shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction may be fined not to exceed \$200.00 and costs of court.

April 1 Important To Wool Growers

April 1 is an important date for wool growers. Wool of the 1955 clip sold by the grower April 1 and after will qualify for wool payments under the new program in operation for the first time this year. Wool sold before April 1 will not qualify for such payments.

This reminder comes from the local County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee whose office is responsible for administering the wool program for Terrell County.

The program, it is explained, results from the National Wool Act of 1954 to stimulate wool production in the United States. As authorized by this law the Secretary has announced an incentive price of 62 cents per pound for shorn wool, grease basis for the 1955 marketing year. Payments will be made to wool growers when the national average market price for wool falls below the incentive level.

Wool growers are also reminded to save all sales slips and other evidences indicating producer, buyer, date of sale, and delivery and amount of sale. This information, it is explained, is needed to support the wool grower's claim for payment.

Sales records also are used to arrive at the national average sales price upon which wool incentive payments are based. The rate of payment to each grower is a uniform percentage needed to bring the average price all growers receive for their wool up to the incentive price level. This means that the more the individual growers gets for his wool the greater will be his total return. Since the incentive payment determination cannot be made until the 1955 clip has been marketed, payments to growers cannot be expected before the summer of 1956.

Stockton, Elmann said. Construction of both of the new buildings is scheduled to get underway in the near future and should be completed by late spring.

The Sanderson building measuring 24 by 27 feet, will be of frame construction with asbestos shingle siding. It will house the equipment for Sanderson's new dial telephone system, and provide space for plant storage.

The Sanderson building will be located at the rear of the present central office building property on Pine Street.

Dial equipment will arrive for installation in the new building as soon as construction work is completed. Then a crew of specially trained installers will move into Sanderson to install the intricate dial equipment in the new building.

"Before the system is finally cut into service, a lot of other work must be done," Elmann said.

Dials will be installed on every telephone in Sanderson, new dial telephone numbers will be issued to each customer, a new directory will be printed and delivered, and a thorough check of the network of telephone wires and cables throughout the city will have to be made.

"These are but some of the many tasks that are ahead," the telephone manager said.
