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FUNERAL RITES HERE TUESDAY FOR DAN FARLEY

Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor, officiated at the funeral services on Tuesday afternoon in the First Presbyterian Church for Dan Farley, early Terrell County rancher. Interment was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery with O. T. Sudduth Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Farley died Sunday afternoon at Devine, Texas. He had lain down for a nap after lunch and was found dead by his daughter, with whom he makes his home.

He was born in Del Rio in 1879 and, after growing to manhood in that area, went to the King ranch where he was employed for 12 years.

He was united in marriage to Miss Maude Musgrave in 1897. To this union were born 11 children, including twin sons who died in infancy. Mrs. Farley died in 1918 in Brackettville.

Mr. Farley first brought his family to Sanderson in 1909, running sheep on the open range. After residing in the Glass Mountains for several years, he returned to Sanderson, going later to Brackettville. Close friends recall that he never gave up through the drought years that have always plagued West Texas periodically, but would continue to feed and care for his stock, many times having to haul water long distances.

He was a member of the Pentecostal Church.

Two sons preceded him in death, Arthur and Otto Farley. The three surviving sons are Oscar of Pleasanton, Edward of Beeville, Frank of Brackettville; also four daughters, Mrs. Mona Gammon of Devine, Mrs. Arthur Schwandner of Brackettville, Mrs. Harry Schleuter of Pleasanton and Mrs. Ed Coleman of Crystal City; four brothers, Wade and Bev of Sanderson, Joe and Jim of Sedona, Arizona; two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Konkle of Phoenix, Ariz., and Mrs. Ida Ryan of Long Beach, Calif.; also 26 grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren.

Mr. Farley served as deputy sheriff in the early days of Terrell County, one of the first local citizens to hold that office.

Rain and Heavy Hail Reported in Some Sections of County

Several sections of Terrell County reported a damaging hail storm on Sunday evening. The unusual cloud formations in the north early in the evening had attracted many residents of the county and the hail which followed was not wholly unexpected.

The area in which the hailstones fell ranged from the northeastern part of the county, east into the Dryden country and on down through the Pumpville area and as far east as Langtry.

Although reports of hailstones as large as baseballs came in, the general size was about like marbles. The ground was white in the areas after the storm cleared and a heavy downpour of rain came with the hail stones.

In the Dryden area, screens were torn from windows and damages to furnishings came as result of broken window panes after the heavy downpour of rain which followed. But few houses escaped the damage as winds of high velocity accompanied the storm. Reports of fences and water gaps down in many places came from many ranchers.

Sanderson Canyon, Downie Draw, and other drainages were bank-full for a period Sunday night, the water running in torrents.

The rain gauge total for Saturday evening's rainfall and Sunday's shower totalled 44 in Sanderson. The part of the county still in the lower brackets on moisture are the areas to the south and southeast.

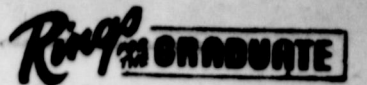



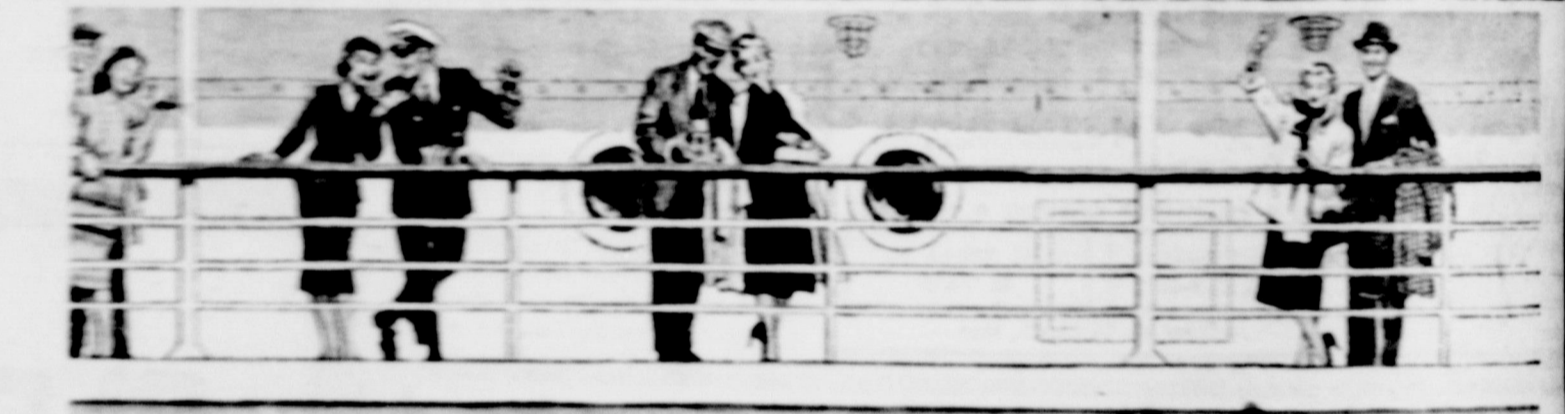
