LISTEN TO LUKE

Well, we have solved the dilemma of ranchers and towns-folk — doggie lambs because of the path and other normal circumstances, and who are also plagued by stray dogs playing havoc on the lamb crop they are trying to raise, can now put the two together and raise good dogs and control the pest dogs. It is an unusual situation, for, for a dog to adopt a lamb raise. Of course, no one ever gave a lamb credit for having any sense, so you can't blame him for going to the dog, especially since he has knowledge enough to know where his next meal is coming from.

Now, here is an up and coming market for some enterprising characters we could think of, and there are two ways to go about it.

Money is just waiting to be made from two angles.

If you have doggie lambs, they can be sold to dog owners, and dog owners could sell or lease the dogs to lamb owners. Or, someone could even buy both and take them to the market of raising wet dogs and speculating on lambs. Ranchmen, however, in their efforts to get rid of dogs that eat their sheep, would not want to go into the dog business, and at the same time, they would be glad to sell their doggie lambs at a price commensurate with their potential value.

We wonder, too, if dogs nursing lambs would be eligible for government dog food to subsidiate their foundation stock.

Washout On US 285 Halts Traffic Again

There have been many kinds of weather in Terrell County for the past week.

Last Wednesday, one of the worst dust storms to hit this area in recent years blew in from the northwest early in the evening. The temperature Thursday, Friday and Saturday morning of last week was down in the low 40s.

Rain and large hailstones fell on the Townsend and Downie ranches Tuesday afternoon.

The weather this week is quite "summery" but clouds gather often and precipitation continues to come to some scattered areas over the county.

The third washout on U. S. 285 about 25 miles north of Sanderson, in about the same number of weeks, has again halted traffic over the Sanderson-Fort Stockton road.

Heavy rains west of the highway on part of the West-Pyle Cattle Co. and Web Townsend ranch brought water down an arroyo which crosses the highway near the Townsend turn-off.

Temporary detours were established following previous washouts and attempts were made to fill in a deep cut in the roadbed, but subsequent rains have continued in the same general vicinity and kept highway maintenance busy replacing the detour and the roadbed.

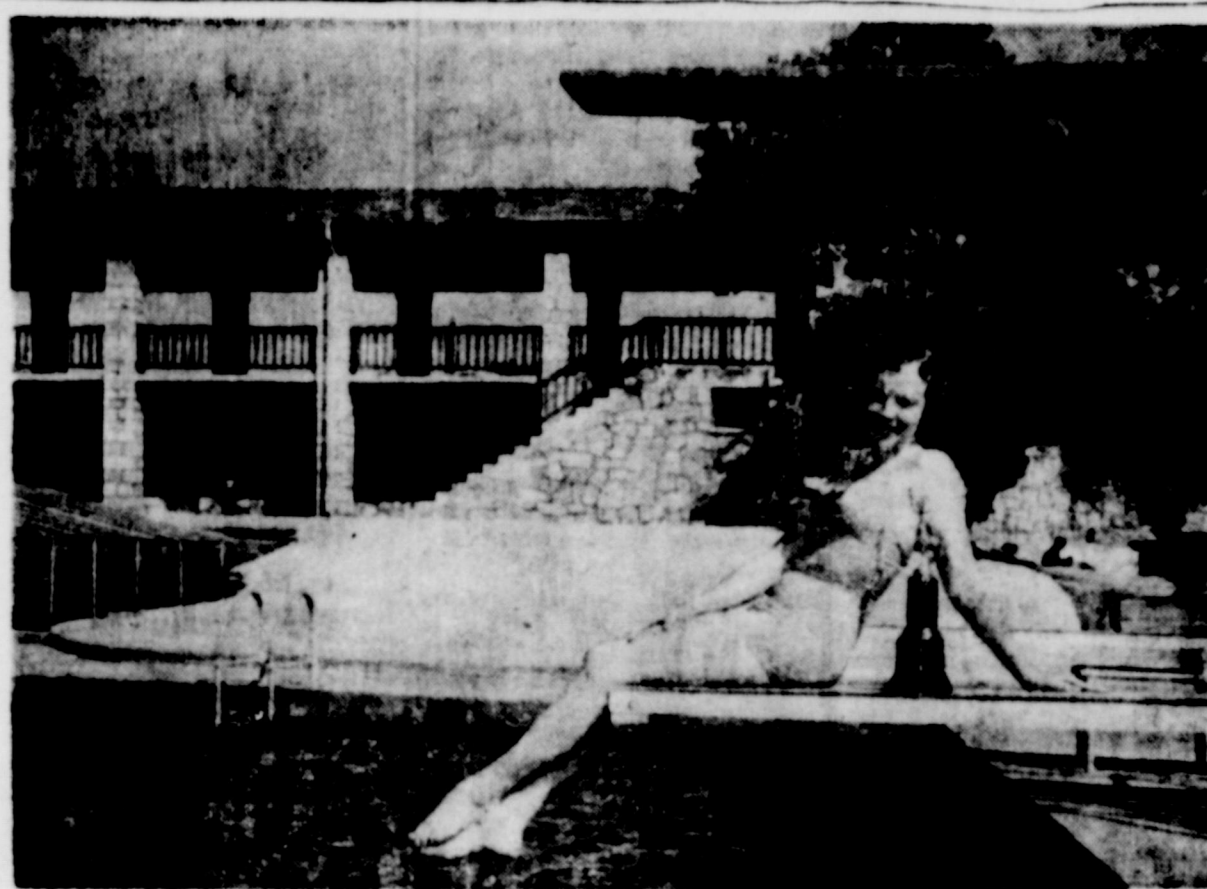
Gaines Co. Outpost Stake on School Land

Water Carnival This Week-End In Fort Stockton

The stage is set for the annual Fort Stockton Water Carnival, the famous show staged each June on and about the waters of beautiful Comanche Springs Swimming Pool, one of the southwest's best-known and most beautiful recreation spots.

"The Sky's the Limit" is the theme of the colorful and fanciful show which takes the spectators around the world in an evening — to enjoy entertainment typical of the half dozen or so lands en route.

One June 17, a colorful parade will traverse Fort Stockton streets at 4:30 and for the evening show, the All-Southwest Revue is the feature, with entries limited to senior age beauties (16 or older) from area towns. Fort Stockton girls will not compete for the Miss Southwest title.

Saturday night the winner of the Miss Southwest title and trophy will be announced, along with her court, and the final performance of "The Sky's the Limit" will be staged. Special lighting effects are being arranged to add to the beauty of the water and stage spectacles. Ample seats are being installed to accommodate the crowds expected from a wide area.

The Fort Stockton Lions Club sponsors the show and Mrs. Fletcher Eason is the show director.

The first Water Carnival was held in 1936 — Texas Centennial year — to celebrate the construction of a new stone pavilion and bath house. It was continued through the years to publicize Comanche Springs and the attractive pool which has been built in the spring basin.

Ranchers, Hunters Urged to Attend Meeting Thursday

Ranchmen and hunters of the Terrell County area are reminded of a meeting to be at the courthouse Saturday night at 8:00 to discuss game laws and game conservation practices. Officials of the Texas Game and Fish Commission will be on hand to lead the discussion.

It was pointed out that many of the game laws for this area are under regulatory power of the Game Commission and that laws could be passed upon the recommendation of the ranchmen and hunters to change existing laws.

Stated for discussion Thursday night is the possibility of extending the season and bag limit on javalinas.

Reininger Retires From Railroad Duty

John Reininger, T&NO engineer, retired from the service on June 5 after more than 38 years of continuous service with the railroad.

He went to work on January 28, 1919, in El Paso as a fireman. He was promoted to locomotive engineer in 1939. Mr. Reininger stated this week that most of his work had been out of Sanderson with the exception of ten years, from 1943 to 1953, when he worked out of Del Rio. He also stated that he was very happy over the fact that he had not been involved in any serious accidents during the time of service.

Mr. Reininger had two years of military service in World War I, serving one year with the Army of Occupation in Germany. He was married to Mrs. Reininger on February 5, 1938. They have no children.

They bought their home here almost two years ago, moving here from Del Rio and planning at the time to spend their retirement years in Sanderson.

Mr. Reininger's retirement came without any special ceremony or occasion. After a run had been completed, he and Mrs. Reininger concluded that the time had come when both were unhappy over the fact that he was away from home so much and they could enjoy going places and doing things together if he could be at home more, according to his statement Tuesday.

Reininger is active and in good health.

Cleaning Project Underway By Pct. 1 Commissioner

A clean-up of the alleys and streets has been under way here for several weeks by employees of Precinct 1 Commissioner F. M. Weigand. The work includes the cutting of weeds in alleys, on sidewalks and in bar ditches of the town, grading shoulders of the paved streets and filling in asphalt breaks, re-working corner rakes, and moving rocks and trash from alleys and sidewalks, and the like.

The work has made a noted improvement in the appearance of the town.

Any citizen who has any refuse or trash on their premises they wish hauled off, is asked to put the trash at the alley, near their garbage disposal barrels and the accumulation will be hauled off as soon as possible.

Steve Stumberg Elected Wool Bureau President

S. L. Stumberg was elected chairman of the Wool Bureau, Inc., at a meeting of the organization in New York City last week. He is a past president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Assn., a director of the National Wool Growers Assn., a member of the American Wool Council and a director of the Wool Bureau. He has long been active and interested in wool production and marketing on an international basis.

The Bureau's program, sponsored by American and Dominion wool growers, seeks expansion of wool markets. The Bureau has as its program for the coming year, the expenditure of one and one-quarter million dollars in advertising wool to the nation, \$400,000 of which would be spent in consumer advertising in national periodicals.

A guest of Mr. and Mrs. Stumberg this week is William Ball, chairman of the Australian Wool Board, a member of the Wool Bureau, who is visiting offices of that organization in the United States prior to leaving for Japan, India and the Far East on a similar mission.

The Haleys had been in that city for two weeks and the little girl, who had been ill most of her life, had seemed to show improvement in the last few weeks, according to letters received from them by relatives.

The body was brought back to Sanderson in an O. T. Sudduth Funeral Home coach Wednesday night. Mrs. Raymond Phillips of El Paso, who was visiting here, went to Truth or Consequences with Mr. Sudduth to accompany her brother-in-law and sister back to Sanderson.

Besides the parents, survivors include a sister, Mrs. Warren Beaver, of Kermit; the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Haley; the maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lizzie Billings; also several uncles, aunts and cousins.

Funeral services are planned for Friday afternoon at 4 at the Methodist Church.

'Certified Mail' Service Available

A new mail service called "Certified Mail" became effective on June 7, according to an announcement made this week by Postmaster Clyde Griffith. This is a variation of the registry service. The Post Office Department believed that there was a need for a varying service whereby a patron could simply get proof of delivery without having to pay for the expense of guarding registered mail at every handling point.

The certified service will be used for first class mail for which no indemnity value is claimed. A charge of 15c in addition to regular postage will be made. For the usual fee of 7c a return receipt may be obtained for certified mail.

There are many instances where the registry service is used solely for the purpose of being able to obtain a record of the receipt of mail. The use of the certified service will accomplish this purpose and at the same time relieve the patron of paying the higher registration fee. Special delivery and air mail will apply to this service as well as regular first class mail. The post office employees will be glad to explain more fully the service to patrons who are interested.

representatives of the industry of many countries of the world.

Terrell County is proud to honor above as one of its natives and to recognize his efforts in the best of his endeavors.

It's not just every sheep head who has the opportunity to meet with such big shots and talk over such big business as does Luke, and we congratulate him on his accomplishments.

Tourist traffic is definitely on the climb in recent weeks. One of our greatest industries is in the highway traffic. Courts, cafes and service stations here have had a noticeable up-trend and indications are for more yet to come.

A report from the Big Bend National Park shows that more than 26,000 visitors were registered in the past five months. As time goes on, this section of Texas highways is able to show results from efforts being expanded by the Highway 90 Association and the work of Pete Koch, executive vice-president of the organization, who is devoting his entire time to this work and his contacts have brought results.

There will be a meeting of the association at Seguin Sunday, at which time new officers will be named for the group. President E. F. Pierson has done his part as the state's great service in his unselfish devotion to the promotion of increased travel on this way.

New steps are being taken by the local Chamber of Commerce, representing the citizenship of Terrell County, to halt the proposed terminal move. Brotherhood officials are in negotiations at this time with the T&NCO Railroad, and legal steps on the part of citizens will cause considerable burdens for the company if they persist in continuing their plans to move the local terminal. It is altogether possible that a trial court will consider testimony as presented.

If that is done, there is no doubt as to the outcome. There will not be bundles of testimony laid to one

side without being considered. Then, this, personal friendships, southern positions, etc., will not be very effective, and will not have the curative powers to restore health overnight as was the case in the recent Railroad Commission hearing, as reported by those who sat in on the hearings.

Big Bend Park News

Travel to the Big Bend National Park totaled 4,387 visitors for the month of May, all traveling to the park via private automobile. For the first five months of the year, the park visitors totaled 25,849 people. Heavy use was made of the park campgrounds by school groups from all the nearby cities.

All of the grading work on Todd Hill has been completed and the surface has been well graded. This is especially important as the extremely steep grade over Todd Hill has been eliminated and it is now possible for cars towing large trailers to travel over this section of the roadway without difficulty.

Work continues on the Oak Springs-Basin water system and it is hoped that this project can be completed at an early date. The extension of the water system at Park Headquarters — Panther Junction — will be initiated in the near future. This extension will provide water needed for the headquarters area and will eliminate the hauling of this water by truck.

It is planned to spend several thousand dollars on the reconstruction and repair of trails in the

Chisos Mountains this summer, particularly the trail to the South Rim area. This money is in the appropriation bill and will become available July 1. Also, funds will be allotted for the construction of roads and utilities to build a seasonal employees area at Panther Junction where tents and trailers can be utilized for temporary housing.
