3.19 Inches Rain **Falls in June**

The good rain of Sunday afternoon brought the total rainfall in Sanderson for June to 3.19 inches. according to the gauge at The Kerr Mercantile Company. Sun av's rain totalled 1.55.

During the month, rains have ome over the entire county with some areas more favored than others but it seems that the fiveyear drouth has an opportunity to be broken

The areas visited by hail and heavy rainfall have suffered some damage by stock being drowned. corrals and pens washed away, broken window panes, brush stripped and cars damaged.

Last Thursday afternoon, 21 window panes were broken at the W. R. Stumberg ranch including their home that had only recently been remodeled and redecorated. Some damage was also done to the roof and water damage resulted.

The Fort Stockton road was washed out again Thursday, repaired that afternoon and Friday morning, to be washed out again Sunday afternoon when what was said to be "the most water yet" came down the canyon and did severe damage to the road bed.

These washouts were at the ranch turn-off on US285.

In this age of science and technotogy the education profession of America, and the American citneed for "thinkers" as well as "doers". This was the essence of a thought-provoking and stimulating Commencement address at Harding College by Dr. Samuel Miller Brownell, United States Commissioner of Education, Since his words were directed not only to Harding graduating class, student body and faculty, but to the nation as a whole, I wish to pass them along to this column's widespread audience.

The effectiveness of education would seem," said Dr. Brownell. "to depend in a large measure on how well it fulfills its basic reaponsibilities to strengthen good citizenship, to keep alive and to transmit the best of mankind's cuitural heritage, to provide some understanding of the scientific bases of modern life, and to teach the student how to think as well as pursue the quest for the good life - the end product of all education. All schools and colleges whatever their origin, or however supported - share in the obligation to meet our national needs in the wave that fit them best."

Speaking particularly of specislication in education, Dr. Brownell saked: "Where, in this intense time-consuming effort to master a special field, is there going to be phy, for reflection? How are we going to find men and women who un see what they do in relation what others do: who can form belanced judgments; who are public of cutting through to the eart of the matter; who can find the simple truth and recognize it

There is grave danger that we will, as a nation, lose our way in a labyrinth of formulas, figures, and facts, that we will bog down n a sea of technical problems. I say this because it seems to me that almost every major technical advance treates a pholosophical



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
