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LISTEN TO LUKE

Editor's Note: — In order to be a source of information for the reader we have tried to find a source of information for the reader we could know the truth and things about some of the things that have come into our minds. The source of information which is reliable is "An Introduction to Municipal Corporation Organization in Texas" and is out by the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Texas. The book is not quoting because the average layman many lawyers could not understand that, but by its own admission is a chart for the average citizen to lay a meaningful case through the multitude of rules concerning organization municipalities.

One of the best types of government, according to this book, for all cities, is the Mayor-Aldermanic Form. From the book we take the following:

Any city or town containing 50 or more inhabitants may incorporate under the mayor-aldermanic form of government, with the powers and privileges of the 28th of the Revised Civil Statutes, (Vernon's Texas Statutes, Art. 966.) To initiate the incorporation procedure, it is required that at least fifty qualified voters file an application with the county judge asking him to call an election for the purpose of submitting the question to a vote of qualified electors. Satisfactory proof that the community contains more than 50 inhabitants must accompany the application, together with the name, the boundaries, and a plat of the proposed municipality.

If the county judge is satisfied that the application complies with the statutes, he calls an election and appoints an officer to preside over it. The election is held after previous public notice of ten days which may be met by posting notice at three public places in the municipality. Any person who has resided within the limits of the proposed city or town for the six preceding months, and who is a qualified voter under state law, is entitled to vote at the election. Within ten days after the election, a majority of the votes cast favoring incorporation, the officials in charge make a return of the results to the county judge, and he calls, within twenty days, an election upon the record books of the incorporators' court that the inhabitants are incorporated within the boundaries set out. A certified copy of his entry, together with the plat of the city or town, is thereupon recorded in the proper record books of the county.

The judge next calls an election for the purpose of electing the officers of the newly incorporated municipality. After the election returns have been made, the county judge commissions the candidate who received the highest number of votes for the office of mayor and delivers certificates of election to the other officers.

The government of the city consists of the city council composed of the mayor and two aldermen in each ward, or if the city is divided into wards, a mayor and five aldermen. Other officers are the treasurer, assessor and collector, secretary, city attorney, marshal, and city engineer, all elected for two-year terms, and other officers as the city council may direct. The offices of assessor, assessor and collector, secretary, and city engineer are dispensed with by ordinance and their duties conferred on other officers.

The population in cities below 500 may by ordinance the office of marshal and impose his duties on any other officer of the city.

From the legal point of view, the mayor's position in mayor-aldermanic government is not a particularly strong one. His appointing power is limited by the requirement for confirmation by the council and he has virtually no independent power of removal. The council is authorized to remove the mayor for incompetence, corruption, misconduct or malfeasance in office, after notice and a hearing, and it may also remove the mayor "elected" by it by the passage of a resolution declaring of its want of confidence. The mayor is empowered to inspect the books of all subordinate officers of the city and to cause all violations of duty to be punished. He is designated the chief budget

WINK PUSHES EAGLES IN 32-7 WIN; FORT STOCKTON FRAY HERE FRIDAY NITE

The Wink Wildcats took a 32-7 win over Sanderson in their game here last Friday night. The Wildcats kept a full head of steam throughout the entire game and Sanderson displayed one of their best games of the season in holding Wink to 32 points while making only seven points for themselves. Wink was the high favorite in the game, but the Eagles showed an exceptional ability at both offensive and defensive play to give the Wildcats a run for their money.

Wink tallied early in the first quarter on a pass from Carmen to Donnie Hatcher good for a 35-yard TD. The extra point was not good.

In the second frame Pitts scored for Wink from the 2-yard line and Dodd kicked the extra point. Another pass from Carmen to Hatcher connected for a 48-yard gain to pay dirt and Blackstock converted the extra point.

In the second half Leland Jaynes made a good 48-yard run for their fourth score and the extra point try failed.

In the fourth frame Hatcher intercepted an Eagle pass and ran 35 yards for a touchdown and the extra point try again failed.

Wink was penalized only 10 yards while Sanderson drew 25 yards in penalties.

The local fans witnessed an excellent type of play from the local boys who were on top in both defensive and offensive work. The line blocked excellently for the Eagles on most plays and the backfield was at their best in tricky ball handling.

Local fans and football players who participated in last year's game with Fort Stockton will be trying to boost the Eagles in retaliation of the 52-0 beating handed out by the Panthers last year.

officer and is under duty to prepare a budget for council consideration.

The mayor has the power to summon meetings of the city council, and he may communicate information and recommend measures to the council. He presides at all council meetings and is given a casting, or deciding, vote in all matters except elections. All ordinances and resolutions adopted by the council are placed, before they take effect, in the office of the city secretary. The mayor signs those which he approves and returns to the council, with his objections, those he disapproves. The council may reconsider the ordinance or resolution upon the vote by which it was originally passed and, if a majority of the whole number of aldermen agree to enactment, it shall be in force. If the mayor fails to approve or to reject during a period of three days after the ordinance or resolution has been placed in the secretary's office, it then goes into effect.

In those communities where the government is commonly regarded by the citizens as a strong mayor or type, it is probably due in large measure to the mayor's wise use of his powers together with the exercise of a great amount of personal influence. Despite the limitations on his authority, the mayor may, through his personal influence, direct in a very real sense the city's administrative affairs and play a leading role in the shaping of municipal policies.

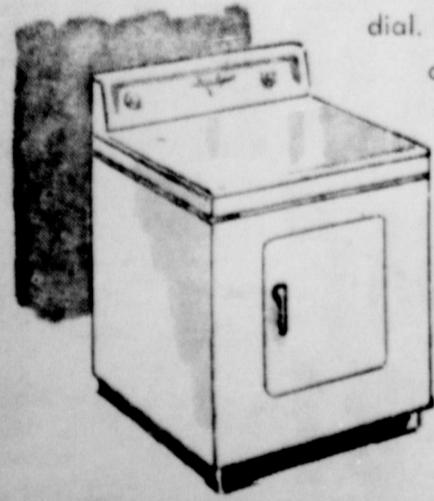

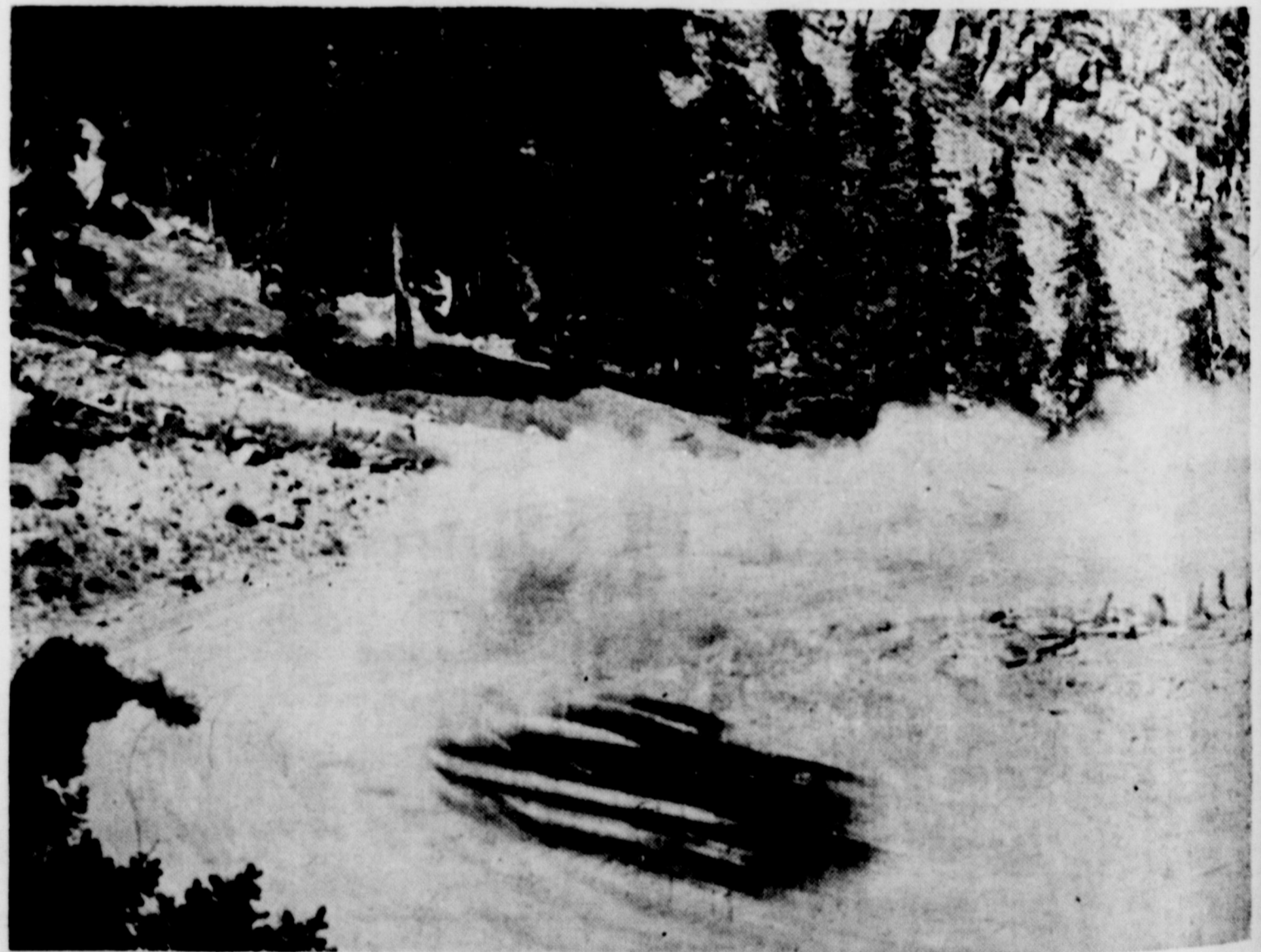
