

Frontier Stew Has A New Type Topping

Those Davy Crockett fans will go for Frontier Stew in a big way. So how about it? When it's chow-time at your house, why not greet your active family this savory Frontier Stew and its extra special topping?

INGREDIENTS 4 cup plus 1 tablespoon cook

1 lb. stew beef cut in 1" cubes 14 cup water 1 No. 303 can tomatoes slices)

cup carret slices bay leaves teaspoons salt teaspoon black pepper 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce cup uncooked white rice

2 eggs 11/2 cups grated American cheese teaspoon black pepper sh of Tabasco sauce

METHOD: Melt the fat in a skillet. Thoroughly cover the beef with flour. Brown the beef in the fat. Blend one tablespoon of flour into the fat. Slowly stir in the water. Add the tomatoes onion, carrots, bay leaves, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Mix well. Cover and cook over a low heat 1 hour or until the meat is tender. Add more water thinner mixture is desired About 20 minutes before the beef is done, put the rice, salt and in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes. 



Under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953, 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissable to this country. Recent figures slightver 43,000 have obtained sponsors and have migrated to the United States.

Of this number it is estimated that less than 500 have been brought to Texas.

A sponsor is required to give as urance that the refugee will be provided with employment and housing and will not become public charge.
