LISTEN TO LUKE

That promises to be one of the highly contested elections in the history of Terrell County will be settled at the polls here Saturday.

There has been little discussion on the subject to be decided—whether or not the citizens of Sanderson want to incorporate the town. The ballot is and the time required for will be short indeed for the "Corporation" and "No incorporation" without the squares on the ballot is all there is. It will require that each voter scratch out the word he doesn't want to vote for, leaving the words that are his choice.

This issue has some staunch supporters and it has some just as staunch who are opposing it. A columnist has not, to this point, indicated which side he takes. Not because we don't want to take a stand—we usually take some stand on any question. When there is a matter affecting the well-being of our community, it is most generally a question which can easily determine itself in the mind of this voter as to its merits. In this case, however, there are so many arguments that it is one must necessarily be determining the individual voters.

On such a question as this, there is a clear-cut line of separation and little could be said that would change the mind of any voters, since predetermined opinions have been made for a long time.

There was a paid advertisement last week's Times which caused this office to get several phone calls to assure us that the statements were, in some cases, misleading. We have no way of determining the intent of the writer did we have the right to tell whether he or she was lying. If the intent of the ad or other ad is considered slanderous, then we would refuse to take money for the ad. We, and all other newspapers, reserve that right. But we are not going to try to control the intent of any legitimate advertiser.

For do the opinions expressed in an advertisement necessarily represent our own.

There has been some talk about the county officials would do would not do, depending on the outcome of the election Saturday. As far as we know, they have not approached and we would not expect them to make a commitment beforehand. We believe that duly elected officials want to what they think their constituents would want. Certainly, we feel they would expect to abide the wishes of the majority of citizens who placed them in offices of trust.

Freezing Weather And Frost Hit Here

Three nights of below-freezing temperatures have come on the heels of the cold norther which blew into Sanderson Sunday evening with a dust storm. Temperatures began to drop with the first wintry blasts from the north. Clear weather has prevailed but temperatures did not rise very far above freezing all day Tuesday with a cold wind out of the south coming up late in the morning.

Dismal skies late Tuesday afternoon signified more cold weather. Wednesday dawned cold and foggy and skies cleared somewhat during the day, but in the afternoon heavy fog rolled in, completely blanketing the area.

Light showers were reported east of Dryden and some mist fell in Sanderson Wednesday.

A heavy frost was noted Tuesday morning, the first frost of the season.

D. A. Pollard Makes Last Engineer Run

D. A. Pollard made his last run as a locomotive engineer Monday morning on Train No. 6 into Del Rio. He had completed more than 44 years of service with the railroad.

Pollard began his railroad career as a fireman on October 5, 1911. He became an engineer on December 19, 1916 and has been a passenger engineer since 1939 when he moved to Del Rio from Sanderson.

He has worked in El Paso, Sanderson and Del Rio and was working out of the latter city at the time of his retirement.

Pollard completed 44 years of almost perfect record with the T&NO, with no serious accidents and never having been confined to a hospital for illness or injury during his railroad career.

Mr. Pollard's retirement came one day before his 69th birthday. He was born in Shelby County, Ky., on November 29, 1886, and was married to Miss Margaret Gaines in Louisville, Ky., in 1909. They came to West Texas the next year. The Pollards have one son, Melvin, and six grandchildren who reside in Marshall. The grand-children are: Francis and Margaret; David, Tommy, Roger and William.

Mrs. Pollard honored her husband Monday, entertaining with an open house from 4 to 8 p. m. in their home in Del Rio, the affair coming as a surprise to Mr. Pollard.

One hundred and eighty-five guests called during the party hours, including their son, Melvin, and the youngest grandson, William, of Marshall.

To symbolize his service, for the table centerpiece a map of Texas showed a track across the state. The tiny engine was marked with the numerals 1911, and the caboose with 1955, signifying the time of service.

A companion piece, on the buffet, signifying Mr. Pollard's future, depicted a miniature man fishing beside a little lake.

Bronze and gold mums decorated the home for the open house.

Backers of the incorporation say that various progressive steps for the City of Sanderson are possible only under incorporation and are interested mainly, they say, in the equal distribution of financing the local fire department, lower fire insurance rates, traffic safety measures and general progress available under a self-government by a city.

They are quick to point out that there is no major expenditure anticipated or expected and that any such proposal would first have to be approved by a vote of the qualified property owners. They also advocate no passage of laws affecting present construction or improvements to wiring, utilities or sewage disposal.

Concerning taxes, the backers of incorporation, as well as those opposing, are aware of the fact that it will take money to merely operate a city government, without any major or minor progressive steps, but those favoring the proposition do not advocate, they say, heavy tax burdens on the property owners, and advise that any question concerning valuation is an open hearing that can be attended by the populace to favor or oppose any valuation set or increase proposal.

The citizens opposing the move are of the opinion that undue strain may be placed on the property owners of Sanderson because of taxes, and oppose the legislation of what they feel to be unnecessary ordinances controlling building, wiring, utilities, sanitation and sewage controls that could possibly be passed, plus the unfavorable outlook of the feasibility of the possibility of the purchase of public utilities and possible increase in taxes because of major expenditures warranting the issuance of bonds.

LIGHT POWER



SP's new gravity switching yard at Houston sounds like science fiction. On this mammoth maze of tracks, freight shipments routed through Houston to and from the Southwest and West, are handled with speed and uncanny accuracy. The wizard hands of electricity, radar and electronics do a giant's share of the work, putting together freight trains day and night, under any conditions of visibility.

Men are important in the act, too, but the system of automatic control—called automation—is the astonishing thing. It is part of the drama of modern railroading—of the progressive ways and means sought by Southern Pacific to bring the Southwest and West finer freight and passenger train service. The pictures below show you how radar and an electronic brain team up to improve this vital yard operation.

- 1 Cars from incoming freight trains are uncoupled and nudged one at a time over the crest of a small artificial hill, called the "hump."
- 2 Towerman "orders" each car to its scheduled track position in yard through an automatic switching system, which times and sets switches ahead of car.
- 3 Starting its roll downhill, the car is clocked for speed by radar and is automatically weighed. Speeds vary, depending on loads and other factors.

- 6 ...so that it will roll to its near or remote destination in the switching yard and there couple smoothly and safely into a newly formed train.
