approval. Plans are to install mercury-arc amps on Oak Street from just vest of the power plant west of town, to the east end of the bridge across Sanderson Canyon on the vest side of the Newberry Addition of Sanderson. Radial type lights, the type now used here. will be installed from the bridge east to the Rhoades' Machine

The mercury-arc lamps are rated at 21,000 lumens as compared to the 4,000 lumen rating of the present radial-type lamps. There will be one of the lights on each corner of Oak Street where previously designated.

The company also stated they would install a light on every corner in Sanderson beginning west of the bridge east of Newberry Addition north to the John Reininger home, west to the W. E. Stavley home, and then south one block, and west to the football field and south to Oak Street.

There are at present, lights on the corner at Persimmon and Downie, First and Downie and Second and Downie.
