Negative Report Received Here By Dog Bite Victim

State Department of Health was received last week by E. F. Pierng dog bites to three men here on Wednesday of last week.

The dogs' heads were shipped to the Austin laboratory and the report on the tests was received last week-end.

Several people of the community were under the impression that the tests had been reported as positive and were taking precautions to keep their dogs up and out of possible danger of rabies ontact.

Previous reports of the rabies incidence in this area by the Texas State Health Department indicated that there had been al most no trace of rabies in domes tic or wild animals in this immed iate vicinity. They warned at the same time, however, against an in different attitude on the part of the citizens of this area, since the disease could spread to this area in a very short time without unisual circumstances.

Unwanted animals, like those which were destroyed last week being abandoned in a town or area could spread the disease rapidly if the abandoned animals had ra-

bies, it was pointed out. Local citizens are cautioned of the danger of abandoning animals er taking in those that have been abandoned.

Any stray dogs noted in the area should be reported to the proper authorities so that they may be disposed of, it was point-

ed out. One of the more serious effects i stray dogs is their harm to livestock of the area. A roaming dog can kill many sheep in a few days and, with the lambing season begun recently, their harm to the small animals is tremendous and a costly thing for the ranchmen who have places near town and







World's Largest Shovel For Coal Mine



Ninety tons of earth in one tremendous bite is the capacity of the largest power shovel in the world. Built by the Marion Power Shovel Company at a cost of more than two and a half million dollars, the Goliath of earthmovers is equipped with Timken tapered roller bearings in all its hoist sheaves that lift the loaded dipper and its swinging machinery which revolves the machine. Timken bearings are also used extensively in the shove a maintenance craner

It will be used in a strip mine operation in southern Ohio by the Hanna Coal Company to lift ninely leet of earth or overburden from stop a five-foot coal vein. Builders of the gigantic machine say that it consumes enough electric power to supply 5,200 homes or to power a modern ocean freighter with an 80-foot beam and six hundred sixty feet in length.

Two big pulleys at the end of the shovel's boom, which turn on four Timken bearings, carry loads up to half a million pounds. The monster shovel is so large that it uses a permanently installed auxiliary Timken-bearing-equipped crane for the sole purpose of lifting parts and supplies and an overhead traveling crane for maintenance use. Another feature of the Hanna Company's strip mining power shovel is a small elevator used to transport the operator and main-tenance men up to the shovel's cabin. The big Timken bearings in the machine will easily handle the tremendous loads imposed upon

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
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
