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Parents Visit And Teach Classes For Public School Week

Texas Public Schools Week was observed here last week for the three days that the classes were in session. Visitors were present for class periods in all of the schools. A large number was also present for the assembly period on Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock in the high school auditorium when the program was presented by the pupils of the seventh grade. Teaching duties were assumed by parents in many of the classes and proved to be an interesting experience for the parents as well as the teachers and pupils. At the Lamar School, 47 parents registered, 188 in the elementary school, and 64 in the high school.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE ON SCHOOL PLAY GROUND AREA

The meal, served and prepared by members of the Sanderson Garden Club, consisted of baked ham, sweet potatoes, English peas, fruit salad congealed, apple pie and coffee, with hot rolls and butter. The tables were decorated in white cloths with balloons in blue and gold, the Lions Club colors, spaced down the center of the table, with the speakers table, the base of the U-shaped arrangement, having as its centerpiece a miniature United States and Lions Club flag in a holder. 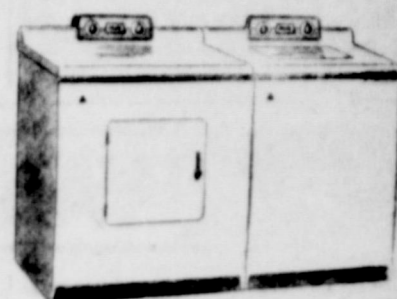

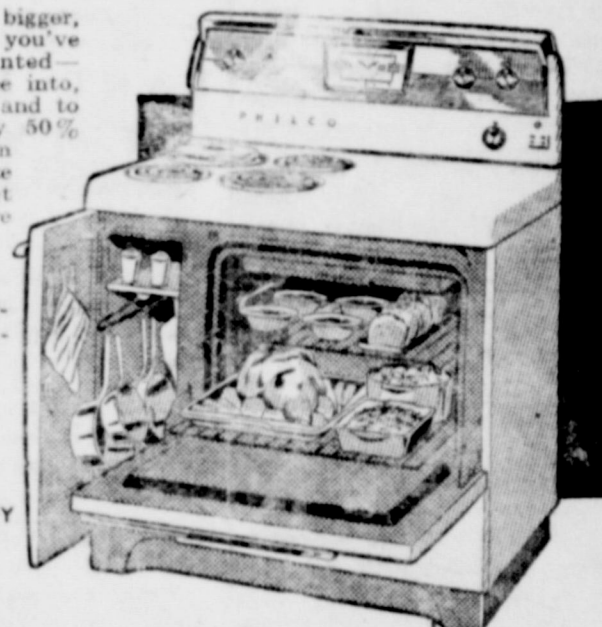

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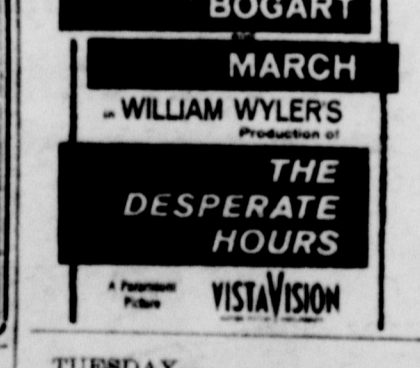
