Employers Warned Of April Deadline

Several thousand Texas employers are apparently letting a new tax deadline of April 30 creep up unheeded, the Texas Employment Commission warned today.

After that date the employers of four or more people in twenty weeks during the last half of 1955 face possible penalties if they have not filed wage returns with the TEC and paid unemployment taxes for January, February and

Forms are available at any local TEC office, the warning added, or can be secured by writing the Texas Employment Commission at Austin.

Those who had four or more people employed for as many as twenty weeks of last year became subject to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Program this year. Previously, only employers of eight or more had been affected.

In news releases and by direct mail, the TEC has tried to contact the 30,000 employers who are liable for payroll taxes in 1956. The beginning tax rate is three per cent - 2.7 per cent going into the cent is collected by the Federal Government for administrative purposes. A lower rate is possible using the employer's experience as a basis for reduction.

Applications For Wool Payments Due April 30

1956, are eligible for incentive payments this year, provided the application is in the mail by Apri! 30, according to word received last week

Payments this year, explains A B. Wooten, extension economist will apply to wool sales made fter March 31, 1955, and before April 1, 1956, and for which application is mailed by April 30, 1956.

Wooten urges wool growers !c be especially careful to provide the required sales record in submitting applications for incentive payments. For shorn woo!, the sales record must show the name and address of the buyer, date of sale, name and address of the producer, the net weight of wool sold. and the net proceeds to the producer after normal deductions.

In the case of lambs and year, lings sold or slaughter unshorn, the application must be accompanied with a bill of sale giving name and address of slaughterer he seller and the number, decription, and net live weight of the animals sold. The applicant must have a certification from the buyer that the animals were bought for slaughter and that have owned the animals for at least 30 days before selling them for slaughter.

Both Shivers and Johnson have been recommended as chairman each by a different faction -Shivers by the conservatives, and Johnson by the liberals.

Mrs. H. H. Weinert of Seguin is the "dove of peace" between versy. She is Texas' Democratic National Committeewoman.

She predicts that the state con vention will end up with two delegations to the national convention unless Shivers, Rayburn and Johnson get together soon.

Meanwhile a full-fledged cam. paign is under way by Johnson boosters, for his nomination as Texas' favorite son candidate for President Prominent Texans aligned with the movement in clude Speaker Rayburn, Vice President John Nance Garner, Former Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, and Former Congressman Lloyd Bentsen, Jr.

Shivers, who likes Johnson in the favorite son role, but not as head of the delegation, predicts that his conservative group will win out in the May 5 precinct, May 8 county, and May 22 state conventions. Liberals say that, should thi shappen, they will send a contesting delegation to Chicago in August.





Holle, Commissioner of Health, reports that tubercuolsis dropped from tenth place to eleventh and diabetes, a newcomer in the first ten, was in ninth place.


