Property Re-Evaluation Study Under Way By Citizen Group

Re-evaluation studies of all property in Terrell County is under way by group of citizens of the county and the county commissioners.

The purpose of the study is to present the information to the commissioners who act as a board of equalization.

Basically, the purpose of the study is to increase the tax income for local maintenance funds for the schools of the county. The move came after a recent report by school board officials to the commissioners of the situation of county school finances.

The re-evaluation study and the recommendations of the citizen groups will be heard by the commissioners and action will be taken where deemed necessary by that body in equalizing the taxes of county property owners.

The move is also planned to bring the tax structure and assessments and renditions up to date since it has been several years since such a survey has been made and it was deemed necessary to take into consideration the changes and alterations which affect the value of real property.

It was pointed out that the sur-

vey by the citizen group would not necessarily govern the action by the commissioners court in the capacity of a board of equalization, but that it would be a basis from which the group could work in their efforts to re-vamp the tax structure.

A survey has also been made of the ranch land of the county by the commissioners to see if some adjustments or changes are in order for equalization or alteration of the valuation in the county.

The commissioners plan to begin action on the tax picture of the county at their next meeting.

LIONS BROOM SALE TO BE FRIDAY

The Sanderson Lions Club members will make a house-to-house canvass all day Friday in efforts to sell wares to local housewives.

The project is planned to help "Lighthouse For the Blind" an organization which sponsors the sale of items made by blind people who have this as their only source of income, and also to bolster the coffers of the local organization.

The local Lions Club will retain 40 per cent of the gross profits and The Lighthouse for the Blind will get 60 per cent of the proceeds.

Items that will be sold include industrial and domestic sizes of mops and brooms, whisk brooms, cup towels, dust cloths, ironing board covers and pads, barbecue aprons, door mats in three sizes and child-size mops and brooms.

Housewives are asked to cooperate with the sponsoring club and support the project.

plans for integration and let them go easy. The Washington bosses of the liberalist factions have the Southerners on their knees and by the use of their big stick are forcing immediate integration.

And the organization of the liberal faction of the Democratic party in Texas supported such ideals in precinct conventions Saturday.

But we would rather think that the organized move was more a move against the personality of Governor Allan Shivers than a move in favor of subscribing to, the sanctioning of and the approval of the recent actions of Lyndon Johnson and his mouthpiece Sam Rayburn.

We, being conservatives, cannot understand how one who is interested in the welfare of the nation that has, up to now, provided him with the highest advantages of life and living in the world and in all ages, can pledge himself to any party which will make their position known only after they feel they have aligned sufficient votes to carry the general election.

The way things now stand, labor group, farm groups, industrial groups, no groups, save the liberals of each of the two parties, can accept the program of either party according to the promises they make, the promises they keep and their past actions.

Texas is buzzing with activity! Although political squabbles take the headlines, the state's general prosperity affects the average Texan's life more significantly.

In almost all areas — industry, construction, retailing and employment — the graphs are pointing up, up and up. General business activity hit a new record high — 4 per cent above 1955 and 6 per cent above the first quarter of last year.

Texas also is out in front in national comparisons. Estimates of gross national production show a 3 per cent rise for the first quarter of '56. Texas' rise was 4 per cent.

Retail sales in Texas were up 3 per cent over the first quarter of 1955. Department stores led with 5 to 10 per cent increases.

Texas' increase in industrial activity is regarded as the most significant factor in the overall picture. Business research experts believe that Texas will receive more than its proportionate share of the \$34,000,000,000 which industry is expected to spend nationwide on new plants this year.

Contractors are confident they are headed for a record year. April construction totaled \$88,000,000 —

an increase of \$21,000,000 over April of '55.

Employment followed the general upward trend. This, despite drought-crippled farm and ranch activity. Latest figures show 2,248,200 wage earners in March. That is 115,000 more than for March of last year.

Politics Is Boiling
In bitter precinct battles, Gov. Allan Shivers lost the first skirmish of his long political career. Sen. Lynon Johnson led all the way in the rural areas. He also won in San Antonio, Houston, Ft. Worth and Austin. Of the metropolitan areas, Dallas alone went for Shivers.

Just as the rural vote cost Ralph Yarborough the governorship in 1954, so did the small towns defeat Shivers in 1956. In the final analysis, it was the country boy's vote that was the nub of victory.

Farmers Get New Hope
Farmers over wide areas of Texas are full of optimism. Long-awaited rains, the heaviest in years, fell in North, Central and East Texas.

However, even where it rained, substantial moisture deficiencies have not been wiped out. But to many farmers and ranchers the wonderful rains that finally came made them look forward to a good year.

Sanford Cleared by Court
A decision with far-reaching effect on political advertising expenditures has been handed down by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The decision was made in connection with an application of Vernon T. Sanford, Texas Press Association manager, for relief from two indictments returned against him by a McLennan Co. Grand Jury. Indictments charged he had violated the Texas Election Code by spending more than \$25 for political advertising in behalf of Ben Ramsey for Lt. Governor in 1954.

Sanford and the TPA Board of Directors contended that any law

which limits an individual to a \$25 expenditure prohibits freedom of expression and therefore is unconstitutional.

In reviewing the matter, the court found that two laws on the same subject were in direct conflict. Each limited advertising to widely different amounts and set different penalties. Therefore both were declared invalid.

Result: Charges against Sanford were dismissed and Texas now has no applicable law regarding political advertising expenditures by an individual.

Labor Law at Stake
Attny. Gen. John Ben Shepperd was forced into the role of apprehensive spectator in the fight to save Texas' right-to-work law.

He asked, but was refused, U. S. Supreme Court permission to be heard. He did, however, lend moral support and advice as Nebraska's attorney general argued in the high court for his state's law.

Nebraska, like Texas and 16 other states, has an anti-closed shop law which unions contend is in conflict with the National Railway Act.

Reason for Shepperd's apprehension is the general belief that Nebraska's case is weaker than Texas' case, which still is tied up in the state court.

Bar Proposes Reforms
Three measures, aimed principally at limiting activities of lawyers in the legislature, are proposed by the State Bar of Texas: (1) Paying legislators' pay to \$50 a day for a 120-day session; (2) Prohibiting any legislator or candidate from appearing before any state agency; (3) Abolition of the automatic continuance of law suits for which legislators are employed as counsel.

Credit Insurance Rates Lowered
Texas credit insurance purchasers stand to save more than two million dollars a year as a result of rate changes made by the Insurance Commission. Rates were

reduced approximately 10 per cent by the Commission.

Vehicle Tax Voided
Special local automobile taxes to finance big city freeway projects are unconstitutional. So ruled the Texas Supreme Court in a case involving Harris County's auto registration tax.

Such taxes must be levied by general laws, said the court. Dallas County made two tries for such a tax, but voters turned down the proposals.

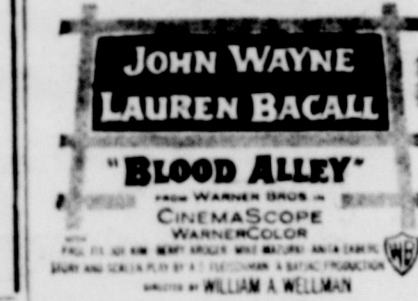
