## Tex Mooney Dies Saturday in California

Funeral services were held in Corona, Calif., Tuesday afternoon for Tex Mooney who died at his home in Norco, Calif., Saturday evening following a heart attack.

Mr. Mooney is a native of Sanderson. A son of O. T. Schupbach, O. T. Schupbach, Jr., he took the name Tex Mooney during his career as a Hollywood actor. He had been a resident of California for 14 years.

He was in charge of Ford carsmen in Uplands, Calif., at the time of his death.

He was born in El Paso on March 9, 1917. After graduation from the Sanderson High School he attended Sul Ross College and later played professional football and was at one time a professional wrestler.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Ruth Randolph Mooney, he is survived by a son, Tommy, age 12, and a daughter, Betty, age 14; also his father O. T. (Pard) Schupbach, and a sister, Mrs. W. E. Stavley, both of Sanderson. Mr. Schupbach was unable to attend his son's funeral but Mr. and Mrs. Stavley left Sunday morning for California after receiving word of his death Saturday night.

Rev. J. J. Spurlin, pastor of the Sanderson - Dryden Methodist Church, was transferred to Tatum, N. M., at the annual meeting of the New Mexico Conference in El Paso last week. Mrs. Spurlin and C. F. Cox accompanied him to the conference as lay delegates from the charge.

Rev. Spurlin and family came here two years ago from Melrose, N. M. The pastor of the Tatum church died two weeks ago, causing a vacancy. There is a new \$80,000 church in Tatum which serves an area where there is oil, irrigated farming and ranching.

Rev. James Alanao Willshire was ordained as an elder at the conference and appointed to the Sanderson-Dryden charge. With his wife, he is expected to arrive in Sanderson Friday and will hold services Sunday. They have been residing in Nebraska where Rev. Willshire was pastor of a church and attended a seminary in Colorado. His father, Rev. F. Lee Willshire, is district superintendent of the Alamogordo district.

## The Power of Memorial Day

by Dr. Norman Vincent Peale



I had the privilege of growing up in small Ohio communities in the early part of this century, and one of my most inspirational memories centers around Memorial Day and the old soldiers of the Civil War.

To me, Memorial Day was one of the most moving of all the national holidays. I was stirred by the speeches and martial music from the bandstand or cemetery on what we called "Decoration Day." There was something about the newness of life that the Spring had brought; soft sunshine falling on the fresh green grass of early summer, the misty hills in the distance, the sound of stirring national songs, and above all, the softly flapping flag in the gentle breeze as the speaker told us of our country, the deep devotion of its heroes, and recounted once more the stirring episodes of our heroic past.

And many a lazy summer afternoon, I sat on the coping around the old courthouse listening to the veterans of the Civil War tell of their experiences in the epic struggle between the States. A boy's imagination quickly sent him off behind long columns of blue or grey, and to him, such names as Antietam, The Wilderness, Shiloh, and Gettysburg became very real and meaningful.

Those old soldiers used to talk gratefully of Lincoln's insistence that those who had borne the heat of the battle and the burden of the struggle, the widow and the orphan, were to be given not charity, but their rightful due as the dependents of those brave men who had fought to preserve liberty and to keep the Union intact. It was regarded as a sacred duty of the nation, and the nation kept faith with its veterans.

In those days, as now, were many who had been disabled by the struggle. Their ability to compete in life had been reduced by wounds suffered in battle. Even as a boy I remember hearing how it seemed they were thought of only on such days as Memorial Day, when orators, fervent in their patriotism, remembered, if only for a day, the long continuing sacrifice made not by those who had died in battle, but by the disabled who were to live for many years following the great struggle.

The heroes of World War I and World War II and the Korean War are, of course, men who, with no concern for themselves, gave their lives that freedom might live. We can never do them adequate honor. And, we must never forget them. They died in their young life, forsaking the opportunities of the years that the rest of us might live and develop our highest hopes and dreams.

However, there are other living heroes who deprived themselves of either physical, emotional, or mental health for us and for their fellow countrymen. It would be as wrong for us to neglect or forget them as their buddies who today sleep on some Pacific Island or in a European cemetery. A hero dead or a hero maimed and disabled are both due our equal gratitude and our unceasing devotion.

We must never forget that the most effective way of honoring those who have died is to remember the living disabled, that their lives may be rich and full. They are a great asset to our country as the living embodiment of devotion to freedom. A country is recast indeed which does not everlastingly keep alive grateful appreciation to those who suffered disability to perpetuate everything that we Americans hold dear.

There could be no better time than on Memorial Day to resolve that we shall gratefully support the honored men and women who have suffered disability from the wars of the United States.

## REV. J. J. SPURLIN SPEAKS SUNDAY AT BACCALAUREATE

Rev. J. J. Spurlin, pastor of the Methodist Church, preached the sermon for the Baccalaureate service for the senior class of the Sanderson High School Sunday morning in the auditorium.

Choosing for his subject the Bible passage "Repent and be baptized for the kingdom of heaven is at hand", Rev. Spurlin referred frequently to the new age at hand now, with noticeable changes in business, politics, economics, military set-up, education, religion, etc. "You must have a new mind to meet the new age," he stated.

To meet the new age, will religion survive if we couch it in the terms of the past generation? Repent means re-think, look ahead, plan, dream, have new visions. You must have a new mind about God. The thing that will influence your life more than anything else is "What do I think about God. Are my thoughts adequate for this age?" Continuing, he stated, "What is God's idea about stewardship? Do you have a new mind toward other people? The new age must be an age of brotherhood. What would happen in Texas if half of the expenses for war were suddenly cut off? You must have a new mind toward sin, toward the new birth. Your mind must be big enough to think through the needs and requirements of the new age. Your thoughts about God and your attitude toward Him are the greatest things in your life."

Mrs. R. S. Wilkinson played the processional and recessional music for the service.

The invocation was given by Carroll Jackson, minister of the Church of Christ. Rev. John W. Eyrd, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, read the Bible passage, Matthew 6:24-34. Charles Matney directed the choir in the singing of three numbers, "All Hail the Power," "Holy! Holy! Holy!" and "Now Is The Hour". The benediction was given by Rev. Gene Medaris, pastor of the Baptist Church.

## LATE DEER SEASON, TWO LEGAL BUCKS TALKED AT MEET

Possible changes in the deer season and bag limit of Texas biggest game animal were discussed Tuesday night at a meeting at the court house. P. B. Uzzell, representative of the Wildlife Service; Warden Captain Williams and Game Warden Ted Wheelis were present to conduct the meeting and hear recommendations of area landowners pertaining to game laws and possible changes.

Only two local citizens were present at the meeting.

The proposed change of the deer hunting law will move the season back to December 8-16, both days inclusive and will permit killing one black-tail or mule deer and one white tail or two white tail deer in the Trans-Pecos area.

It was explained that the present season dates in late November, did not permit full benefit from the bucks of the area and thus was a restriction in efforts to raise more deer. It was also stated that the late season, purposely set during the running season, would permit a larger percentage of kill, thus keeping old bucks killed off and permitting better control of herds by getting use of bucks before season.

The reason for the two deer limit, it was explained, was to permit the killing of more white tails which have increased to surplus herds in some parts of the area. It will also encourage those who usually hunt the black tail to also go after a white tail without having to travel so far during the season.

It was definitely pointed out that ranchmen who desired could legally restrict the kill of hunters on his place if he so desired, limiting them to one buck only, regardless of species or limit the shooter to one buck only and of a particular species.

The recommendations of area landowners are sought by the representatives of the game department who, in turn, make recommendations of the game commissioners.



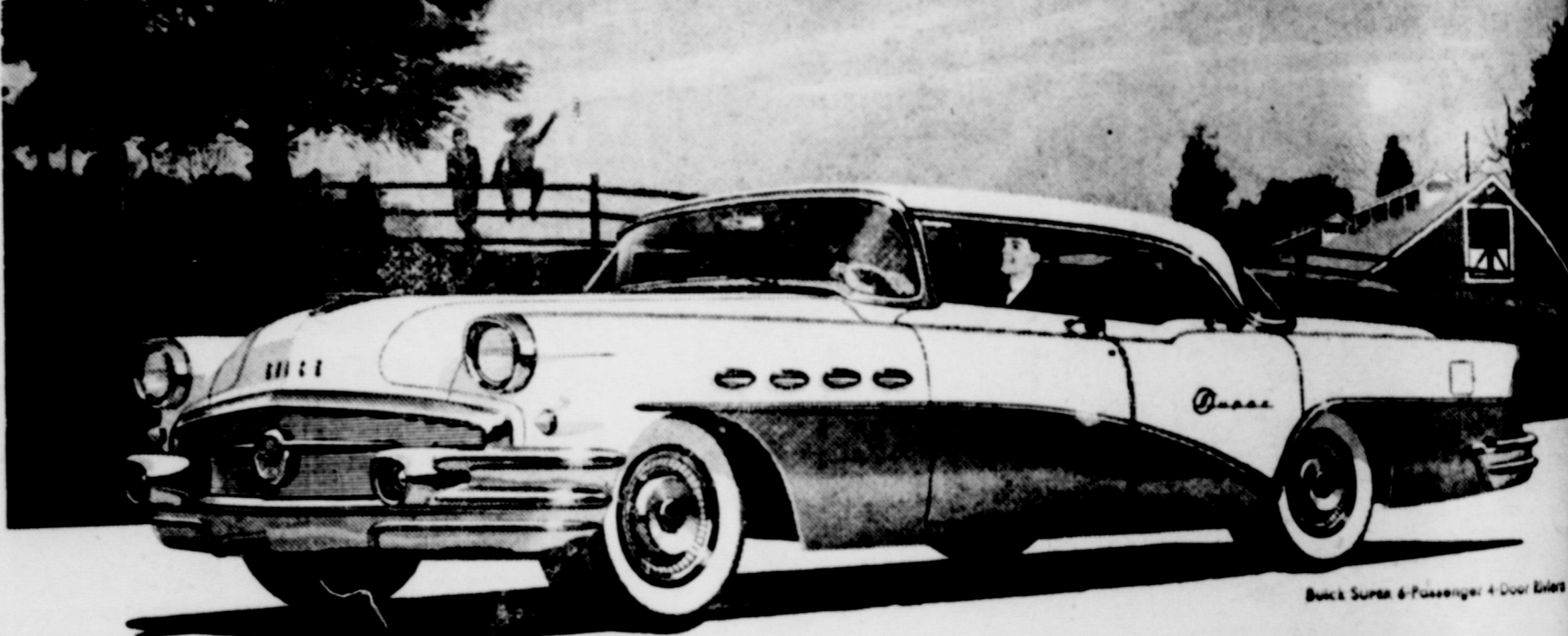
