Survey Shows Surplus Antelope for '56 Hunt weeks.

Austin - Herd counts now un derway indicate the antelope population West of the Pecos is sufficient to warrant an open season this fall, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission.

P. B. Uzzell of Alpine, wildlife biologist in charge of the aerial census scheduled for late June completion, reported to the Director that up to 500 buck antelope probably will be available for the proposed October harvest.

Whether the season will include surplus doe antelope will be determinated by the commission when it acts on the fall hunting H Conway, and family in Bryan cases reported because of the program at its July meeting.

Last year, hunters took less interposition of than one-half of the buck and doe antelope declared surplus West of the Pecos, said Uzzell. Permits were authorized for 1100 buck ante'ope and 250 doe antelope. The 590 persons obtaining the special licenses bagged 558 bucks and only 28 does.

After the hunting season failed o reduce the herds to the desired number, trapping crews moved in and transplanted approximately 600 head of antelope from ranches West of the Pecos.

Uzzell said 200 head were trapped from one ranch alone and that he current herd count showed this particular ranch still has surplus antelope which will be included in the proposed open season prospectus for this fall.

The Director of Wildlife Restor ation said recommendations have not been made yet on the Panhandle where an open season on buck entelope is considered likely.

Antelope license holders gener ally are determined thorugh a drawing for applicants held in the Commissions Austin office. Permit holders are entitled to one an-




