symptoms of insecticide poisoning. "Unless a man has the equipment and technical know-how, he ad better steer clear of organic phosphate insecticides. And he would do well to read the precautions on the label of any insectiside, regardless of ingredients. As further insurance against

ooisoning, Holle suggests: Keeping the insecticides out of

reach of children and pets, and keeping it in the original container, covered and with the warning label attached.

Never give insecticides to neighbor in an unmarked container. Write a warning in bold letters and personally attach it to the neighbor's bottle or can.
