Caution Issued In Insecticide Use Around Home, Pets

Austin — State health authorities have raised a red flag of caution against careless use of insecticide compounds around homes and gardens.

Besides being "tremendous agents for good" when used properly, the potent compounds can be fatal when absorbed through the skin or mucous membrane or when inhaled. Health Commissioner H. A. Holle said.

Only last week health department food and drug officials asked that a roach paste containing thallium be recalled from the market because its odor and taste made it attractive to children.

Two of the newer garden spray products — parathion and tetraethyl pyrophosphate — come from a group known as "organic phosphates" insecticides. They were originally designed for professional use only, by workmen thoroughly familiar with the dangers associated with them.

Now they are available in small packages or bottles which frequently reach the general public.

Dr. Holle urged persons who insist on using either of the two powerful formations to handle them as professionals do.

"They wear special protective clothing with goggles to keep spray from their eyes, and respirators approved for protection against organic compounds.

"They never smoke or eat until they have thoroughly washed after using the preparations, and they know the symptoms of insecticide poisoning."

Holle listed headaches, excessive sweating, giddiness, blurred vision, weakness, nausea, cramps, diarrhea, or chest discomfort as symptoms of insecticide poisoning.

"Unless a man has the equipment and technical know-how, he had better steer clear of organic phosphate insecticides. And he would do well to read the precautions on the label of any insecticide, regardless of ingredients.

As further insurance against poisoning, Holle suggests:

Keeping the insecticides out of reach of children and pets, and keeping it in the original container, covered and with the warning label attached.

Never give insecticides to a neighbor in an unmarked container. Write a warning in bold letters and personally attach it to the neighbor's bottle or can.

Flores Tells Of Boys' State Trip

To me Boys' State is the greatest program that I have attended. Boys' State is a plan of preparing young boys in the functional principles of citizenship. The main purpose of Boys' State is to teach the youth of today about our American form of government. Citizens of Boys' State learn how our government functions by actually performing the same work as the real officeholder of this state. The citizens at Boys' State organize their own city, county, and state government. Each boy that is elected to an office has to learn the duties of that city, county, or state office. A great many of the boys run for state offices such as governor or attorney general, even though very few get elected. But we all learned that if somebody didn't get elected for a certain office, it didn't matter that he had lost, as long as he had tried his best.

When I arrived at the University of Texas, where the Boys' State program is held, I didn't know a single boy there, but in thirty minutes I had met some of the nicest boys that I know. Almost all of the boys and counselors were always trying to help in any way they could. In the evenings when we had football or basketball games, all of the boys displayed wonderful sportsmanship and fair play. Many of the boys that I talked with told me that they were going to study religion, and when we had our assemblies, boys who were called on to give the benediction could all do it very easily. All of the boys that I met at Boys' State were honest, friendly and willing to help in any way they could. They were a swell bunch of boys.

During the first day there, the boys were divided into two political parties called the Longhorns and the Pioneers. Each boy was required to room with a boy from the opposite party. This is done to see if you can influence your roommate to change his mind and vote for your party. One of the most important lessons that we learned was that it was far more important to vote for the best person regardless of party affiliations than to support your party and elect somebody that is not as well qualified. Each boy was assigned to a city. I was assigned to Davis City and when we had our city election I ran for the house of representatives. I got elected into the House and was lucky to be in on some very heated discussions concerning different bills, one of which had to do with lowering the voting age from 21 to 18. This bill was defeated.

That afternoon campaign speeches were heard from boys seeking nominations to various offices. At night the final campaign speeches were given, and the two parties had their party primary voting. The next day both parties started campaigning against each other, each one trying hard to persuade the other to vote their way. The night before the final election everybody on the campus was in high spirits as each party

PARK VISITOR INCREASE CONTINUES IN SUMMER

Supt. George W. Miller announced this week that visitors to the Big Bend National Park totaled 12,664 for the month of July as compared with 11,252 for July of 1955, an increase of 1,412 persons. Travel through July this year totals 59,940 visitors as compared with 48,156 during the same period last year, or an increase of 2,784 visitors.

Overnight facilities were used by 2762 visitors during the month as compared with 2,425 in July of 1955, or an increase of 337 visitors. Visitors using the National Park Service campground totaled 2,632 for the month.

July weather conditions were very conducive to visitor enjoyment. Chisos Mountains daytime temperatures averaged in the high 80's and in the mid-60's at night. Moderate precipitation was recorded in most of the park during early and late July, ranging in total amount from one to two inches.

four-lane highway, had located and contracted for caliche and had contracted for water for the construction.

Stumberg stated that he was informed by Highway Department employees that the new highway would be a four-lane road.

The right-of-way through the Stumberg ranch at the present line is between 110 and 120 feet, but he stated that the wider right-of-way would be a uniform 180 feet and that the fence would be moved back to that distance. He stated that it was also his understanding that 180-foot-right-of-way had been purchased westward to Marathon through the Gage country.

The present plans, according to Stumberg do not extend eastward beyond the Brewster County line because the highway construction work east of that point is handled out of the Pecos district office and westward from there is out of the El Paso district office.

Stumberg stated that the contract letting was expected sometime this month or next month and his understanding was that grade work would begin soon.

There is no four-lane stretch now on US 90 in this area of the state, but considerable work has been under way in the Marathon flat area in widening structures and improving highway facilities and construction in that area.

There has been no move to purchase right-of-way for added facilities in Terrell County, according to possible information sources, but it would be reasonable to assume that such would be forthcoming in the near future if the information given to Mr. Stumberg is correct.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On At An Election To Be Held On November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44

Proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God.'"

The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God.'"

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On At An Election To Be Held On November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3

Proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction thereof may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge or magistrate in this State, provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Constitutional Amendment Voted On At An Election To Be Held On November 6, 1956.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows: Section 11. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God.'"

The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God.'"

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
