DRIVER EDUCATION COURSE OFFERED FOR SOME STUDENTS THIS SCHOOL TERM

The course will be a one-semester course and will allow one-half credit toward graduation. The course will be taught by Principal Thurman White who has the special certificate needed to teach driver education.

SHOWERS FALL ON PARTS OF COUNTY

Showers fell on some parts of this immediate area Monday afternoon late and Monday night.

Longfellow reported 91 inches Monday afternoon late and the rain extended south and east from there with C. F. Cox and Mrs. Mary Cox reporting good rains on almost all of their ranch country. Also S. L. Stumberg got some rain on his east and south pastures, and the C. W. Burdett ranch received some rain on the north side. Francis Mansfield is also reported having beneficial showers.

Light showers fell on the Roy Deaton ranch on the east side and from the Goldwire ranch north to the Guy Rachal ranch reported light showers with heavier rains reported in the central part of the county. None of the reports were more than 1 inch and from that down to a trace only.

Sanderson received a light sprinkle. Some rain fell east of Sanderson toward Dryden on Monday night, and early Tuesday morning very light showers were noted just east of town.

A heavy build-up of thunder heads every afternoon has kept up hopes of scattered showers in this area. Most of the thunderheads are coming from the west and north.

R. W. Davenport Funeral August 21 In San Antonio

Funeral services were held in San Antonio last Tuesday for Raymond William Davenport, 75, who died on August 17 at his home in that city. Burial was in Sabin.

Born January 31, 1881, on the Little Blanco ranch, north of Sabin, he was well known throughout West Texas as one of the real oldtime cowboys. For over 20 years he was the manager of the West-Pyle ranch west of Sanderson. On his retirement in 1944, he moved to San Antonio. He had been in failing health for the past seven and one-half years.

He was married to Mary Elizabeth Coleman in 1900. Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Frank Hunter, of San Antonio, two grand children and five great-grand children; also three sisters and three brothers. F. B. Pyle, Henry Scruggs and John Reisinger attended the funeral services from Sanderson.

Daniel Carries County in Light Vote



PRICE DANIEL holds slight edge

The light voting in Terrell County followed the trend of the July primary, but failed to produce the same turn-out in voters and the same results in precincts.

Precinct 1 which went for Daniel 227 to 206 for Yarborough in the primary, went 91 for Daniel to 111 for Yarborough in the run-off. County-wide Daniel received 277 votes in the primary to 230 for Yarborough. In the run-off Daniel got 142 votes to 128 for Yarborough, the difference in precinct 1 being made up in the relatively heavy vote in precinct 2 which, when supported by the small or weak voting strength of precincts 3 and 4, gave Daniel the edge in the over-all vote.

Final plans are being made by school officials for the opening of the 1956-57 school term in Terrell County.

With the school district still looking for two teachers, every effort is being made to fill the vacancies by the beginning of the term. The homemaking vacancy has existed most of the summer

Poor Dove Hunts Forecast Locally

Poor dove hunting in this area is forecast from the reports received from ranchmen of this immediate vicinity.

Reasons offered by some ranged from lack of proper and suitable feed to lack of water in surface tanks.

Doves were more than plentiful but fall in this area and deer hunters at that time forecast an abundant season for dove shooters. The doves at that time were wintering in headers and canyons on area ranches and the swarms of doves were noticed by hunters who were working headers in hope of jumping up a buck.

The heavy congestion of doves was also noticed in the early spring by ranchmen who were working their stock. It was predicted at that time that the birds would pair off early and get in a more-than-usual number of nestings prior to the season which opens Saturday.

Some scattered rains lately may have been responsible for scattering the birds, but the most likely answer is the birds' quest for better food supplies.

Laws permit a 10-bird bag limit per day and 10 possession limit. Shooting hours are from 12 noon to sundown.

Local Drivers Asked To Watch for Kids After School Opening

Local drivers are asked to begin observing extreme caution this week-end in preparation for the nine months of school which lie ahead. This caution is necessary due to the congestion of children around the school grounds during the school hours, especially at lunch and after school.

School officials will instruct the students in observing precaution in leaving the school ground, and teachers and students who come to school in cars will also be asked to park on the opposite side of the street from the school. This precaution possibly prevents a child from darting out from behind a parked car into the path of an approaching vehicle.

Signs will also be set up in the street before coming to an intersection of streets surrounding the school block. Walking lanes across the intersections and from the band house to the school will be marked.

Drivers are asked to use streets other than First and Second when possible in going home at noon especially, due to the congestion of students around the school ground at that time.

Austin — National party candidates have been decided. State Democratic primaries are over. Texas' political focus now shifts to the upcoming state Democratic convention.

Nervous tension is apparent in Liberal-Loyalist ranks. They are fearful of losing control of the September 11 meeting through the Conservatives' executive committee left in power last spring. That committee decides which of numerous contesting delegations will gain seats.

Navarro County Judge Jim Sewell, Liberal-Loyalist spokesman, asked recall of the "recessed" spring convention on the eve of the new convention.

It was apparently without hope. Permanent Chairman Raymond Buck of Fort Worth said he could see no reason for it. Executive Executive Committee Chairman George Sandlin termed the Liberal demands "the cry of the vanquished." He has promised all contestants a fair shake in credentials hearings.

U.S. Senator Lyndon Johnson may play a key role again. He has said he will be present. He assured Liberals in Chicago that he will use his influence to install leaders who will work for party victory in November.

Sheffield Gets 10 Years
B. R. Sheffield of Brady is the

second person to be convicted in the veterans land scandals. Sentence was assessed at 10 years.

Former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles is now serving a six-year sentence.

A Lubbock district court jury found Sheffield guilty of passing a forged instrument. No conviction was sought on the second count of aiding a notary public in making a false acknowledgment.

Prediction was made, meanwhile, that the state may end up making a profit instead of losing money from its veterans land troubles.

D. S. Meredith, assistant attorney general in charge of civil recovery suits, voiced the opinion.

Losers in the suits filed by the state are being required to return the money paid to them by the state plus three per cent interest. Texas, however, pays only 2 1/2 per cent interest on the bond issues which financed the \$100,000,000 lending program.

Recoveries now total roughly \$1,800,000.

New Drought Plan Ready
A new drought aid plan now is ready to help Texas ranchers and farmers buy roughage for live stock.

Applications for roughage should be filed with County Farmers Home Administration offices. If determined eligible by the local FHA committee, the farmer is issued certificates valued at \$7.50 a ton. Certificates may be applied on the purchase of roughage from any dealer.

Another phase of the expanded federal relief program also is moving forward. Texas Drought Emergency Committee has recommended that 106 counties be made eligible for increased aid in grain buying.

At present farmers in 185 coun-

ties may get \$1 for each 100 pounds of grain bought for livestock feed. If approved by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, the 106 counties would receive 50 cents extra per 100 pounds.

Water Test Case Slated

Texas water laws will be tested in a suit filed by the state in behalf of 15 domestic and livestock users in South Texas.

Suit was filed by the State Board of Water Engineers in district court at Karnes City. It seeks to protect riparian owners along Cibolo Creek from with draws by irrigators. Hearing is to begin Wednesday.

Board Chairman R. M. Dixon said irrigators have rights only to the storm and flood waters of the creek. These have been non-existent for a long time, he said.

Since the suit is the first of its kind ever filed, the decision is expected to set state-wide precedent.

Drought Aid Program Launched

Federal and state machinery are grinding out a three-phase drought aid program for Texas farmers and ranchers.

Action came as mounting disaster conditions caused federal officials to release "one of the bleakest crop and cattle situation reports in 22 years."

Present plans would provide (1) certificates good for \$1.50 per hundredweight toward feed grain purchases, (2) certificates for \$7.50 per ton to buy roughage and (3) Farmers Home Administration loans to refinance debts on family-size farms.

Initial details were worked out at an Austin conference of U. S. Department of Agriculture officials, Gov. Allan Shivers, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White and the Texas Emergency Drought Committee.

USDA is providing \$1 million to finance the roughage program. Gov. Shivers has allocated \$100,000 from his emergency funds for administrative operations.

Texas' reaction to the federal offers ranged from "fairly satisfactory" from Governor Shivers to "too little and too late" from South Texas farmers.

USDA's weekly report on Texas agricultural conditions termed the drought "one of the most severe on record." It reported pasturage conditions "lowest since 1934" and feed crops "very short" over most of the state.

Bigger Highway Program Begun

Expanded highway building under the new federal program is off to a fast start in Texas.

In the first tabulation since U. S. aid bill passage, the State Highway Commission received low bids totaling a whopping \$18,494,446. Of this, some \$5,847,678 was represented by six bids for improvement of federal interstate routes.

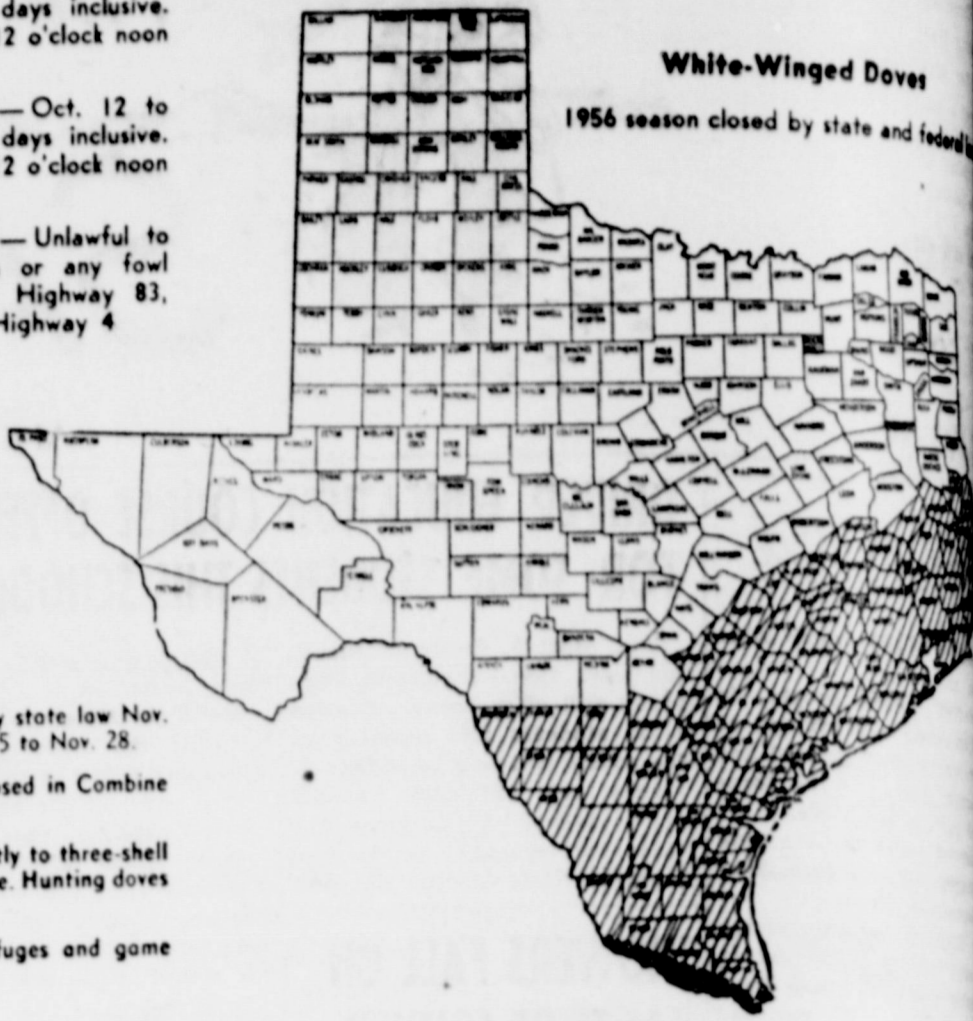
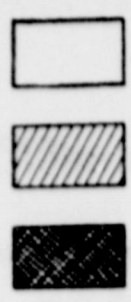

BAG LIMIT. Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

BAILEY COUNTY—No open season.

McMULLEN COUNTY—Open season by state law Nov. 1 through Dec. 15; by federal law Oct. 15 to Nov. 28.

New Law Offers Income Tax Relief For Many Ranchers

Drought stricken ranchers have been provided income tax relief on the sale of livestock by Public Law 629. It was announced this week by R. L. Phinney, district director of Internal Revenue in Austin.

When a rancher has to sell his livestock in excess of the number that he usually sells in his ordinary business, due to drought, he can consider that sale as an involuntary conversion.

"Tax relief relating to involuntary conversions have applied before to such things as the burning of your house, losses by flood, etc., for which insurance is collected. No tax is due on the sale of property from an involuntary conversion if the property is replaced with like kind within a specified period, usually before the end of the following year," Phinney explained.

It was also pointed out that the Farmers Tax Guide for 1955, IRS Publication 225, gives procedures agricultural men should follow in Chapter 13. The free publication is available at IRS and county agent offices.

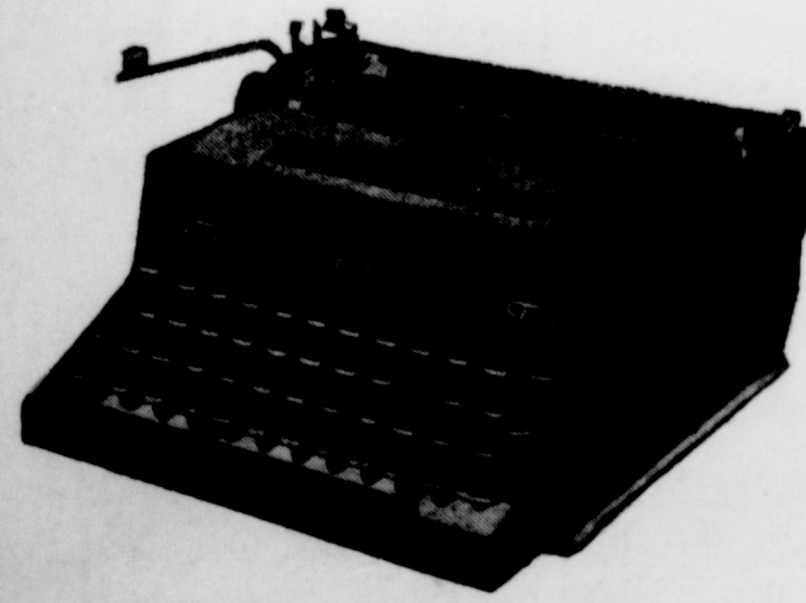

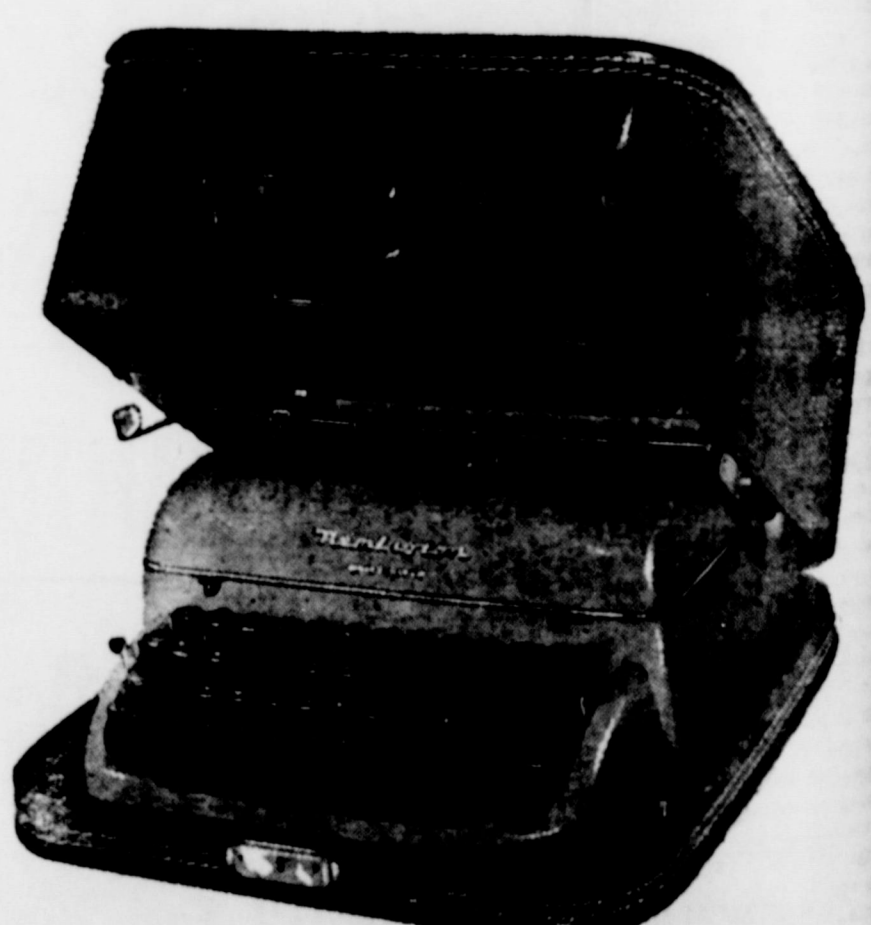
