## R. W. Davenport Funeral August 21 In San Antonio

Funeral services were held in San Antonio last Tuesday for Raymond William Davenport, 75, who died on August 17 at his home in that city. Burial was in Sabinal.

Born January 31, 1881, on the Little Blanco ranch, north of Sabinal, he was well known throughout West Texas as one of the real oldtime cowboys. For over years he was the manager of the West-Pyle ranch west of Sanderson. On his retirement in 1944, he moved to San Antonio. He had been in failing health for the past seven and one-half years.

Action came as mounting disaster conditions caused federal of ficials to release "one of the bleak est crop and cattle situation reports in 22 years."

Present plans would provide (1) ertificates good for \$1.50 per hundredweight toward feed grain purchases, (2 certificates for \$7.50 per ton to buy roughage and 3) Farmers Home Administra tion loans to refinance debts or family\_size farms.

Initial details were worked out an Austin conference of U. S. Department of Agriculture offic als, Gov. Allan Shivers, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White and the Texas Emergency Drouth Income Tox Relief Committee.

USDA is providing \$1 million to nance the roughage program Cov. Shivers has allocated \$100. 000 from his emergency funds for dministrative operations.

Texas' reaction to the federal fers ranged from "fairly satisactory" from Governor Shivers "too little and too late" from South Texas farmers.

USDA's weekly report on Texas gricultural conditions termed the drouth "one of the most severe on ecord." It reported pasturage nditions "lowest since 1934" and eed crops "very short" over most the state.




