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## Magnolia Crew Here For Seismograph Testing In This Area

Twenty members of a Magnolia seismograph crew moved into Sanderson last week-end for seismographic exploration work in this vicinity. The crew presently is at work in the west-central part of the county and they expect to be here from eight months to one year.

## New Ford Car To Be Introduced After January 1

The first revolutionary new idea in automotive design since the development of the closed car 40 years ago was unveiled recently by Ford Motor Co. It is a hardtop model with a fully retractable steel top which at the touch of a button slides automatically into the car's trunk.

The new car combines both the advantages of a convertible and a hardtop.

An instrument panel button begins the operation of the mechanism which automatically lowers or raises the top. In the lowering motion the operation begins with the electric locks being released in the trunk lid and it rises up and back out of the way. Then locks are released in the top which swings up, back and down into the trunk. The trunk lid closes and locks itself. In 40 seconds the car has been converted from a hardtop sedan to an open-air vehicle. The reverse procedure is used in raising the top.

The car will be in production after January 1.

## Farm-To-Market Road Construction Scheduled Soon

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson revealed the first of the week that he had received word of farm-to-market road work scheduled soon. The word came from Mr. Faltinson, district Highway Department engineer in Pecos.

Faltinson stated, according to Wilkinson, that the Fort Stockton maintenance branch would assume responsibility for the maintenance of the existing highway from US 285 east to the end of tipping and that an additional seven miles would be completed in the near future. This will put the end of the improved road up to about two miles this side of the Circle Dot headquarters.

All preliminary survey work and plans will have to be made before contract can be let for the work.

J. W. Whitson, resident engineer of the Fort Stockton highway department, will be in charge of the work and plans and surveying is expected to begin within three weeks. Wilkinson stated that he was informed that this project was to receive a top priority in the work schedule.

The progress noted by the current announcement is the forerunner of the completion of the road between US 285 and FM1217, of which there has been no designation as yet. The route will save approximately 16 or 18 miles for travelers from Sanderson to Sheffield in comparison with the present Dryden-Sheffield route and will mean an all-weather route for ranchers in the area between US 285 and FM1217 after completion.

## Heavy Mail Use Expected Christmas

In anticipation of the largest holiday mail volume in history, Postmaster Clyde Griffith called attention to ten basic pointers outlined this week by Postmaster Arthur E. Summerfield for users of the mails to follow in order to assure prompt and safe delivery of their Christmas cards and gifts.

1. Address mail fully and carefully. Write legibly or print plainly.
2. Be certain that a return address is printed in the upper left hand corner of both Christmas cards and parcels.
3. Do not enclose coins or hard objects of any kind in letters without marking the envelope for hand stamping.
4. Do not mail cash in any gift.
5. Make sure parcels are well packed and securely wrapped in strong containers.
6. Gifts of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, radios, and musical instruments, MUST be marked Fragile by the mailer.
7. Insure parcels. Register letters of real value.
8. Mail Christmas cards and parcels early to avoid the last-minute rush and waiting in line at the post office.
9. Every postal employee is happy to answer questions on postal rules and regulations. Anyone with problems about mailing his Christmas parcels should avail himself of the opportunity of discussing the problems with postal employees and take advantage of their experience.

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**State Capitol NEWS**

Texas' 56th Legislature will have much of its work cut out for it by January 8.

State agencies and public and semi-public groups by the score are busy drawing up desired changes in state laws. Almost every day brings one or more public appeals pinpointing some proposed enactment as vital to state progress.

Some want certain laws liberalized. Others want them tightened. Many departments of State Government seek new or increased appropriations.

Examples in the news:  
State Board of Education wants \$50,000 a year for the next two fiscal years for education and rehabilitation of mentally retarded.

Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools wants the state cigarette tax providing \$5,000,000 a year for its building program continued two more years. Contingent on this, it will ask \$11,000,000 for building improvements in the next biennium.

Texas Prison Board wants some \$5,500,000 for new building and staff needs resulting from an 80 per cent jump in prison population.  
Texas Law Enforcement Conference wants 29 law changes aimed at updating criminal detection and trial procedures. Typical items:

Set up a statewide file of fingerprints of convicted felons, allow drunk driving convictions upon scientific blood tests, provide public defenders for defendants without funds, etc.

Texas Junior Chamber of Com- legislative sessions with annual and more substantial salaries.

Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers wants a 10-point program involving improvement of the school system and teacher salaries, strengthening of laws concerning juvenile, banning of common law marriages, sale of narcotics to children and sale of fireworks.

NAACP Seeks Move  
Next encounter between the state and the NAACP will be in Tyler district court Dec. 3. NAACP will then seek to have the site of future hearings changed from Tyler to Dallas or Austin.

Last month in Tyler Dist. Judge Otis T. Dunagan granted a temporary injunction against operation of the NAACP in Texas. Defendants gave oral notice of appeal.

Since the organization abandoned appeal efforts and asked for a full trial on merits. If it loses, the injunction becomes permanent.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd said his staff is already at work preparing and that he "earnestly hopes" the trial can be completed in December. Shepperd will be succeeded by Will Wilson on Jan. 1.

State Supreme Court added to Texas' public land domain in a case setting the boundary between tidal and landholder's property.

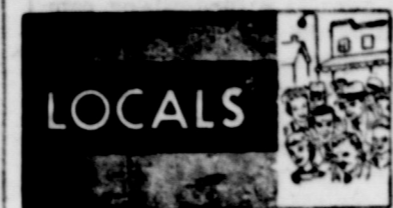
"Highest tide of the year," not "average high tide," determines the dividing line between tideland and coast land, ruled the court.

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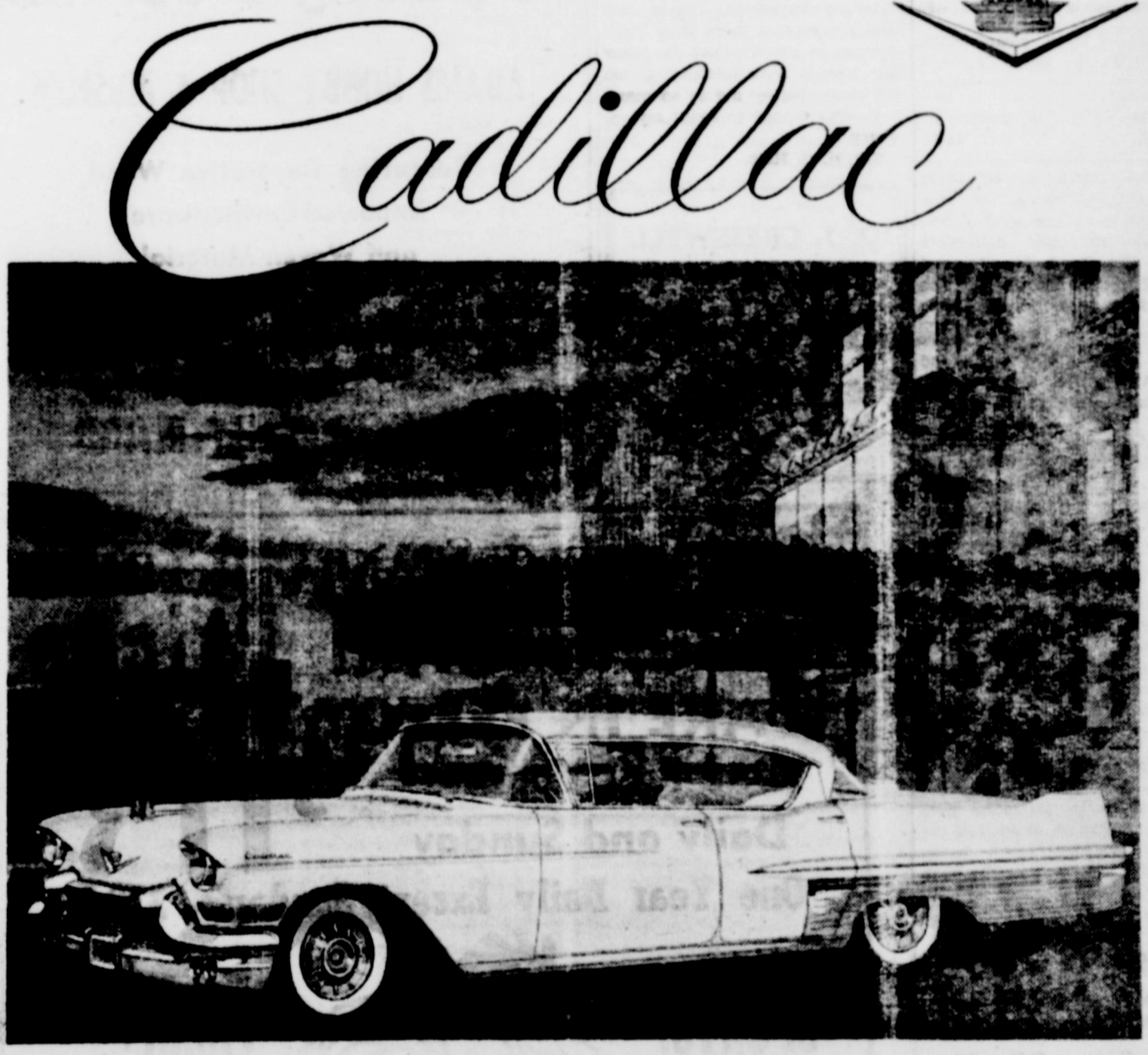

In the test case Texas gained 4,986 acres of mud flats along Laguna Madre north of Port Isabel. Eventual result, said Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, will be gaining of hundreds of thousands of acres and millions of dollars for the permanent school fund.

Tidelands, according to law, belong to the state. Income is earmarked for education.

Texas Supreme Court has agreed to take another look at a case to decide electric power selling rights.

Issue is whether rural electric cooperatives can continue service in areas after they are annexed by cities. In August the Supreme Court refused to review lower court decisions in favor of the co-ops.

Suit was brought by the attorney general, numerous private utility companies and the League of Texas Municipalities. On the other side is the Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative, backed by 54 other co-ops and the City of Gilmer.

Private utilities contend the law restricts co-ops to towns of 1,500 or less. Co-ops say they can't be thrown out once they've been legally established in a town.

No date for arguments was set by the high court.

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### State Wins Prize Money

Businesses offering prizes to customers must pay a 20 per cent state tax, according to a court ruling.

Third Court of Civil Appeals so judged in a suit against Mrs. Tucker Foods, Inc. It offered coupons worth 15, 25 and 50 cents with cans of shortening. Attorneys for the firm argued the prize tax applied only to theaters and places of amusements.

District and appeals courts interpreted the statute as applying to "any business enterprise".
