# **Survey Started**

Survey work for the proposed Farm-to-Market road connecting US285 with FM1217 was begun this week, according to information received the first of the week.

The proposed project will be for a distance of approximately seven miles from the present end of improved road about six miles north and east from US285. The junction f the two roads is about 18 miles north of Sandersn.

The part of the construction that has already been approved by the State Highway Department will put the end of the improved or completed road to within about two miles of the Circle Dot ranch leadquarters.

The project has long been a tream of county authorities and of ranchmen in the area between the junction with US285 and Sheffield. It would provide an improved road nearer their ranches and also rovide an improved route to Sheffield and thus a shorter improved road to San Angelo and points to the north and east of Sanderson or those who might wish to trav-I in that direction.

The Fort Stockton maintenance rew has assumed responsibility of he present 6-mile stretch and will andle the plans and also construcion of the additional seven miles nce construction is under way.

The project has a top priority or completion as far as the Fort Stockton office is concerned.

### DEER SEASON OPENS SATURDAY

River opens Saturday and runs hrough Thursday of next week.

The bag limit is two white tail deer or one white tail and one black tail or only one black tail. Hunting hours are from sunrise to sunset during the six-day season.

A big-game license is required i all hunters in the state and the tag from the license is to be applied to the head of the deer imnediately after the kill and the necessary information filled in.

A legal deer has at least one prong from a spike.

Hunters are cautioned of the many dangers involved in shooting the big calibre guns and in being in the area where there are other

Since the hunting on most all area ranches is controlled either by lease or permits, relatively few accidents have occurred in this immediate vicinity

The bridge on US90 is 275 feet above the Pecos River and will be 1,270 feet long. It will be the tallst in Texas and the ninth tallest in the nation. The roadbed is 28 feet wide to be covered with the new light weight concrete. Approaches to the bridge are cut through canyon walls and about 152,000 cubic yards of rock and dirt had to be blasted away, takmite to blast each cubic yard.

The bridge will cost about \$1, 400,000, including cost of planning.
