Under this extension, farmers and ranchers may now file applications through February 15, 1957, for a supply of feed grain necessary to carry their basic livestock through March 15, 1957.

Mr. McKay also advised that the emergency roughage program with be extended, however, there will be delay in accepting applications for roughages until sometime in early January since financial aspects of the program are being worked out in Washington.

Water plants thoroughly. Don't apply fertilizer to newly-planted bushes until the root system is well stablished, then feed at least twice a season Never fertilize in late fell Keep plants free of insects and disease with a regular praying or dutting schedule.

Dependents of servicemen and women of the armed forces became eligible December 7 for certain civilian medical care under Public Law 569, with the federal government paying the bills of private physicians and hospitals.

ervice offices. Certain days have been designat d as Taxpayer Assistance Days and are provided for those taxpayers who require help from IRS afer completing their returns as far is possible.

The Taxpayer Assistance Days or Del Rio are each Monday from :15 a.m. to noon.

(1) Have your butcher saw through the rib bones above the eye of fat. Hold firmly to both ends to sep-



arate the rib-eye from the outside section. Cut rib bones free and trim lean meat off. Remove thin blade cartilage and backbone. (2) Then roll outside section, fat side out, into a pot roast and skewer or tie. Cook over low temperature with moisture for best results. (3) Slice the rib-eye into 11/2 to 2-inch "country club" steaks which are tender



enough to broil or, if preferred, swiss. Use bones for beef stock and lean meat for stew. Wrap or cover the cuts loosely if they are to be used within a few days; freeze them if longer storage is desired. At-home fabricating saves time and money, says the Texas Beef Council and provides three or four distinctively different dinners.

Rutherford Back Early To Washington

Congressman J. T. Rutherford of the 16th District has arrived back in Washingtin to await the opening of the 85th Congress early in January.

Except for a tour of active duty with the Marines in the Middle Last in the early fall, it is the first time Rutherford has left West Texas since the 84th Congress adjourned last July. Since that time he has visited all counties in his district and talked with many people about ther wishes and their problems.

Rutherford spent the first few days in getting his family resettled in Washington and in preparing City. Vicki, Steve, and Thomas several bills for presentation when Congress convenes. Included are re-drafts concerning flood contro! Day. conditions in West Texas, and a bill calling for channelizing and salinity allevaton works on the Pecos River.

Rutherford will also utilize the time between now and the opening of Congress to press for action on a number of pending projects in West Texas. These include possitle postal improvements, conferences relating to radar stations in West Texas, matters ioncerning the State Department and the Immigration Service, and taking up a number of individual cases with governmental agencies on behalf of West Texas residents.

"I regret that I cannot spend the holidays in West Texas," Rutherford said, "but I felt I could best utilize the time before Congress convenes by being in Washington to personally look into va-1 ous matters concerning the 16th

Rutherford predicted that once the committee assignments are made and the Congress organized, action will begin at a zapid rate due to world conditions and ley. He will report to Van Nuys. a number of recommendations Congressional leaders and the administration intend to present to the Congress.

Rutherford said that he and Mrs. Rutherford "send warmest Christmas greetings and best and family. wishes for the New Year" to all West Texans, and he thanked the people for their cooperation during the two years he has served in Washington.
