



It was represented that this promotion was to be broadcast over radio station KPAN in Hereford, and that the Friona Star was "cooperating" and advertisements would appear in this newspaper in conjunction with the event.

The Friona Star had not been approached by any person representing KPAN, or this promotion. or by any person associated with the sale of this campaign. The Star was not "cooperating" with any type program of this nature, and in fact, was not asked to cooperate.

Contracts with local businesses were made by persons who live neither here nor in Hereford. They were made by persons authorized to represent the station, but not authorized to represent the newspaper. Any statements made to the effect that The Star was "cooperating" was un-

While The Star recognizes that all business firms, whether they be located in Friona, Hereford, or any other town, has the right to come to this community to sell their wares, and it is up to the merchants to decide on whether the goods or services are worthwhile, we do feel that by statement or innuendo it was intimated that the newspaper and the station had joined together for a joint promotion. Such an illusion capitalized on the good will of the local newspaper with local merchants. This good will has been earned over a long period of time and is our most valuable commodity. It is not lightly shared with others.

KPAN manager Clint Formby was contacted by The Star and he said it was possible that the salesman contracted by them had misrepresented the promotion in telephone presentations to local businessmen. He assured the Star he would "check into it" and make sure local firms understand the arrangements of the sale.

The Star understands that confusion sometimes arises when engaging persons to undertake temporary sales activities, as they may not be familiar with all the facts. But The Star feels it should point out that the sales "pitch" employed by those persons last week was not authorized.

The economists tell us the family grocery bill in the midforties was about 25 cents of our take-home dollar. Today we spend only 20 cents. Our incomes have gone up faster than food

Ten years ago, for example, an hour's work bought 2.3 pounds of chuck roast; today we get 3.3 pounds. In the early postwar years an hour of work was worth 22 eggs; it's worth 43 eggs today. Yesterday 24 pounds of potatoes; oday 29. And the same thing is true for poultry, milk, bread, and

These figures help to keep our agricultural economy and mar-keting system running smoothly.





Want to know what's brand Communities, Tuesday, June 12 new on the food market? In the USDA Utilization Laboratories, located in the four regions of country, scientists are working on several new food products. They are experimenting with sweet potato flakes, parboiled wheat product called 'bulgar'', a bean powder that does away with soaking and boiling, whole egg powder, vegetable chips, and dried honey.

We have a new method of food perservation. Freeze - dried foods are already on the mark et although they are sold mainto outdoors men and institutional users. The foods have been dehydrated under vacuum while frozen. These foods can kept without refrigeration for long periods of time. Then when they are prepared for meals they are just as good as in the beginning.

These dehydro frozen foods should offer a considerable savings in marketing costs and a big savings in freezer space, since it is about 50 per cent of its original weight and bulk. To use dehydrofrozen foods simply add water, thaw and cook. They taste much the same as other frozen foods.

Here's a help for you who have ever washed coloring crayons in with children's clothing. What a mess! Try this for a possible solution to remove the coloring stains. Use one cup low sudsing detergent, hot water in a washer, and add two tablespoons of Drano, Mix the wash water and solution before adding the stained clothes. Be sure to rinse thoroughly as for all washings.

First, disconnect the lamps and appliances in use when the circuit went out. Then open the main switch to cut off the current while you work at the fuse box. Replace the fuse with a new one of the proper size. For your safety keep a dry board at the fuse box to stand on while you work and, of course, be sure your hands are dry. Close the main switch and restore the current. Be sure to always check the supply of spare fuses and buy more

The Water that Sustains Us-Shapes Our Earthly Destiny

We must learn to manipulate the forests for more water and provide better protection for fish, game, and water fowl. We must fit our small watersheds into the development pattern of our giant river basins and add a thousand-plus new shorelines for our recreation.

With these and other water plans yet unspun, we will grandly march or meanly move into the future. And this, too, is truth: even as water shapes our earthly destiny, it is God's will that each one of us, according to our regard for water, shall help point the way.





n its forms and according to the seasons I water is the very pinnacle of contradio tions. It may appear today as benign as the surface of a placid lake. Elsewhere and at another time it becomes a flooding river tyrant, gorged with excess and indiscriminate in its destruction.

We have been blessed by the Lord with an infinite variety in nature. 


