





TURKEY CASSEROLE WITH HERB TWISTS; Ingredients -6 tablespoons butter, 5 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, few grains pepper, 2 cups milk, I cup heavy cream, 216 cups diced cooked turkey, I cup diced cooked celery, 1/2 cup sliced cooked carrots, 1/2 cup cooked peas, 6 tiny white onions, cooked, "Herb Twists. Method-Melt butter; blend in flour, salt and pepper. Gradually add milk; cook stirring constantly, until thickened. Remove from heat; gradually add cream. Add turkey, celery, carrots, peas and onions. Pour into 7 1/2 x12x2" baking dish. Place Herb Twists on top. Bake in hot oven, 425° F., 20-30 minutes. Yield, 6 servings.

HERB TWISTS; Ingredients - 3 tablespoons shortening, 114 cups biscuit mix, milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter, poultry seasoning. Method-Cut shortening into biscuit mix. Add milk; mix dough. Roll dough in oblong 12x10". Spread with melted butter: sprinkle with poultry seasoning. Fold over (12" side) 3 times. Cut in strips. Twist. (ANS)

#### **Hypertension Relief** Possible, Says Holle

People who suffer from hytertension, or high blood pressure, nowadays have more reason for optimism than they would have had a year ago, says Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commisioner of Health of the State Department of Health.

In itself, hypertension is not disease. It's a sign of something wrong, like the stuffy feeling that comes with a cold. The dan ger accrues because of the possi bility of serious heart or kidney damage when blood pressure consistently high

It isn't true that the higher the blood pressure the more reason to fear heart damage. Research has shown that temporary increases in pressure do not really make much difference. But even mild elevations in blood pressure considered normal for the person involved -if the increase persists - may cause the walls of blood vessels to toughen, exactly ss callouses are formed on hands by regular use of an axe or hoe.

In the most common type high blood pressure, called "essential hypertension" the tiny branches of arteries which carry blood to all body tissues called arterioles, begin to tighten up. Blood passageways become smaller and smaller, and the heart has to work harder to push the blood through. After a time the bloo vessels lose their elasticity and the heart muscles thicken with the extra work load. Result: high blood pressure, and ultimately the heart is damaged.

What causes the arterioles to tighten and constrict? No one

High blood pressure sometimes goes up for a period of days or weeks, or even longer, and then drops back to normal. Sometimes

it may jump from pure nervousness while your physician is examining you. Perhaps there is a connection between hypertension and the strain of modern life. People who work under constant stress, who worry too much, are often susceptible. Heredity > probable factor, and the condition occurs most often in persons be tween 30 and 50.

Low blood pressure seldom causes trouble. Afflicting relatively few people to a serious extent. the condition is usually a symptom of a specific disease which can frequently be treated successfully.

The thing which will count most in adding years to the life of hypertension sufferers is the willingness to change their living habits, following the rules o noderation in everything. getting under a doctor's care and following a few simple rules for moderate living, they can probably work and enjoy life as long or longer than their next-door ueighbors without high blood

There is nothing to gain from vorry about your chances of developing hypertension. Just make a point to have a physical examination at least once a year And worry and argue as little as





#### Social Security Payment Required

Housewives employing a maid, ook, or laundress and paying ash wages of \$50 or more in any calendar quarter, are required to withhold 21/4 per cent of their cash vages as social security tax. Previous to 1957 the tax was 2 per

The employer then matches this amount and forwards the total to the district director of Internal Revenue at the close of each quar-

The Revenue officials explained that the tax is paid to Internal Revenue Service on a simple, easy to use form called Form 942, that the Revenue office can provide. It was pointed out that such wages include payments in cash, check or money order. Not included for domestic workers is the value of food, lodging or clothing. Cash payment for car fare is included, but not the cost of bus tokens. The Form 942, showing name

ocial security number, wage paid and tax withheld from each household employee, should be iompleted and sent to the Revenue district director within one month after the end of the calendar quar ter. That's by April for the January-to-March period.
