C of C To Sponsor Summer Program For Local Youths

The summer activities program for boys of this community was approved by the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce directors at their regular meeting Monday night at the court house.

The program, sponsored by the Chamber and with the aid of the Sanderson Rotary and Lions Clubs, will be under the supervision of Robert Carle, elementary principal, who will supervise the recreational program for boys 9 years old through 14 years of age for nine weeks during the summer. The program will be Monday through Friday of each week and will be for six hours daily.

The Chamber will ask that each boy bring \$1 a week to participate in the summer activity program, but their participation will not depend on the \$1 contribution, it was added, because the program is to be open to all boys in that age group, regardless of financial circumstances of parents. The parents who can contribute \$1 a week for the summer activity program for their child or children are asked to cooperate so that the burden of financing the program will not be on the organizations underwriting the expense.

The Chamber directors feel that each child participating will receive much more than \$1 worth of good per week out of the program and ask for the cooperation of all parents who can to help defray the expenses by their \$1-a-week support.

The program will begin on June 3 and continue through August 2. A committee composed of Troy Druse, originator of the program, and Chamber president, Ray Hodgkins, secretary of the organization, and W. W. Sudduth was named to assist Mr. Carle with the program in any way that he needed help.

The approximate cost of the activities will be \$700.

A large crowd attended the impressive ceremony Wednesday evening when the Blue Star Memorial marker was unveiled and dedicated at the Frank K. Harrell Park, a roadside park east of town and west of the overpass on U.S. 90.

Spudding In On Brown-Bassett No. 1 Done This Week

Spudding in on the Brown-Bassett No. 1 was completed this week and the rig is drilling ahead. One of the water wells was completed and the other well needed to furnish water for the hole is expected to be completed soon, according to reports.

The well, situated 1,890 feet from the north and west lines of section 218 in Block Y of the TC R.R. Co. Survey in Terrell County is known as the Brown-Bassett No. 1.

The location for the well is more specifically designated as about 3 miles east of the rouse on the A. D. Brown Estate Divide Ranch.

The well is about 1/2 mile south from the M. H. Goode ranch and is about 2 miles west of the Wilson Banner ranch.

Local Wool Sale Prices Go Good

Approximately 125,000 pounds of eight and twelve months wool was purchased at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. here Tuesday in a sealed bid sale. The sales were divided among six purchasers: Henry M. Davis, Vaughan and J. M. Lea of San Angelo; Emery, Russell and Goodrich of Boston; Winslow & Co. of Boston; Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co., Boston.

Prices on the eight-months wool was from 68 1/2 cents to 80 1/4 on grease basis. Of the 85,000 pounds of eight-months fleeces, only one small lot sold for the lower price, according to John T. Williams, owner and manager of the local warehouse.

Some of the sales were still pending on some of the wool and bids on about 40,000 pounds of the eight-months wool were rejected. Prices on the twelve-months wool ranged from 75 1/4 to 80 cents a pound, grease basis and all of the 40,000 pounds offered were sold.

In a final burst of energy, homesick Legislators broke the bottle-necks and started passing bills with machine-gun rapidity.

After days of delay, the Senate swept through most of the major bills in two days. It set a record for action this session and cleared the way for winding up money matters this week.

Report by the joint conference committee on the general appropriations bill was put by for study. Approval of this bill plus two others designed to raise funds for teacher pay raises will be the signal for a fast finish.

Most observers feel that enough money will be found to give the teachers a \$400 across-the-board increase.

Texas-Size Mess
Relief workers face multiplying problems as they wade into the multi-million-dollar mess spread over water-gilted Texas.

Preliminary estimates placed the damage at \$85,000,000. This was before the Lower Brazos spread to a width of 13 miles in some places and before the flood hit Lampasas.

Federal Civil Defense Administration has an initial grant of \$1,000,000 to help restore community-owned facilities. More is being sought. One of FCDA's more pressing problems is helping rural residents decontaminate flooded wells and spray against insects that breed in standing water.

In all, some half-dozen state and federal agencies are working to salvage public buildings, roads, businesses and farms.

Farmers got a setback, however, when federal officials refused to let them switch flooded acreage for higher land in the soil bank program. It means some will have usable land they can't cultivate because it was previously allotted to the soil bank and other land.

not in the soil bank, they can't plant either, because of flooding.

Even so, encouraging reports continue to come in from rural areas. First, post-drouth sales indicate grass-fattened cattle bringing higher prices. Small town bankers and businessmen report people are daring to spend again in anticipation of good crops.

NAACP Program Limited

NAACP can continue to operate in Texas, but with clipped wings. Unless a higher court reverses a Tyler district judge's ruling, NAACP will henceforth be permanently barred from all but "educational and charitable activities".

Suit to outlaw the organization in Texas was begun last year by former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd. It has been carried on by the present stall under Atty. Gen. Will Wilson.

A temporary injunction issued by the Tyler court last fall halted NAACP activity in the state. Present permanent injunction bans solicitation of lawsuits, and lobbying, in violation of state law. Court also ordered payment of back franchise taxes plus interest.

NAACP attorneys filed immediate notice of appeal.

Water Bill Filibustered

A water storage buying proposal was down, and maybe out, after a 13-hour "discussion" by Sen. Otis Lock of Lufkin.

Lock's determined opposition meant several days delay on the measure at a time when delay often means death. Sen. Geo. Parkhouse of Dallas, sponsor of the bill, was so disgruntled he threatened to junk the whole water conservation measure program.

Proposal, if approved by the voters, would allow the state to issue bonds to purchase water storage space in federal reservoirs. Lock contended the plan would be unpopular with voters it would

Enough Said

Senate apparently wants no more long talks on the segregation bills.

First such bill to come up brought on a record-breaking 3-hour filibuster. But the second one was shoved through in minutes after the vote to shut off debate.

Passed was a bill to require local elections before schools can be integrated.

Last apparent hope of the segregation opponents now is that the bills will be referred to the attorney general and ruled unconstitutional. Atty. Gen. Wilson said he has made preparations to handle the bills promptly, if asked.

Gov. Daniel said he plans a thorough staff study of each bill before deciding whether to seek a ruling.

Better Pay Approved

If voters consent, future legislators may avoid some of the financial pinch many complain of now.

Senate approved a House constitutional amendment providing for annual sessions and more pay. But it upped the House-suggested salary of \$4,800 to \$7,500 a year.

Present arrangement is \$25 a day for 120 days. It totals \$3,000 (Continued to page four)

for two years unless a special session crops up. Since May 7, when the 120 days ran out, lawmakers have been on their own money-wise.

Legislators' wives have been heard to speak bitterly of "going more in the hole every session." They cite cost of campaigns, two moves, high expenses in Austin, plus payments on houses back home and "constant" telephone calls and trips to Austin between sessions to handle constituents' requests.

Concluded one wife from an extreme north Texas district: "I've put my foot down. This is our last term."

School Law Studied

A searching examination of the Texas school problems, such as preceded the Gilmer-Aikin laws, has been proposed.

Resolutions introduced in both House and Senate said many districts are unable to provide teachers and buildings to keep up with the rapid increase in pupils. A 24-member committee to study needs and report to the 1959 session was recommended.

Short Snorts

Texas will have 205 new lawyers after the Supreme Court holds its swear-in ceremonies May 18 for those who passed the spring bar examination.

Fishing may cost more as a result of a House-passed bill raising the fishing license from \$1.65 to \$2.15.

Senate finally passed a controversial House bill which will enable cities to obtain federal aid for slum clearance and urban development.

As finally passed by both houses, the REA bill will allow co-ops to serve: (1) persons in rural area where private power is not available, (2) city residents where there is no private power company and (3) all former patrons in a rural area annexed by a city plus other patrons to whom private power is unavailable.
