Laws are fine so long as they have no teeth in them.

Apparently that's the feeling of the 7 members of the Texas House of Representatives.

At least that's the way they voted as they came down the home stretch to final adjournment.

House members had their best opportunity to express their opinions about putting teeth in Texas laws when Senate Bill 55 by Sen. Preston Smith came up for House consideration.

Previously it had passed the Senate with flying colors; it was given a "do pass" recommendation by the House State Affairs Committee; and it carried Gov. Price Daniels' endorsement.

SB-55 pertained to publication laws. But only to laws already on the statute books. Specifically only those laws ignored by those public officials who dislike to report their activities to the home folks.

No new public notices were called for in the bill. All SB-55 did was to strengthen existing laws. It merely pin-pointed who was responsible for printing public notices — so that the people might be informed.

Present laws provide that any public official who flatly refuses to follow the requirement of existing laws shall be subject to a fine or removal from office. That's already on the statute books. But Texas laws fail to designate specifically WHO is responsible.

The new bill was even more considerate than existing laws — for it even allowed for delays due to oversights or plain carelessness. Actually SB-55 applied only to

those public officials who intentionally violated the law. It required numerous "warnings". It would therefore affect only those public officials whose attitude was "The public be damned. I'll spend their money as I please. I'll tell the people only what I want them to know."

SB-55 was one of the Better Government bills proposed by the Texas Press Association. House sponsor was Rep. John R. Lee of Kermit.

The vote was 74 against and 56 for the bill.

We think the public is entitled to know the names of those who voted in their interest.

Although in the minority these Representatives fought to open public records to public view. They made a sincere effort to tighten Texas laws against further secrecy in governmental operations.

55th Milestones
These measures won out in the waning days of the session:

General appropriation: An all-time high budget of \$2,090,000,000 for the next two years was approved. It included salary raises for state employees.

Teacher pay — Both the House and the Senate approved measures to raise teachers' salaries.

Higher pensions — Both houses okayed a proposed constitutional amendment upping the amount the state can spend on public welfare each year — to \$47,000,000. If approved by the voters it will bring a \$10 monthly increase in the old folks' checks.

Congressional redistricting — In a redistricting bill the legislators abolished the second congressman. They also juggled around eight other districts and divided Harris County into two districts.

Urban renewal — Approved was a slum-clearance bill which would allow cities to condemn blighted areas for redevelopment by private enterprise.

Teen-Age drivers — Two bills affecting the hot-rod crowd were given final okay. One makes girls under 18 and boys under 17 responsible for traffic violations. Another gives the Department of

Public Safety the say-so as to whether youngsters under 16 can have drivers' licenses. Previously, county judges had the authority. Another bill, governed destruction of property by minors. It would make the parents responsible up to \$300.

25th Gravestones
Law enforcement commission — Governor Daniel's plan for a "super grand jury" for investigating crime and official misconduct.

Reform bills — (1) prohibiting lawmakers from appearing before state boards for a fee; and (2) eliminating the automatic delay of lawsuits when a legislator is hired as an attorney.

Four-year colleges — making senior colleges of Arlington State College; Midwestern at Wichita Falls; and John Tarleton at Stephenville.

Auto License Tags
The price of auto license tags will cost 10 per cent more. Highway Department is to use the extra funds to share 50-50 with cities and counties, the cost of right-of-way for new roads. Previously cities and counties have had to bear all lands costs.

New Force
Future office-seekers will have a new force to reckon with — the Democrats of Texas.

D.O.T. a new name for the old Liberal-Loyalist wing of the party, has set itself two goals — to gain control of the party machinery in Texas and to put its adherents in control of state government.

Some 1,500 delegates from 106 counties attended the organizing rally in Austin. Mrs. R. D. Randolph of Houston, Texas' liberal-minded national committeewoman, was named leader. New U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough flew down from Washington to speak.

D.O.T. is frowned on by Gov. Daniel and Executive Committee Chairman Jim Lindsey. D.O.T. charges them with "usurping party control at the Fort Worth convention."

Short Snorts
A "scratched ballot" is the only legal way to vote in future elections. No more choice between scratching and checking.

Price Daniel Family will get a better roof of their heads. Money was authorized to repair the Mansion ceiling that collapsed recently, just missing the governor.

Texas archives will get a brand new building. Shunting of historical documents from barns to basements to quonset huts in past years had brought a hue and cry from civic groups.

More Rain —

(Continued from Page One)

The rain extended northward from Dryden about 30 miles according to reports, with gradually diminishing quantities reported in the northerly direction.

The total rainfall for Sanderson this year is 5.71 inches and last year's total was 5.26. Sanderson has received 1.72 inches in May according to Ervin Grigaby.

Sunday morning early, rain was reported just north of Sanderson on the Austin Nance ranch and northward from there, but only a trace of moisture fell locally.

Sunday afternoon late and early in the evening, heavier rains were reported all over the county with reports up to 4 inches on the Sam Bell, Jr., ranch, east of Dryden, diminishing to near 2 inches in the immediate Dryden area. The rains caused considerable damage in Pecos County, north of Terrell County and Judd Montgomery and E. B. Carson reported the loss of livestock and fences from the heavy downpour.

Westward Terrell County reported the lightest rains of all sections last week-end, but all reports indicate that some rain fell on all of the ranches of the area.

Monday was cloudy all day and heavy overcast indicated the possibility of rain, but none has been reported as yet. Clouds in the east and northeast appeared to be dumping rain in the east and east-central part of the county.

Tuesday morning a light mist fell all morning, with very little collection in the rain gauges, but a blanket of moisture was on all grass, weeds, and brush, lawns and shrubs in town.

A very light shower fell for approximately 3 minutes Tuesday morning.

The clouds continued heavy all day Tuesday and Tuesday night with Wednesday dawning with a heavy overcast which lasted all day. There was again signs of a shower falling northeast of Sanderson, but no local precipitation.

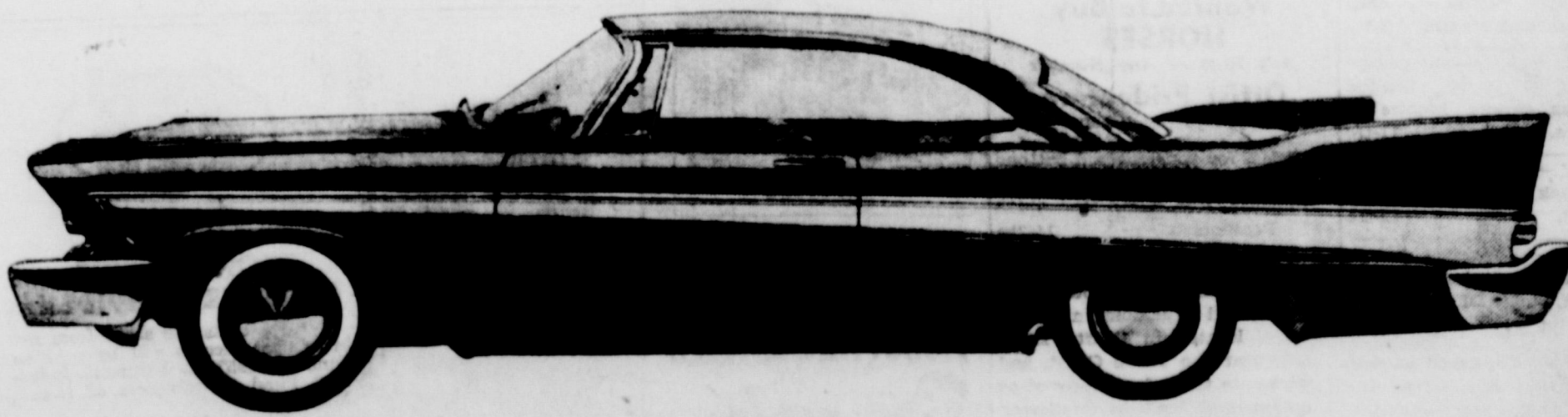

Asking the question, "Now that you are here after 12 years of training may I ask one question?" Was it worth it? — Climbing the long road climaxing here this evening — "What has it been worth?" Dr. Cavness presented a challenge to the graduates to make the most of their opportunities — if they would achieve success.

Within each of us was created a soul like unto God, our Creator, and every soul has the right to say 'yes' or 'no', to choose right or wrong. Those of you who are graduates have been in the care and keeping of those who would set you aright and guide you aright. I commend you to Him and entrust you to His care and keeping."

Dr. Cavness concluded with the story of Mrs. Billie Davis, author of the film, "A Desk for Billie" to inspire the graduates to try to rise above their environment and always inspire for and strive toward the nobler and higher things of life.
