P.O. Ups Special Service Fees July 1

No increase in postal rates has been made at this time but all fees for special services have been increased effective July 1. Clyde Griffith, local postmaster announced.

Registered mail now has a minimum fee of 50c plus postage. Certified mail is 20c plus postage. Special delivery letters 30c plus postage. Business reply mail is upped to 4c for cards and 5c for letter, and return receipts are now 10c.

Fees for insured mail are now as follows: Up to \$10 value 10c; \$50 is 20c; \$100 is 30c and \$200 is 40c.

Money order charges are now 15c for orders from 1c to \$5; 20c for \$5.01 to \$10; 30c for \$10.01 to \$50.

Modern Appliances Increase Reasons For Adequate Wiring

College Station — Almost everyone has experienced that helplessness which is felt when the electricity goes off, for more and more household chores, from dishwashing to clothes-drying, are being shouldered by electrical servants. And through air conditioners and radio sets, those ready kilowatts are providing a lot in the way of comfort and entertainment, too.

But many homeowners are discovering their houses are inadequately wired to handle the extra load of appliances, says W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer. Blowing fuses, flickering lights, and shrinking TV pictures when additional electrical appliances are turned on are all signs that circuits are overloaded.

For safety's sake, call in an electrical contractor when this occurs, advises Ulich. Don't play "handy man" with something that can be as dangerous as electricity. Don't use heavier than 15 ampere fuses unless your circuits are built to handle them. And never use a coin to establish contact after a fuse has blown. Fuses and circuit breakers operate on the basis of the flow of electricity. Excess flow of current not broken by a fuse or circuit breaker causes heat greater than insulations on wires can resist. The overheated wires can easily cause a fire.

If your house needs additional wiring, it will pay to take care of this need promptly. All appliances will work more efficiently and satisfactorily and may use less electricity to do the same work. Cost of wiring is small compared to the safety and convenience of a properly-wired home, points out Ulich.

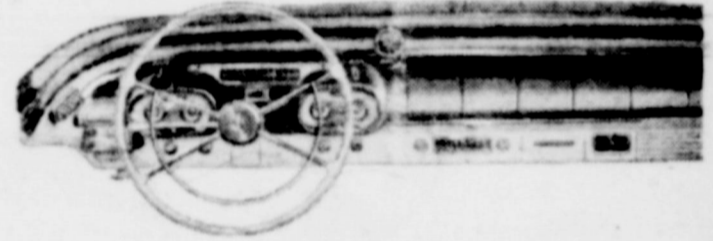

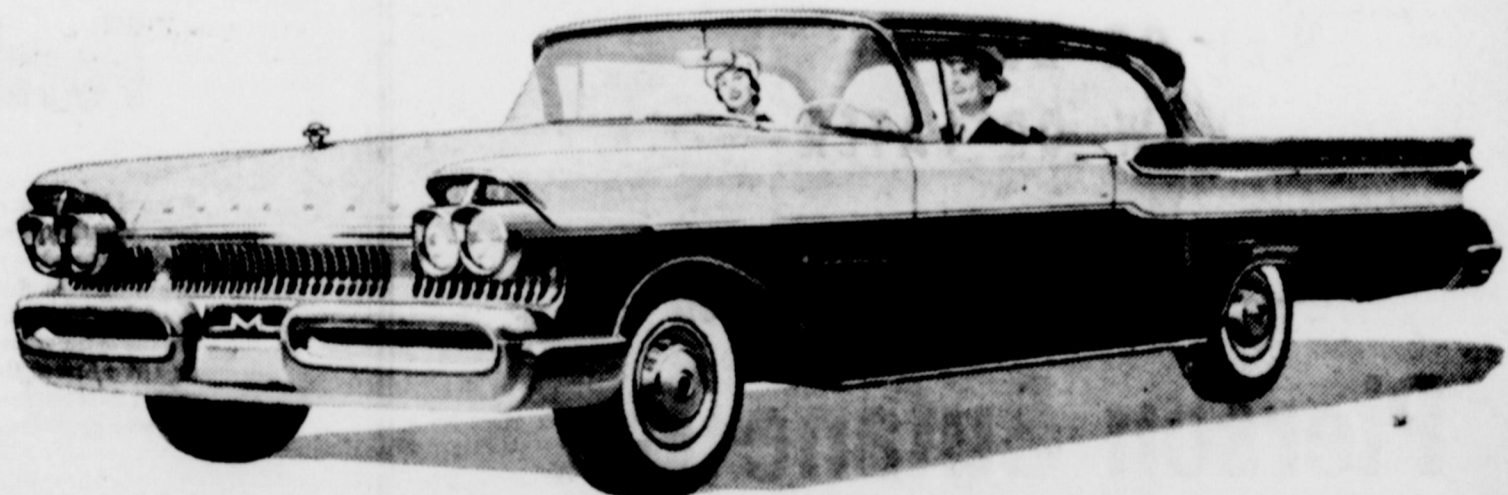
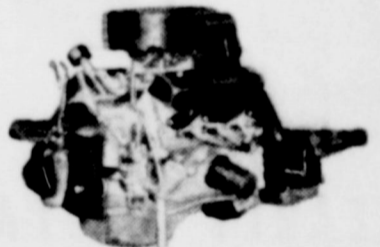

the necessary school facilities and they must do so if they are to maintain any part of their states' rights. The sponsors of the school building program maintain that it will be only an "emergency" measure and will

be dropped after the emergency. How well we remember that every socialistic bureau or commission that has been inaugurated since the Roosevelt New Deal was started as an emergency measure to be dropped later. None have been discarded and all have grown in power until we lack little now of being a socialistic state.

No, we do not want any part of the federal government aid to our public schools — not now or ever. We feel that when we get to where we can't maintain our own public schools then we will be in no position to maintain twice as heavy a tax burden to keep the federal government in the school business.

It takes taxes to maintain a school. Taxes are paid by you and me. If we have to carry it no higher than the state level

we have a better chance of retaining a say-so about the operation of the schools.

The federal government has no way of raising money to operate schools other than by or with taxes, and we don't want the superintendent kicked out of his office to make room for a federal "educator" to supervise things.

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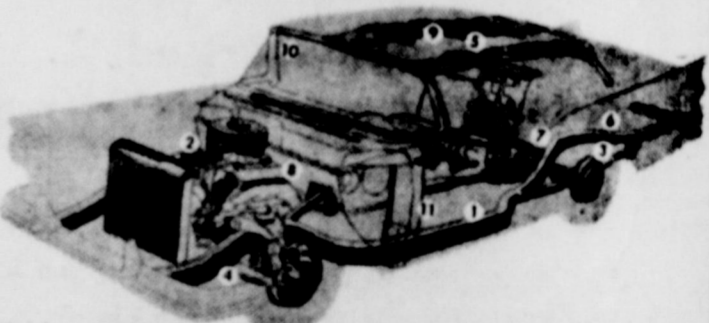
