Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church Monday afternoon for W. E. Lea, 70, who died Saturday morning in a Big Spring hospital. The James & Magill Funeral Home, which was in charge of arrangements, brought the body overland Saturday night in a funeral coach.

Rev. Kelley E. Scott, pastor, was in charge of the funeral rites. The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen of which he was a member, conducted the graveside services. Interment was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

The pall bearers were C. W. Hatch, J. W. Sessoms, Larry Horgan, Jack Laughlin, A. T. Freeman, W. E. McSparran, Ed Robbins and H. W. Johnson.
Mr. Lea was born in Corinth, Miss., on August 4, 1886. His mother brought him to Texas when he was 11 years old to make his home with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Douglas, Mr. Douglas being the first T&NO pumper here. He went to work here as a call boy for the T&NO in 1902, later going to New Orleans to be employed as a fireman and returning to Sanderson in 1908 as a section foreman. He transferred from maintenance of way to train service in 1920.
The Leas moved to El Paso in 1948 and Mr. Lea retired as a passenger brakeman in 1954.

Local Survey To Determine If TV Is Desired

Within the next few days a survey will be made to determine the number of local residents who might be interested in having TV reception now or at any future date. The survey is being conducted by the SP Service Club under the auspices of the club officers.

A card which the receiver may sign to indicate his interest in television reception will be mailed to every local resident. The committee is urging that the cards be signed and returned in the immediate future. They are stressing the fact that the card does not in any way bind the signer to any action, but is only an expression of his desires for or against television.

Last week an engineer from San Angelo made tests all day on the Goldwire ranch and found a very clear picture always available with a low antenna, according to Mrs. H. P. Boyd. She stated that the engineer's plan was to bring TV into Sanderson by cable, following the highway, and that two stations would be available. Odessa and Midland. She concluded that the feasibility of the plan to bring TV into Sanderson would be determined by the local interest in the project and further information as to cost, etc., will be forthcoming if enough people show an interest.

Gas Blaze Extinguished Friday, Rig Moves In For More Drilling

The blaze at the gas well on Brown-Bassett No. 1 was extinguished last Friday shortly after noon. Myron Kinley, world-famous fire-fighter of Houston, supervised operations during the process.

Pumpers have kept the mud circulating in the hole since the fire was extinguished to prevent the gas from working up to the surface. The pressure of the mud and circulation is all that is retaining the gas in the hole until the new rig is put up.

Following the beginning of the conflagration last Wednesday morning early, crews worked around the clock removing debris from the well site so that the operation could be undertaken easily and without added hazard of the hindrance of the hot metal which was the crumpled derrick.

Fourteen large water tanks were hauled to the site and filled. Mud was brought in and mixed in tanks and four large Halliburton pumpers were on hand for use when the extinguishing operation began.

Kinley used a boom mounted on a caterpillar to remove debris from over the hole and the same equipment was used in the actual mudding-in process.

A piece of swedge pipe mounted on a 4-inch pipe which had been affixed to the boom, was connected on the other end to the line from the pumpers. Kinley supervised the positioning of the

swedge pipe in the open end of drillstem and a weight was used to hold the swedge in the pipe against the gas pressure. Mud was then pumped into the hole to extinguish the flame.

The entire extinguishing operation consumed about one hour and fifteen minutes.
When the well hit a depth of 12,400 feet, the driller noted a loss of weight on his drill stem gauge, according to reports, and raised up 20 feet to try to ascertain the cause. At that point he picked up the lost pressure and knew immediately the probable cause. Blow-out preventors were closed and efforts were made on the part of the drill crew to begin pumping mud into the hole.

The break came in the line below the blow-out preventor and in a process of minutes the rig had crumpled from flames which started at the break in the pipe.

The hole is in the Devonian strata.
A rig was being moved into location Wednesday for continuance of drilling to 15,000 feet or the Ellenberger formation. Operator will run a drill stem test before drilling begins.

Inspection of the equipment after the fire revealed a large rent in the outside casing caused by gas pressure which broke the smaller 9-inch casing. The outside casing was cemented in.

Driller encountered 10 per cent gas cut mud on a drill stem test

at a much shallower depth than the gas strike, estimated at between 50 and 75 million cubic feet per day.

Magnolia Petroleum and Western Natural Gas share drilling rights on the hole, and Brown-Bassett share the mineral rights. The hole is on a 38,341-acre lease in Section 218, Block Y.

The hole was considered a rank wildcat, the exploration is geographically located along the east rim of the Sheffield Channel. It is the farthest south in this portion of West Texas to show Devonian pay zone indications. The nearest other production to the location is some two miles southeast in the Goode pool, a shallow marginal gas area.

Gas from the Gooe wells was being used in the drilling of the Brown-Bassett test.

The well has been heralded as a possible discovery of considerable interest and significance for the extreme Southwest portion of this big West Texas district.

Unofficial but reliable reports state that three other wells are scheduled in the near future for the area immediately near the Brown-Bassett strike.
A new venture was reported last week to be in section 74 of Block 2 1&GN Survey. The well will be on the Herman Chandler ranch near the diving line between the Herman and Clarence Chandler ranches.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies of the State in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State, providing for the payment of such bonds, creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law, limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted, and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proposition therefor.

SECTION 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49c, as follows: "Section 49c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized by the Legislature shall be called "Texas Water Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered without further appropriation by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies public and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 28 or Article III, Section 52 of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State, including the control, storage and preservation of its stream and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during each fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year received in excess of the foregoing requirements there shall be deposited to the Texas Water Development Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board for the same purpose and conditions as the moneys derived from the sale of such State bonds under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1952, and all moneys principal received as repayment of financial assistance shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund in amount as may be required to pay the administrative expenses of the Board, provided that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund in amount as may be required to pay all future maturities of the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall be approved by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser, incumbrance shall constitute the general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas, and the Legislature may amend or repeal any law in violation of this amendment, such amendment shall be void.

"Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election such ballot shall have thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies public and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies public and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of water resources of the State."

"Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the proclamation for said election and the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State. The expense of publication and cost for the proper appropriation made law.
