# Agreement Set **On Diablo Dam**

Press story seen Wednesday, it was revealed that the U.S. and Mexican engineers agreed on the main features of Diablo Dam, \$65-million structure proposed just below the confluence of the Rio Grande and Devil's Liver on the Rio Grande, just above

Col. L. H. Hewitt, U.S. member the International Water and Boundary Commission, made the

Hewitt stated, according to the story, that the agreement covers the engineering, economic and geographical aspects of the 225-foot high dam, which would be one of the major international storage projects covered in a 1944 agreement between the two

The main section of the dam would be concrete, according to Hewitt, with earthfill wings on each end stretching the total length to 6.5 miles. It is intended for flood control and water conservation, and no farm acreage nor towns would be flooded The feasibility of generating power is now under study and additional funds would be required if this proposal is adopted, thus boosting the \$65-million for construction of the dam.

#### Marcus Fury Dies In Fort Stockton

Marcus Fury died in a Fort Stockton hospital last Tuesday. He had been in failing health for several weeks and died as the result of a heart condition.

Fury had lived in Fort Stockton for about 20 years. He was operating a cab company at the time of his death and had formerly been a partner in a bus line in Fort Stockton. Local residents will remember him when he drove the bus operating between Fort Stockton and Sanderson several years ago.

#### TB Skin Tests To Be Given To Pre-School Children

The Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association will sponsor a tuberculin skin test for an announcement made this week by Mrs. Web Townsend, president of the Association.

The tests will be given on Saturday. August 24, at the office of Dr. Jack M. Sexton, county health officer.

All parents of pre-school children are urged to bring their children for the free test. All younger children may also be brought for the test which is not painful in any way to the child. Chest X-rays, so effective for the detection of tuberculosis in

adults, are considered rather useless in testing children for the same disease. There are many children who develop TB; babies and adoles-

ents are liable to severe forms as are pre-schoolers. Any infant who has TB has an active case and a patient one month old who has the disease, must have caught it from some adult. The source of infection may be

traced to reveal several more case of tuberculosis in the same home or neighborhood. The spread of the disease may be traced to a visiting grandmother, a baby-sitter, a father who has left the tuberculosis sanatorium against the doctor's advice, or a neighbor. All of these people must be found and treated unless the spread of the disease is to be

Chest X-rays do not detect TB in children for several reasons If the TB is in the lungs, it is most often hidden by the heart shadow. Often it is in other parts of the body, prhaps in the bones or the brain. The only truly effective detection method in children is the tuberculin skin test. When this test is given, a solution is injected into the forearm, and if, in a matter of 48 hours, it produces a lump from the size of a pea to the size of an egg, the child assuredly has tuberculosis germs in his system.

Facilities for the hospitalization of tuberculous children in Texas are very limited and so the medication for treatment may be taken at home, the majority of cases requiring one year of treat-

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.

17 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

LATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial sistricts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection: and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection: and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 45-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 3 of Article XVI of this Conditation. 


