Bassett Estate Sells Minerals To Hunt Oil Co.

Word was received this week of the sale of a large portion of the Bassett Mineral Estate to Hunt Oil Co., of Dallas. A price of \$825,000 was reported. Martin Trading and Commission Co. of Dallas handled the deal.

Portions of the mineral rights on over 100,000 acres were involved in the deal, according to records in the Terrell County court house. The land involved was in Block Y, Block 148, D, D-2, D-7, 123, A-1, 161, 149, A-2, D-4, D, H, and D-7.

Some of the land involved was in Val Verde County, but 90 per cent of the acreage was in Terrell County, according to information received.

Cable Installation Slated To Begin In Near Future

Installation of cable for local television reception is scheduled to begin soon, according to word relayed to John Burchett this week. J. H. Benton and Ross Mitchell of Van Horn will make the installation as soon as equipment arrives, according to Burchett.

The receiving tower will be located north of Sanderson about 2 miles, according to available information, and will be brought into town from that direction.

Burchett stated that a test receiver would be set up in the Big Bend Gas Co. for potential patrons to view the quality and kind of reception as soon as the cable installation was completed to that point.

No information was available on the probable cost of the reception to customers locally and no date has been set for beginning of the construction.

Tentative plans reveal the possibility of receiving two stations at the reception sight and relaying the choice of two stations in to local receivers tied onto the cable.

County UT Land To Be Leased; Ranchmen Eye Price

The University Land Board will offer 49,000 acres of land in West Texas for lease at auction on October 22. The auction will be at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin at 10 a.m.

2,589.60 acres of the University land is in Terrell County.

There are 323.70 acres in eight tracts of land in sections 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Block 34 in Terrell County.

Parents Urged To Bring Kids For TB Skin Tests

Parents of all pre-school-age children are urged to bring the children to the office of the county health officer, Dr. Jack Sexton, Saturday for a free skin test for tuberculosis. The tests are available under the sponsorship of the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The tests, which are free, will be given from 2 to 3 in the afternoon.

It has been pointed out that the tests are in no way painful to the child and children of all ages up to school age are urged to take the tests.

Adults of the community are given an opportunity each year to have a free chest X-ray sponsored by the TB Association but the skin test is the only effective means available for detecting tuberculosis in children, according to Mrs. Web Townsend, president of the Association.

School Opening Calendar Set

The school officials are working to have everything in readiness for the opening of school on September 2. High school seniors will register at 8 a.m. on August 29; juniors at 1 p.m. on the same day; sophomores will register at 8 a.m. and freshmen at 1 p.m. on August 30. Eighth graders will register at 8 a.m. August 31. High school classes will run on full schedule September 2, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

All students from the first through the seventh grades will register at 9 a.m. September 2. First grade students will report to the Lamar School for registration. All beginners must present birth certificates and evidence that they have been vaccinated against small pox before they can register. They will remain in school the remainder of the day.

All students in grades two through seven will register in their respective rooms according to alphabetic postings on the classroom doors at 9 a.m. September 2. After registration, the students will be grouped for instruction by the same alphabetical method as in previous years. Students will remain in school all day on September 2.

The Dryden bus will begin operations on September 2 and will run on the same time schedule as last term.

A general faculty meeting will be at 1 p.m., August 31, at which time teachers will receive information and supplies for the year's work. The faculty is complete with the exception of one fifth grade teacher.

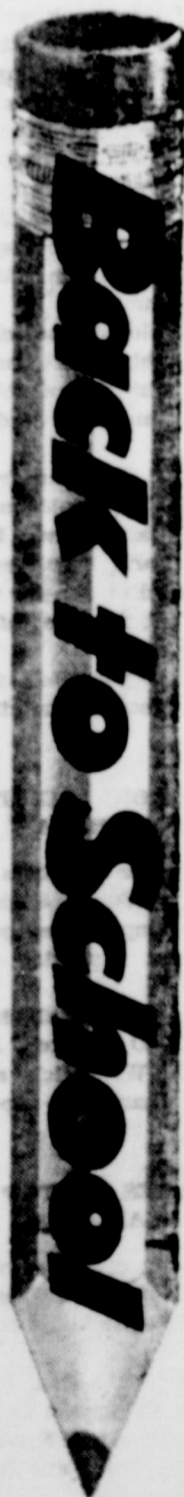

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE.

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of political subdivisions of this State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, or who are or have been compensated in whole or in part by the State through any other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of political subdivisions of this State. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1(a) of Article V of the Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 45a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as otherwise provided by the State. The amount of the contribution to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose by the State, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by the agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent School Fund or for the University Fund or for the State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the principal and interest on such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of the retroactive character of the same."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AMENDING SUBSECTION (a) OF SECTION 62, ARTICLE XVI OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO ESTABLISHMENT OF A RETIREMENT, DISABILITY AND DEATH COMPENSATION FUND FOR OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49c OF ARTICLE III, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF BONDS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CREATE THE TEXAS WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CERTAIN POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OR BODIES POLITICAL AND CORPORATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS IN THE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE WATER RESOURCES OF THE STATE, PROVIDING FOR THE PERMANENT FUND TO BE CREATED BY THE SALE OF SUCH BONDS; CREATING AN AGENCY TO ADMINISTER SAID FUND AND TO PERFORM OTHER DUTIES PRESCRIBED BY LAW, LIMITING THE PERIOD DURING WHICH FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE MAY BE GRANTED, AND PROVIDING FOR THE CALLING OF AN ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION AND ISSUANCE OF A PROCLAMATION THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section, to read as follows: "Section 49c. There is hereby created the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be provided by law, together with such other duties and restrictions as may be provided by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be provided by law. "The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or hereafter to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be secured in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, in the various political subdivisions or bodies political and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 55 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storage and conservation of its streams and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods. "Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest on any of such indebtedness and manner of repayment as may be provided by law. "While any of the bonds authorized by the provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such indebtedness outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board. "From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1952, moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such moneys shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1952, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance, as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, and the amount of such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be applied to said fund, as provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. "All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the subscribers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their retroactive nature. "Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 10th day of November, 1957, a date being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS ADDING A NEW SECTION, TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 49c OF ARTICLE III, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF TWO HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$200,000,000) IN BONDS BY THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CREATE THE TEXAS WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CERTAIN POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OR BODIES POLITICAL AND CORPORATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS IN THE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE WATER RESOURCES OF THE STATE."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS ADDING A NEW SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION 49c OF ARTICLE III, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF TWO HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$200,000,000) IN BONDS BY THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CREATE THE TEXAS WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO CERTAIN POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OR BODIES POLITICAL AND CORPORATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS IN THE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE WATER RESOURCES OF THE STATE." "Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.
