LISTEN TO LUKE

The special session of the Texas Legislature will be history making as well as a means of staking the course for Gov. Price Daniel in his campaign for re-election.

Should the Legislature enact the four laws which were vital in the campaign of the Governor, it would give him an affirmative approach in campaigning for another term.

Failure of the Legislature to adopt the program would put the blame on the lawmakers for their failure to give Texas the program he thinks they want.

Daniel has deemed imperative the state's needs for four points of his program that the Legislators failed to pass in the regular session this year.

They are: 1. A long-range water program predicated primarily on a state-wide master plan for water conservation and flood control; 2. A strict lobby registration and control bill; 3. Creation of a commission to study ways and means of improving law enforcement, criminal procedure and crime prevention, as a substitute for the plan he advanced earlier that got the dubious tag of a state-wide grand jury; 4. Legislation to require registration of persons who appear before state agencies, applying to legislators as well as others.

This column predicts that the lobbyist control and the water legislation to be the toughest of the four to get passed.

Gov. Daniel is determined to hold the legislature solely to the four-point program as long as he can. There are those lawmakers, however, who will insist on submitting more and more stronger aimed at preserving segregated public schools.

Gov. Daniel cannot escape the fate of that controversial question. There is no doubt but that the Governor would be able to handle any kind of integration problem without the use of state or federal troops. And we believe he would meet that kind of a situation in a dignified and sensible manner.

We would like to take time out in this column to praise the spirit that was manifested at last Friday night's football game.

Players for the crippled local team went into the game with all the fire and fight they could muster. They were truly to be commended for the fine spirit shown and the courage which was used to get through the game.

The Eagles have had everything possible to discourage them. It seems, but with a brave front and courageous fight they entered the game as though they knew everything would work out alright for them.

Then, let us pass a bouquet to Ozona's Coach Pete Hickman and the Lions for the sportsmanship displayed during all of the game. It is a pity that the

Lane Striping Done at School

Safety lane striping was completed in the streets surrounding the local schools last Saturday. The stripes are yellow for easy visibility and denote walking lanes for the school children to cross the streets.

The children have been warned to cross the streets only at the designated lanes and motorists are warned to observe caution when driving on the streets adjacent to the school buildings and watch for children who may be crossing in the lanes or who may, through carelessness, walk across the street out of the designated crossing places.

Boys from the elementary school halted traffic on the streets by the school all day Saturday to prevent cars from marring the fresh paint.

Band students cross the street between the band house and the school ground at various times during the school day and they have been asked to use the crossing lanes for their protection.

Homecoming At Methodist Church Here Last Sunday

The first homecoming for the congregation of the local Methodist Church Sunday proved to be a successful occasion from every standpoint. About 150 had registered by noon, including several former members from out of town.

A barbecue dinner was served at noon in Fellowship Hall, the food being prepared by members and friends of the church.

A special project of the occasion was an endeavor to raise \$675 to clear the present indebtedness on the church and to pay for the lot east of the church which was purchased recently.

An amount of \$773.10 was contributed Sunday. With the payment of the last note due on the church building in December, a dedication service will be held early next year. The present building was completed in 1945.

The Sanderson church was organized in 1899, a part of the Marathon and Valentine circuit, with the parsonage located at Marathon. The church's first full-time pastor, Rev. W. M. Justice, came in 1928. The Dryden church was organized in 1930 and since that time has been on the two-point charge with Sanderson, one pastor serving both churches.

Rev. Kelley E. Scott, on sabbatical leave from the Alabama conference, is the present pastor. Dr. Joe B. Scrimshire of Carlsbad, N. M., is the district superintendent.

Another high-light of the day for local Methodists was the attainment of a goal of 100 in attendance at the Sunday night services. There were 114 present for the evening worship.

S. L. Stumberg reported only 2-inch in showers Saturday and Monday nights. There was almost 1-inch of moisture in local gauges Sunday morning and a trace of rain fell locally Monday night.

Clouds have continued to build up in area skies, but only scattered showers have been reported. There was an indication of some rain falling east of this area Tuesday night, but no reports of rain have come in.

Most ranchmen of the area stated that on Saturday night there was a heavy display of lightning and loud thunder in all parts of the county.

Big Lake Game Is Forfeited

Supt. Matt Bader announced Wednesday afternoon that the Sanderson schools had notified officials in Big Lake that they would forfeit the football game Friday night. The game was to have been the first conference game for the Eagles.

Supt. Bader stated that the forfeiture of the game was due to additional injuries received by players this week, weakness of some players from recent cases of "flu", additional sickness this week, on top of the injuries already incurred which has weakened the team in numbers.

Supt. Bader stated that he felt the Eagles just would not be able to field a team that would offer any competition to the strong Owls.

He added that the game this week was the only action taken by the coaches and officials of the school.

Coach Don Phillips was full of praise for the type of football ability displayed by the local boys, for their sportsmanship during the game, and their conduct before and after the game. He stated that several of the Del Rio residents expressed similar feelings to him prior to their leaving that city after the ball game.

The Pony score came in the second quarter after a drive of 45 yards. Sanderson was threatening in the same period when the half ended, according to Phillips.

The Eaglet tally came in the third period after Samuel Fuentz had broken through the Pony line to blocked a punt. Martin Salazar and Bill Stavley sparked the backfield drive to the 5-yard line from where Herman Fuentz went over on a roll-out from the quarterback position. The extra point try failed by inches, according to Phillips.

The Eaglet defense was superb during the second half, Phillips stated and the Ponies were not able to move against the determined defensive line.

Sanderson put out two serious threats to scoring in the last period, but the Pony defense was holding well to retain the 1-point lead.

Ozona Wins 27-6 Over Eagles Here

The Ozona Lions scored three touchdowns in the first period to gain a 20-0 halftime lead over the Sanderson Eagles here last Friday night in a non-conference game. The Lions put another score across in the third frame to wind up their scoring.

Sanderson's score also came in the third period. Sanderson punted at the end of their first series of downs and on the second play Ozona's Sutton went 36 yards for a TD. The extra point was a kick by Sutton.

The second score was on a pass from Williams, quarterback, to Jacobs, end, who finished a 26-yard scoring play. The try for the extra point kick by Sutton was no good.

The third TD was on another pass from Williams to Jacobs who lateraled to Sikes who finished the sprint to the goal line. The play was good for 45 yards and another 6 points. Sutton converted the PAT.

David Graham, Eagle back, broke into the clear in the third quarter to put Sanderson in the scoring column. It was an 80-yard run after a hand-off from the quarterback Julian Rodriguez. The try for the extra point was a run that ended in a fumble.

The final score for Ozona was on the Sanderson kick-off return when Sutton lateraled to Williams who completed the 90-yard touchdown play.

Sanderson had a total of six first downs to 12 for Ozona. The Eagles completed 1 pass out of six tries and Ozona completed 8 of 26 tries.

Sanderson received two 15-yard penalties for clipping and 3 off-side penalties for a total of 45 yards. Ozona received five 15-yard penalties for offensive holding and one 15-yard penalty for clipping, one off-side penalty and one illegal motion penalty for five yards each, totaling 100 yards in penalties.

Irvin Robbins, Eagle quarterback, is out of the grid game for the season with two cracked neck vertebra, Quirino Alva has a broken vertebra in the back, Tommy Werneking, an injured knee, which will hamper the local boys' chances of making any showing during district competition which begins next week with a game against Big Lake there.

Brucks Bader, regular guard for the Eagles, converted into a backfielder during the Ozona game and gave a good showing of his power and shifting ability to make several good gaining runs against Ozona.

Sen. Yarborough Is Speaker Here

U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough was in Sanderson for about one hour Wednesday afternoon and spoke to about 50 local citizens at the Orchid Cafe.

Sen. Yarborough was introduced by Terrell County Democratic Chairman W. W. Sudduth who also introduced several visitors from Fort Stockton.

The Senator hit the Republican administration early in his talk by referring to them as the 4-F administration — fumbling, foolish, flizzle and frazzle. He blamed the loss of being the first to launch the earth satellite in the administration, and stated that the accomplishment of the launching of the first satellite by the Russians was "the greatest scientific accomplishment of this age."

He said the satellite was a major factor in the political, propaganda, diplomatic, and scientific field today.

In referring to the scientific accomplishment, he told the group how exacting a feat it was to have launched the rocket, and stated the "beeps" being sent back to earth were actually codes transmitting desired information back to the Russians.

Sen. Yarborough was asked of recent developments in Little Rock and he replied that his recent travels have kept him pretty well out of contact with the situation, but again rapped the administration with the statement that had "F.D.R. been in the White House, he would have handled the situation much more easily."

Sen. Yarborough promised his support of West Texas in legislative matters and promised to help in any way he could, but added that the help most needed was rain, and that was a little out of his power.

The Senator thanked the people of Sanderson for their warm welcome and for the honor to him of leaving their jobs and businesses to come out and meet him. He was introduced to each person present.

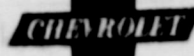

State Capitol NEWS

There's talk now of not just one, but two special sessions of the Legislature.

East Texas House members, who served as a tightly-knit team in pushing pro-segregation laws last spring, are asking Gov. Price Daniel for a chance to put through some more.

Texas needs laws to prevent the kind of trouble that developed in Little Rock, say the East Texans. Specifically, they propose (1) a law to allow local boards to close schools in case of riots or occupation by troops and (2) a measure directing the Attorney General to assist local school systems involved in federal suits to enforce integration.

Daniel said. "It may be we should take some further action." But he said he thought the East Texans were wise in not suggesting the segregation issues be added to the agenda of the session which opened on Monday. It was called to work on lobby registration, regulation of practice before state agencies, water conservation and crime study. Most observers think thrashing out all the details on these will take a full 30 days.

Four Indicted

Travis County courts, which serve as the arena in which the state officials are taken to task, are due many more months of statewide attention.

After four months of studying the history of the ICT Insurance Co., a Travis grand jury returned perjury indictments against former Insurance Commissioners Garland A. Smith and J. Byron Saunders. It also indicted ICT's onetime manager Ben Jack Cage, on charges of bribing the commissioners. Also Smith's son-in-law, Max Wayne Rychlik, on perjury charges.

Jurors recommended state laws be strengthened, particularly in regard to liabilities and responsibilities of company officers and board members.

There wasn't time to go into legislative lobbying, said the weary jury. But it urged a law requiring registration and expense reports by lobbyists.

Proof that the jury's tiresome task took its toll was the hospitalization of one member just as the term ended, reportedly suffering from "physical exhaustion."

Water Preview

Sectional rivalries and lack of money have hobbled past efforts for an overall water conservation program in Texas. So said speakers at the Texas Water Conservation Association meeting where water problems confronting the special legislative sessions were previewed.

State Water Board Chairman

K. M. Dixon said his department has never had enough money to carry out its assigned duties. He asked for more money to gather data and pay salaries comparable with other state departments.

House Speaker Waggoner Carr pointed out the legislators have had trouble getting together on a water program because they reflect the conflicting ideas of their constituents, said Carr. He urged cooperation.

Gov. Daniel recommended a water plan to take care of the needs up to the year 2000. "We can go forward," he said, "and guarantee the future growth and prosperity of our state, or do nothing and face economic stagnation."

Water Amendment

Gov. Daniel has expressed great pleasure over the widespread interest in passage of the constitutional amendment for water development.

He pointed out that the measure, which is third on the Nov. 5 ballot, has received the endorsement of the state's leading organizations and associations.

"Each day's mail brings additional support from local civic

organizations and chambers of commerce, as well as private citizens interested in the welfare of Texas," the governor added.

Rod and Gun Statistics

Texans spend twice as much money to hunt and fish as they do for admission to all football, baseball and basketball games, plus all other spectator sports, plus all the movie and other theatrical attractions combined.

So said L. A. Wilke of the Texas Game and Fish Commission at a luncheon in Austin.

Here are some other facts with which Wilke surprised the Austin Rotarians: Anglers and hunters outnumber golfers 9 to 1. They also spend more on fishing and hunting than all Texans spend on medical and dental care and hospitalization insurance.

Flu Cases Pile Up

"That foreign flu" is getting familiar to Texans. Reported cases doubled in a week, according to the State Health Department, bringing the total of flu-like illnesses to 62,319.

A number of schools had to close after absences skyrocketed and many others cancelled foot-

ball games band concerts and other special events.

People in Brazos County, the home of Texas A&M, are unhappy. Their county was assigned auto license plates with the prefix letters TU. That, to Aggies, sounds too much like the initials of their arch-rival, the University of Texas. What they don't know is that tags with AM letters are now appearing on Austin cars.

Despite an attorney general's ruling that the House speaker and lieutenant governor are legally entitled to Capitol living quarters, former Sen. Joe Hill is still trying to get them thrown out. Hill has carried his fight to the Court of Civil Appeals where he contended the practice was unconstitutional and "ridiculous besides".
