Snows, Sleet Add to Moisture

West Texas residents were surprised to awaken to sub-freezing temperatures last Friday morning. Even a greater surprise was at the beginning of snowfall soon after daylight Friday. Snow and sleet fell most of the day Friday, causing about 1-1/2 inch of moisture to be left on ranges of the area. The freezing weather also was the cause of some discomfort to deer hunters in the West Texas area. Many hunters were reported to be caught short on ample bedding and clothing for such temperatures that prevailed over the week-end and had to call an early and unpredicted halt to their hunting trips. Snow and ice caused the closing of U.S. 90 at Paisano Pass, between Marfa and Alpine for most of the day Friday. There was considerable ice on road between Sanderson and Marathon.

Miles Pierce of Alpine will judge the breeding sheep show on Friday, December 13, at 2 p.m. The show will be a part of the F.F.A. Chapter's two-day show planned for December 13 and 14 in Sanderson. Guy Powell, County Agent at Kerrville, will judge the fat lambs divisions. For the first time, the show is being opened to entries from the counties adjoining Terrell County.

Big Attendance Expected Dec. 2-4 At TS&GRA Meet

Better and wetter days for the sheep and goat country will mean a large attendance at the 42nd Annual Convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association to be held in San Antonio on December 2-4, T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Ozona, TS&GRA president, predicts. The convention program has been completed, he announced. An outstanding roster of speakers include Texas' junior U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough; R. M. Dixon, chairman state board of Water Engineers; Max Schmitt, New York, President of the Wool Bureau; and Don Clyde, Heber City, Utah, President of the National Wool Growers Association. A new and unique feature will be a discussion on the value of Texas agriculture to business and industry by a panel of men from the Department of Agriculture Economics and Sociology, Texas A&M College. Committees covering activities in general affairs, livestock and wool will meet Monday afternoon, December 2, and their reports will be made Tuesday and Wednesday. "I anticipate a larger than usual attendance because of a better than usual feeling among the membership due to greatly improved range conditions which overshadow a slow wool and mohair market," Kincaid said. The annual membership banquet and dance will be held on Tuesday night. San Antonio interests will be hosts at a social hour and dinner Monday night.

Increased Control In Traffic Laws Over Week-End

"Increased traffic control will be put into effect over the Thanksgiving week-end," said Capt. Ray Butler, Department of Public Safety this week. Additional patrolmen will be placed on traffic detail as men from the License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection functions will join the Highway Patrol group in patrolling the highways in an effort to reduce motor vehicle traffic accidents. More radar units will be pressed into use both night and day in an effort to control speed violations which continue to be the leading causative factor in rural fatal and injury accidents. Your cooperation while driving is solicited by the Department of Public Safety in order that our annual Turkey day celebration will not be turned into a day of sorrow and regret, said Capt. Butler.

Deer Harvest Is Good Here

The deer harvest was good for most local hunters this year, according to information received in street conversation. The animals were also reported to be in good shape. Earliest and probably the easiest deer harvest of local men was by two nimrods who killed deer on the mountainside just south of town early the opening morning. Some other deer were reported taken only a short distance from town by other hunters. Many freak and large deer were brought into town during the eight-day season and hunters were pleased with their good luck. Many novice nimrods had the good fortune of a kill within a short time after leaving town in quest of antlered game.

Snow was heaviest in the western and northern parts of the county, but general benefits have been reported from all parts of the county. The snow fell intermittently all day Friday and into the night but had ceased before Saturday morning. More snow fell here Saturday night with heaviest reports coming from the northern part of the county where the ground was covered with snow. There was considerable moisture in the snow and sleet which fell Saturday night and added beneficial moisture to the ground where it fell. There was no runoff from the melting snow and good penetration of the moisture was evidenced. Most area ranchmen are hopeful of sufficient winter feed for their stock and the release of the necessity for feeding this winter, an uncommon outlook for most ranchmen during the past several years. A heavy frost was on the ground Sunday morning where it did not snow and on Monday and Tuesday mornings.

Still At It

Texans are riled about the tidelands again. A suit filed by U. S. Atty Gen Herbert Brownell the day before he left office seeks to establish the tidelands boundaries of Gulf Coastal states (including Texas) at three miles out. Texas claims tidelands 10 1/2 miles out by virtue of its 110-year-old annexation agreement with the U.S. A law passed by Congress in 1953 requires the federal government to respect the states' "historic boundaries."

the Legislature to protest to President Eisenhower concerning Brownell's action. Daniel, who co-sponsored the 1953 tidelands bill, read a letter from the President which said, in effect, that he would continue to honor Texas' claim.

House immediately passed a resolution in keeping with the governor's request.

Daniel said that Brownell "added insult to injury" by asking in his suit that Texas be required to pay to the federal government money received from leases on the tidelands beyond a three-mile limit. This would amount to more than \$26,000,000 which the state has salted away in the public school fund.

House also passed a resolution asking Congress to call a Constitutional Convention. Purpose would be to draft amendments limiting the power of the federal government where it infringes on state powers.

Cost of Crime Board of Corrections adopted a 1958 budget of \$4,045,720 to

take care of the all-time-high state prison population. However, only \$1,025,829 of this comes from tax money. The rest is earned by the various farming and manufacturing enterprises operated by inmates. Number behind bars has climbed to an average of 9,726 this year compared to 4,987 in 1947.

More Money for Texas

Texans have been getting richer faster than the average U.S. citizen in the past 27 years. University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports the average Texan's income increased 447 per cent from 1929-1957. U.S. average increase 279 per cent.

But there's a less rosy side. Last year Texas per capita income still hadn't caught up with the national average. It was \$1,686 compared to \$1,940.

Also drought, and farm depression have slowed Texas' rate of increase in incomes. However, said the Bureau report, some improvement in the farm incomes is expected this year.

Fiscal Hangover

Lawmakers who return for the next regular session in January of 1958, face a "morning after" atmosphere with a \$12,000,000 headache.

Last summer State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert predicted

the state would end this two-year period with a \$6,000,000 deficit. His latest estimate will double that figure.

Calvert revised his figures after voters this month approved a constitutional amendment upping state pension payments.

Legislators already are skating on the edge of financial embarrassment in their day-to-day operation, and for their salaries expenses, etc., was down into approximately \$45,000 when the first session ended. With costs running about \$11,000 a day, they were due to start drawing this week on the governor's deficiency fund, earmarked for "calamities".

But the real calamity, as many legislators see it, comes year after next when they will have to find a way to glue the "busted" budget together again. Most agree, gloomily, that it now means new taxes.

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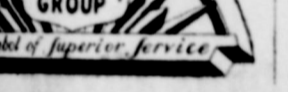
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Legion, Auxiliary In Joint Meeting

"monstrosity" to a shoulder-shrugging "better than nothing".

But they did pass — all five of the governor's requests.

Spokesman for the governor admitted that he wasn't exactly "thrilled" with the watered-down bill, but that he would accept it. In a public statement, Gov. Daniel commended the lawmakers for their accomplishments.

Briefly, the new laws do this:

1. Set up a water planning division to do research on Texas water resources and report to each regular session. No authority to draw up a statewide plan was conferred and the appropriation was cut from a recommended \$1,200,000 to \$800,000. Water Board was given authority to negotiate for state water

storage in federal reservoirs — with legislative approval.

2. Require registration of those who seek to influence legislation by "direct communication" and reporting of expenditures over \$50.

3. Require registration of those who, for pay, represent others before state agencies.

4. Set up a commission for the study of Texas law enforcement and report to the next regular session.

5. Appropriate money for a building for the State Insurance Department.
