Brown-Bassett Well Finaled: Goode, Canon Wells Drilling

Unofficial but reliable sources reveal that the Magnolia Petroleum Co.-Western Natural Gas Co. Brown-Bassett No. 1 has been finaled and is being cased to bottom-hole depth of 15,556 feet. Five and seven-eighths-inch

casing is being used. Drillers struck gas and gasdistillate at several levels with estimated production running above 65,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Drillers will perforate and acidize following hardening of cement and more accurate figures will be available for productivity of well.

Ellenburger production was indicated with the flowing of gas and is in the eastern part of the on eight drillstem tests, and Silurian production was indicated when the rig was destroyed by fire in July with an estimated flow of from 25 to 50 million cu-
