TV Practically **Assured Here**

Television has been practically assured for Sanderson within the next few months, according to information received recently.

The Sanderson Cable Co. has been experimenting for some time with a tower erected just north of town. Cable has been strung to bring the reception in to the Big Bend Gas Co. and the reports are that that group has ordered the installation of a 440-foot-high tower at the site of the present tower to increase the potential reception from a Midland station.

The reception received from the present installation has been spasmodically from good to poor and topography tests indicate the probability of much better reception with the increased height of the receiving

Spokesmen of the company stated that it was their intention to continue improvements until satisfactory reception was as-

The group that has been working with the possibility of local reception by the use of a translator unit, have reported gratifying results from recent tests and information from engineers of the translator manufacturing company who also install the unit.

An excellent quality of reception has been consistent on a mountain west of the S. L. Stumberg ranch house and tests have proved the possibility of line of sight transmission to a hill south of Sanderson and engineers state that relay into the town is available under the conditions that are listed above.

Complete plans and specifications will be received by the engineers within a short time.

The group reports that both Midland and Odessa may be received and tranmsitted from the site and the possibility of receiving both locally will depend only upon the advisability of the funds necessary for reception of the two stations.

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
