tI wouldn't take much in the way of money or effort to accomplish these projects — if they are worthwhile. And a few readers who have ideas on the matters, would be welcomed to express their opinions through our columns.

We know that there are many here who are interested in such things as a clinic or hospital, a new school, etc., etc., and we are interested, too, if some means can be worked out for the payment of such projects, and the assurance that an investment in such as a clinic would not put too much of a maintenance stress on the pocketbooks of the county.

We are afforded a new opportunity with the coming year, and this opportunity, like all others, presents itself only so many times, and then that's it.

We can either get blisters on our hands from work, or on our finger-tips from scratching our heads in wondering if it could be done.

Let's boost Sanderson and Terrell County during 1958.

Daniel named the newly-passed water conservation and planning measures as the most significant accomplishment during the first year of his administration. Texas is 25 years behind its neighbor states in this field. said the governor, but now can begin to catch up.

Looking ahead, the governor called on fellow citizens to square off for another round with the federal government. Two-thirds of Texas' multi-million-dollar tidelands are at stake. 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

To ground chuck add salt and Worcestershire sauce. Break meat into small chunks and place in hot skillet. Saute until brown; add stewed tomatoes and cubed potatoes. Cover. Simmer 20 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Serve with green salad and French bread. Makes 4 servings.
