Urgent Appeal To Dog Owners

An urgent appeal has been given to local dog owners by ranchers near Sanderson to keep their dogs tied, penned or controlled during the next several weeks. Ranchmen surrounding the town have been plagued to a far greater degree than normal in recent weeks by loose dogs roaming their pastures and taking a heavy toll among the sheep, lambs and grown sheep alike. Ranchmen state that with the price of lambs like they are now and like they appear to be at marketing time, the death of each lamb is a loss of from \$15 to \$25, depending on the market price and the weight each lamb would have attained. Dogs take a heavy toll among the sheep once they get started killing, they say, and the death loss due to dogs is exceptionally heavy this year, ranging up to \$100 and more per week, oftentimes. The ranchmen have tried to control the damage done by dogs by killing them, when possible, when they are caught in their pastures, and by the use of other exterminating methods within their pastures, but it is difficult, they say, to watch all of their country for the predator control. All understanding, cooperation, and efforts on the part of dog owners to prevent their animals from destroying the property of the ranchmen, will be appreciated, the ranchmen stated.

Sid Harkins Buys Arvin Estate Ranch

The first sale of ranch land in this area in several years occurred last week when Sid Harkins bought the Cecil H. Arvin ranch from heirs of the Arvin Estate. The ranch consisted of 20,257 acres and lies in Terrell and Pecos Counties in the north central part of Terrell County. Harkins has operated the ranch under lease for a number of years. Mrs. J. New Highway Map Is In Circulation

The new 1958 Official Highway Travel Map has been issued by the Texas Highway Department, according to information released this week. The maps may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, or at highway district offices. County tax offices have map cards available for requesting copies of the map. There are 1,812 cities listed on the map. State and U.S. highways have been increased by 2,026 miles, since the map of 1948, and farm-to-market roads have been increased from 620 miles to 17,136 miles. The map reflects a total of 43,292 miles of highways. There are 1,026 roadside parks pinpointed as pleasant stopping places. Divided highways also show a startling jump in the 10-year period. In 1948 there were only 110 miles of divided highways shown. Now there are 1,007 miles marked on the map with the black bands and red center indicating divided highways. County Safety Group Hears Daniel Speak On Traffic Accidents

A group of interested citizens, the sheriff's department, highway patrolmen, and county officials were on hand Wednesday morning at the courthouse to hear the broadcast by Governor Price Daniel. The Governor cited the traffic accident victims in the past year as a challenge to the law enforcement officers as well as the citizens. It is his aim, he said, to reduce the fatalities and injuries caused by highway and street accidents in Texas by using every means of education and law enforcement and co-operation by all the enforcement agencies. "More than one-third of the fatalities on Texas highways," the Governor said, "were due to drunken driving." He further stated that he had never, since he had been Governor, reinstated a driver's license that had been cancelled on a DWI charge, and that he never would. Speeding was listed as the second highest killer in accidents. School officials present were heartily in favor of the driver education program and felt that safety taught to school children will have a lasting effect on the habits of the student driver in later years.

A resident of Big Bend National Park since 1937, Hinson had been known as the unofficial mayor of Study Butte and president of the smallest Chamber of Commerce in Texas. Survivors include his wife, two nieces, Mrs. Ella Hill of Alpine and Mrs. S. L. Stumberg of Sanderson; three nephews, Davis Hinson of George West, Wayne Hinson of Del Rio and C. G. Riggins of Sanderson. Attending the funeral services from Sanderson were Mr. and Mrs. Riggins, Mr. and Mrs. Stumberg, and Mrs. C. P. Peavy.

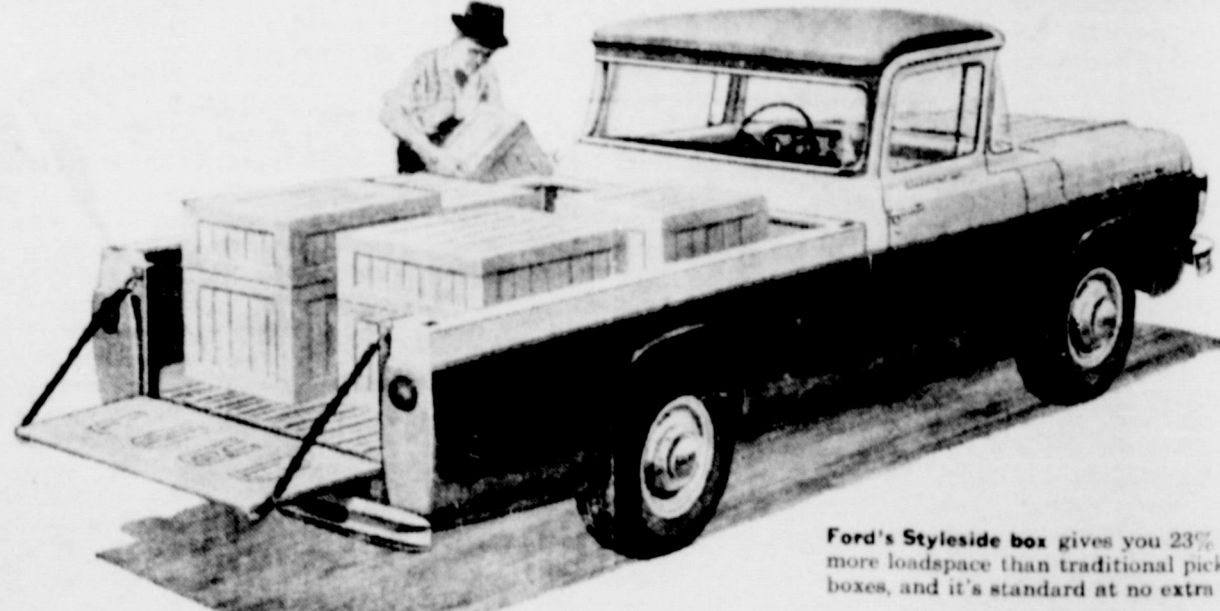
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**Book Review Given

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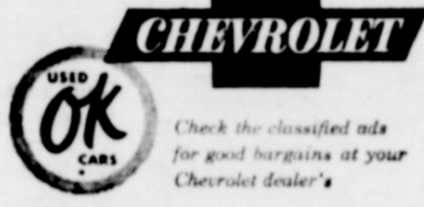

TAKE NOTICE that a petition for the creation of Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 has been set down for hearing before the Commissioners Court of Terrell County, Texas, in the Courtroom thereof in the Courthouse in the City of Sanderson, Texas, at 10 o'clock A.M., on the 19th day of May, 1958, in obedience to an order made by the County Judge of said County on the 23rd day of April, 1958, which is as follows:

WHEREAS, on the 23rd day of April, 1958, a petition signed by more than fifty persons owning land within the proposed district was presented to me praying for the creation and establishment of Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, in Terrell County, Texas, which petition is in words and figures as follows:

PETITION FOR WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF TERRELL
TO THE HONORABLE COUNTY JUDGE AND COMMISSIONERS COURT OF TERRELL COUNTY, TEXAS.

Pursuant to Articles 7880-1 to 7880-147, inclusive, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, and all amendments thereto, we, the undersigned landowners within the boundaries hereinafter set forth, hereby respectfully petition your Honorable Body for the organization of a Water Control and Improvement District within the terms and provisions of Section 59, of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas, and in respect to the organization of such district respectfully show as follows:

I. That the name of said proposed district shall be "TERRELL COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1."

II. That said proposed district contains an area of approximately 1586 acres, more or less, and lies wholly within the County of Terrell and the State of Texas.

III. That the boundaries of said proposed district shall be as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of Section 4, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company.

Thence, with the west line of said Section 4, Block 151, N. 0 deg 25 E to its intersection with the south line of the Southern Pacific Railway right-of-way.

Thence, with said south line of the Southern Pacific Railway right-of-way N 66 deg 22' W 4,000 feet to a point.

Thence, from this point N 0 deg 25 E across the north line of Section 15, Block 152, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company crossing the north line of Section 14, Block 152 a total distance of 7,000 feet to a point.

Thence, S 89 deg 35' E 2,850 feet to a point.

Thence, S 0 deg 25' W to a point in the north line of Section 15, Block 152, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company.

Thence, with said north line of Section 15, Block 152 in an easterly direction S 89 deg 35' E to the northwest corner of Section 4, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company.

Thence, N 0 deg 25' E 1,000 feet with the west line of Section 3, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company.

Thence, with the east line of said Section 3, Block 151, S 0 deg 25' W 1,000 feet to the northeast corner of Section 4, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company; this being the northwest corner of Section 9, Block 151 of the E. L. & R. R. Railway Company.

Thence, in an easterly direction S 09 deg 35' E 1,200 feet to a point.

Thence, S 0 deg 25' W, cross the south line of Section 9, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company, 7,000 feet to a point in Section 8, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway Company.

Thence, N 89 deg 35' W to the westerly right-of-way line of the Southern Pacific Railway.

Thence, in a northerly direction

tion with westerly right-of-way line of the Southern Pacific Railway to its intersection with the south line of Section 4, Block 151, E. L. & R. R. Railway.

Thence, in a westerly direction N 89 deg 35' W with the south line of said Section 4, Block 151, to its southwest corner, the point of beginning.

IV. That said proposed district is to be organized under the provisions of Section 59, of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas, as provided in Chapter 25, General Laws enacted by the 39th Legislature at its Regular Session in 1925, and amendments thereto.

V. That the purpose of the organization of said district shall be for and include the control, storing, preservation and distribution of its waters and flood waters, the waters of its rivers and streams, including waterworks purposes, the same to be accomplished by any and all practicable means.

VI. That the general nature of the work to be done is the purchase, construction, improvement, installation, maintenance and operation of a waterworks system, and such other purchase, construction, improvement, installation, maintenance and operation of such additional facilities, systems, plants and enterprises, as shall be consonant with the purposes for which the district is organized.

VII. That a public necessity exists for the organization of such district so as to provide for the purchase, construction, improvement, maintenance and operation of such waterworks system; that said project is practicable and feasible due to the availability of the water and the nature of the soil and contour of the land and will serve and be a benefit to all land within said district and the residents thereof, and will be a public benefit and utility, and that the creation of said district will further the public welfare.

VIII. That it is estimated by your petitioners from information available at this time that such waterworks system will cost approximately \$250,000, more or less.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners respectfully pray that this petition be set down for hearing, as provided by law, and that a date be fixed for such hearing, and that notice of such hearing be given, as provided by law, and that such hearing be held and that thereupon this petition be in all things granted, and that the proposed Water Control and Improvement District be created and that directors of such district be appointed, as provided by law, and your petitioners hereby further pray for all other and orders necessary and appropriate in the premises, even though not herein specifically mentioned.

RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED, this 23rd day of April, 1958.

And it appearing that said petition is signed by more than fifty (50) land owners in the proposed district, and that said petition has been filed in the Office of the County Clerk of Terrell County, and recorded in a book kept for that purpose in the office of said County Clerk, and that it is in due form and for legal purposes as provided in Section 59, Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas, and statutes enacted pursuant thereto, and that said petition should be heard by the Commissioners Court of Terrell County, Texas.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, R. S. Wilkinson, in my official capacity as County Judge of said County, and as authorized by Article 7880-14, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, do hereby order that said petition be and the same is hereby set down for hearing before the Commissioners Court in the Courtroom thereof in the Courthouse in the City of Sanderson, Texas, at 10 o'clock A.M., on the 19th day of May, 1958.

Upon such hearing any person whose land is included in or would be affected by the creation of such district may appear and contest the creation of such district and may offer testimony to show that such district is or is not necessary, would or would not be a public utility, and would or would not be feasible or practicable. Also any interested person may appear at such hearing and offer testimony with reference thereto.

The County Clerk of this County shall issue a notice of said hearing, which notice shall contain a statement of the nature and purpose thereof. The date and time and place of hearing. The Sheriff of Terrell County, Texas, shall post one copy of said notice at the Courthouse door of said County for fifteen (15) days prior to the date of hearing, and the Sheriff shall cause said notice to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County once a week for two consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of hearing. The Sheriff shall make due return of service thereof with copy and affidavit of publication attached on the original notice prior to the date of hearing.

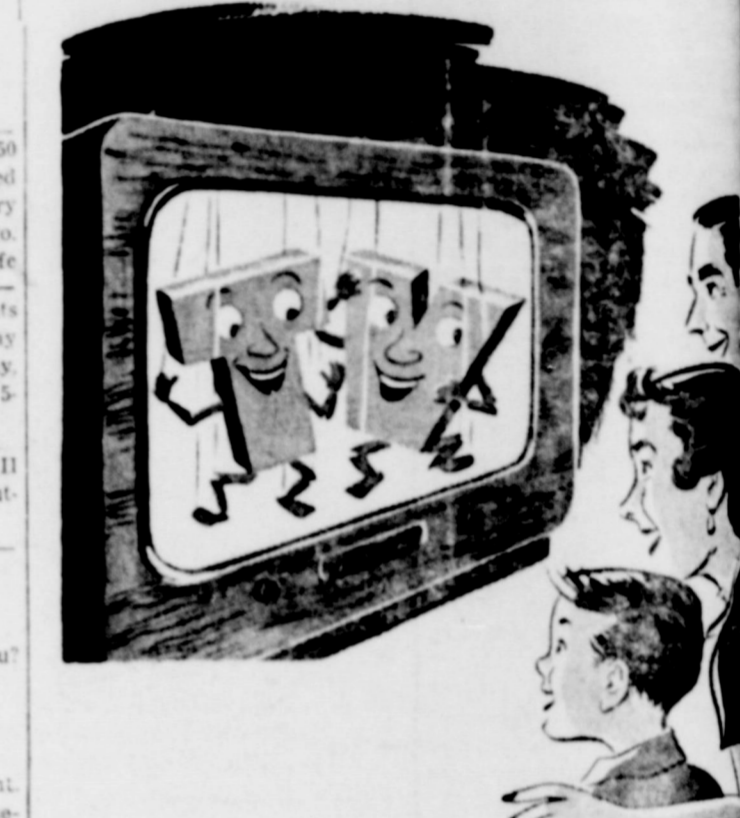
