## LISTEN TO LUKE

Next Monday the Commission Court will hear testimony and against the formation of a water district in Sanderson, those opposing the proposition will be given every opportunity to state their objections while those in favor will be given an equal opportunity to bring out their views.

It has not been the purpose of the steering committee to try to force an issue that might be distasteful to anyone here and their efforts have not been along a line of dictatorial or forceful measures, rather for an improvement of the situation if possible — of a situation that exists at present which may be remedied and which could possibly help the town of Sanderson in development and growth.

The initial action to try to form the district was to enable it possible — the procurement of FHA-guaranteed loans for citizens interested. Public ownership of the water utility is one of the prerequisites for such loans under existing rules of the Federal Government.

It could possibly also work toward the procurement of a more substantial water supply or more water for the same cost.

It could also turn out to be a detriment to the people within the district. That would depend, in a large measure, on the intelligent administration of the district by the directors, or by fate. Its success would be dependent upon the same sources.

The court will grant or deny permission for the election for the formation of the district and all — if the vote favors the formation of the district — name temporary directors. The directors will then have charge of all other transactions and actions of the water district.

Building activity here is on the grade now and it is hoped that more will follow. Sanderson needs more building and it is the general opinion that even more will be needed in the future.

Rains continue to fall in all parts of the country while Terrell County gets a good show of clouds, thunder and lightning. Monday night there was near a quarter of an inch of precipitation here and things began to look up for a short time. Continuing cloudy skies give hopes for more rainfall.

Conditions are looking much better in the economic situation throughout the country as indications point to a better retail business everywhere. With the general situation there is and has been little change at any time, there have been railroad layoffs, which is nationwide, but more than that locally there is unemployment and the people have a little money to buy some of the things they want.

Some of our politicians have been sore because the administration has not seen fit to throw away some of the money that has been collected.

## of C. Directors Hear Reports of Committees

The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce Directors met in regular session Monday night at the court house with eight directors and the secretary-manager present.

Various committee reports were heard by the directors. The committee on traffic signs at the residential section of Sanderson will meet with the commissioners' Court Monday to make recommendations on the location of signs, the type of signs, etc.

## Rare Collection Of Historic Books Given to Sul Ross

Dr. Bryan Wildenthal of Sul Ross State College has announced that the college has just acquired the rare library and collections of Texana and Americana which the late Capt. Roy W. Aldrich, former Texas Ranger and world traveler, accumulated over a period of 60 years.

The books come to the college as a gift of former students, professors and friends of Sul Ross.

The 10,000-volume Aldrich Library contains a large number of rare and historically important sources of information which are not found elsewhere, according to Dr. Wildenthal. He added that the collection also contains rare books dealing with Texas and western early history and frontier people who made it.

"We feel that students, writers, and others requiring rich research deposits will turn to Sul Ross for what they require as a result of this library becoming available to the public," Dr. Wildenthal stated.

The game will be against Merkle. It was decided to have a two-out-of-three playoff for the bi-district title, with the last game or games to be played in Merkle.

The crew expects to be here about two months. They are making an elevations map for all of the Big Bend area including across the Rio Grande River.

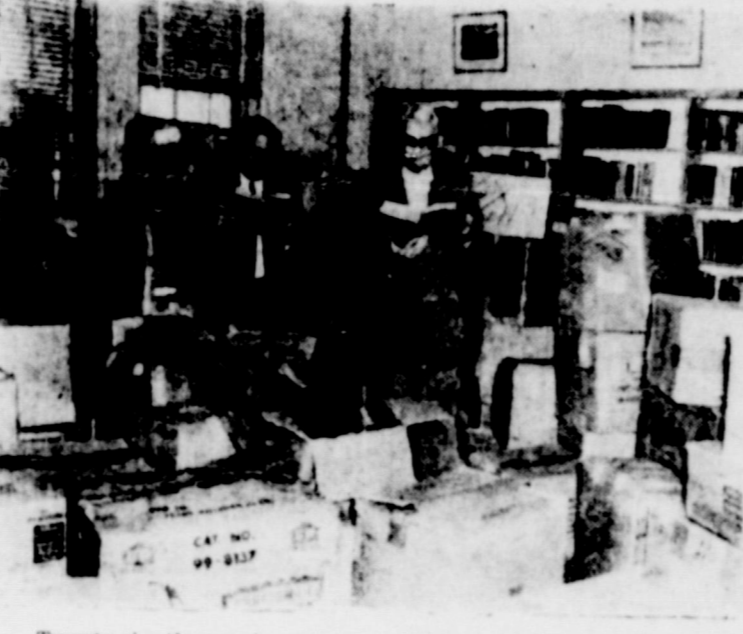
The crew is making use of aerial maps of the area. When completed the maps will be marked off and published in quadrants and will show elevations only on this area.

## Policies Told For School Functions

School picnic and party policies as outlined by High School Principal Thurman White, are being published to provide information for parents and patrons planning future events.

1. Sponsor of class must go on all school picnics or parties.
2. A parent or responsible adult must be in each car.
3. Buses may be used if a licensed driver is obtained. Class sponsor is to ride on the bus.
4. Students on school picnics or parties are under school supervision and authority.
5. Room mothers are asked to go if possible.
6. At least four parents from each class must go on trips.
7. Class sponsors should see that these policies are carried out.
8. If these policies are not carried out, the trips are not considered school trips. School will not furnish transportation or school time for planning, and school insurance will not be valid.

## 'Show Me Day' Well Attended In Big Bend Park

Two hundred and thirty-four visitors toured the Big Bend National Park last Thursday, participating in the "Show Me Day" sponsored by the Alpine Chamber of Commerce and the Big Bend National Park Development Committee. Businessmen, newspapermen, radio, and government officials and managers of a number of West Texas state parks were among the visitors.

The caravan left Alpine Thursday morning at 8:30. Coffee and doughnuts were served to the group at Santa Helena Canyon and a chicken barbecue lunch was served in the basin. The tour terminated at the Rio Grande Village, near the entrance to Boquillas Canyon, where sandwiches and coffee were served.

The trip was planned to give emphasis to area towns on the developments of the park and on future construction plans under the Park Development Committee.

## Deferment Is Way To Hit Bitterweed, Local Rancher Says

Clarence Chandler, vice-chairman of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District, has found that deferred grazing and proper utilization of vegetation is the best way to fight bitterweed.

Chandler's ranch is located on the Pecos River, northeast of Sanderson. Three years ago he had a heavy stand of bitterweed along the river. By deferring during the growing season and light stocking, Chandler has improved his grass to the point that the bitterweed has been crowded out, according to reports.

Chandler thinks this is the best way to control bitterweed. Spraying or pulling is expensive, he says, and must be repeated each year. Deferred grazing and proper use are practices in Chandler's conservation plan. The plan was developed by Chandler with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service furnished through the local district.

**Ellis McDougal Breaks Hip**  
Ellis McDougal received a fractured hip in an accident while fishing near Guaymas, Mexico, this week.

McDougal was sitting on a chair in camp and leaned over toward his cot. He became over-balanced and fell from the chair, his hip striking a Dutch oven. Two friends on the trip with him brought him back to a Fort Stockton hospital Tuesday and was taken to an El Paso hospital Wednesday for orthopedic surgery.

## Two County Wells Below 10,500 Feet

Terrell County's two wells being drilled were both below 10,500 feet this week.

Richardson & Bass No. 1 M. H. Goode has been drilling with mud for the past several weeks and unofficial reports are that they plan to set casing in the near future. Future drilling after new casing may be with air, according to the report.

Earlier reports from this well were that the formations were running high and interested parties have been eagerly watching developments during the past several days, but no information indicating a strike has come from the operators or from activity in the well area.

Brown-Bassett No. 2 being drilled by Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co. has been drilling with gas since they spudded in and has been making hole at the rate of over 2,000 feet a week, expecting to reach 12,500 feet by sometime next week, according to reports.

The Goode well is on section 6 of Block R, the B-B well is on 216, Block Y.

Unofficial but accurate information is that Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co. intend to drill another well in the near vicinity of Brown-Bassett No. 2 soon.

It is understood that the well will be in section 30, Block 161, southeast of B-B No. 2.

## Out-Dated Licenses May Be Renewed By State's Drivers

"If you once held a driver's license in Texas and still have the license in your possession, regardless of the expiration date, it may be renewed, by going to the driver's license office, said J. B. Hart, Captain of the Driver License Service, Midland region.

An effort to improve drivers' license service was revealed this week by Major Wilson E. Spier, Commander of Region 4 of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

If you hold a license that has expired within the last five years you may renew it by mailing your full name, birth date, and description, along with the statutory fee to DPS Headquarters in Austin for a new license.

At the same time, Major Spier pointed out that Highway Patrolmen are intensifying their drivers' license checks for drivers who are driving on expired licenses or no license at all.

Motorists may expect periodic checks for drivers licenses at any time, Major Spier pointed out. The drivers' license patrolman for this area is in Sanderson on the fourth Thursday of each month for the purpose of giving examinations and accepting renewals of licenses.

## Buster Babb Resigns Post As Deputy Sheriff

Buster Babb revealed his resignation as deputy sheriff this week. The resignation is effective June 1, 1958, according to Babb.

He has held the position as deputy to Sheriff Lee Billings for the past three years.

Babb stated that he appreciated the attitude and cooperation of the law-abiding citizens of this county and expressed his thanks to them for making his job as deputy sheriff as pleasant as possible.

Babb stated that his plans for the future were uncertain.

## Two Years Left For Eligibility By WWII Vets

Veterans of World War II have two more years — until July 25, 1960 — to apply for GI loans under the Veterans Administration guaranty program.

M. P. Wilkerson, Loan Guaranty Officer of the VA regional office in San Antonio, said the extension is authorized by Public Law 85-364.

Mr. Wilkerson explained the 1960 deadline for guaranteed loans means that VA must receive the lender's loan guaranty application by that date.

VA has up to one year after July 25, 1960, for processing GI loan applications received before that date.

The 1960 deadline does not apply to VA-guaranteed loans for Korean conflict veterans, who have until January 31, 1965, to use that benefit, Wilkerson pointed out.

## Water District Hearing By Commissioners To Be Monday

A hearing has been called before the Commissioners' Court of Terrell County for Monday, May 19, at 10 a.m. The purpose of the hearing is to hear testimony pro and con on the proposal for the formation of a water district.

The hearing is the result of a petition to the County Judge by 50 or more qualified voters within the bounds of the proposed district.

According to the petition and order of the County Judge for the hearing, the Commissioners' Court will hear testimony for and against the feasibility and practicability of such a water district and whether or not such a utility would benefit the people it serves.

The outcome of the hearing will be an allowing or disallowing of an election by qualified voters within the proposed boundaries of the proposed district as to whether or not a majority of the voters favor the formation of such a district.

The Commissioners Court and the local steering committee urge all those opposed to the formation, and all those favoring the formation of the district to be on hand at the hearing so that any further action on the part of the Commissioners or the steering committee will be with the will of the majority and with the backing and sanction of the people.

It is hoped that the hearing will bring out testimony and information that will be enlightening to all local citizens interested in the formation of the district, those both for or against.

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## State Debt Study Proposed by R.M.A.

A study of ways to reduce state expenditures to meet a state government deficit rather than seek additional revenue by imposing new taxes has been recommended by the Retail Merchants Association of Texas as the best solution to the state's money ills.

Mrs. C. P. Peavy, local manager said this week.

The organization voted to request a study of ways of achieving economy in the state government.

The study should include possible consolidation of departments and agencies, the elimination of useless and unnecessary services and a closer scrutiny of all state expenses, according to the RMA.

The tax study is being made by the Texas State Tax Study Commission and the Texas Research League at present, and most of the time has been devoted to hearing arguments pro and con of various types of new taxes that might be imposed. The current study is being made because of a possible deficit of \$50 to \$100 million.

The RMA also has voted to support corrective legislation that would reduce the cost and expedite the collection of small claims and debts. Small claims courts can take action only on cases involving \$50 or less, except wage and salary claims. The RMA is asking for \$100 minimum for all action. They also seek to have jurisdiction of justice courts raised in cases involving \$500 — the present maximum is \$200.

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## Ore from Big Bend Has Range of Uses

Marathon — An ore which will be mined near here may be used to spray the backyard fence, chill the milk or put out a fire.

A Dow Chemical Co. spokesman said Thursday flourspar, a chemical combination of calcium and fluorine, is used as a flux in open hearth steel furnaces and to produce polished stainless steel. It is also used to make refrigerants, aerosol propellants, fire retardants and plastics.

Dow officials Wednesday announced long range mining development in north Coahuila, Mexico, and plans for a milling plant in Mexico.

There will be 20 to 30 persons employed at the plant, the spokesman said.

C. M. Shigley, president of a Dow subsidiary, La Dominicia S. A. de C. V., said no time schedule has been decided upon for the milling plant.

Deposits will be strip mined with explosives. Mining area is located in Pico Eterero area.
