Rainfall Here .88-inch for June

Terrell County ranchers have been jubilant over the rainfall of Saturday night and Monday afternoon. While a report has not come from all areas of the county, the rain appears to have been pretty general on one or both occasions, with the area to the west the most favored. The West-Pyle ranch at Longfellow reported one and one-half inches Saturday night and the Alfred Bendele ranch a total of two inches.

In Sanderson the rain gauge totaled .88 for both rainfalls, the only rain gauged for the month of June.

Hot weather with much humidity has prevailed for two weeks. Cool nights are always noted.

Some few large stones of hail fell in the northwestern part of the county Monday but no damage resulted. There were also some small hail stones reported.

A summer norther hit this area early Thursday morning dropping temperatures considerably.

There was a complete overcast Thursday morning and heavy humidity.

Road Tunnel Job In Big Bend Park To Be Let Friday

Bids will be opened Friday, June 27, on a road and tunnel project for the Big Bend National Park which will cost an estimated \$750,000.

The Bureau of Public Roads has called for bids covering the construction of nearly 3.5 miles of major roadway which will terminate at the Rio Grande Village, now under construction.

This road construction will include the furnishing of all labor, materials, and performing the work for the grading, base surfacing, and the construction of a 300-foot tunnel to replace a dangerous curve.

Park Supt. George W. Miller said bids are to be opened at 10 a.m. June 27, in the Bureau of Public Roads office, Denver. The project is to be completed within 300 calendar days from date of award.

Miller said the road construction project, part of the Mission 66 program, will complete the paved highway from Park Headquarters at Panther Junction to the Rio Grande Village site and on to Boquillas Canyon.

Judge W. B. Hunt Seeks Associate Justice Position

Houston, Texas — Judge Wilmer B. Hunt has announced his candidacy for the Position One post of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas to be vacated by St. John Garwood of Houston who is not running for re-election.

He stated that his qualifications included a full knowledge and realization of the responsibilities and duties of the office plus 19 years of general practice of law and 11 years of service on the district court bench.

He asked that voters consider the full impact of the results of the actions of the Texas high court and his qualifications to render just and correct decisions in that body as a basis for consideration for supporting him in the coming election.

Mail Schedule Changes Noted

With the discontinuance of passenger trains number 5 and 6 on the T&NO, many questions are being asked about the mail service for Sanderson.

Mail is still being carried by both passenger trains through Sanderson. Mail is also being brought in by trucks.

The truck from the west arrives from El Paso at 6:30 a.m., and the truck from San Antonio and the east by 7:15.

The first class mail and newspapers from the west-bound train early in the evening are put in the postoffice boxes on the evening of its arrival.

When the window at the postoffice opens at 8:30 a.m., the mail from the east-bound train arriving at night and the mail from both trucks is ready for distribution. Hence, there will be no more out-of-town mail available that day until the mail from the west-bound train is put up.

Many local patrons make several trips for their mail daily and this information is made available to facilitate the local distribution of mail.

Both trucks leave Sanderson with mail for both east and west at 12:55 p.m. Mail must be in the postoffice by 12:30 p.m. to be put on either truck. The mail going west by train must be in the postoffice by 5:45 p.m., and that going east by 6:00 p.m.

MRS. CHARLES MARTIN IN BIG SPRING HOSPITAL
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Austin — First drouth, then floods and now grasshoppers come to plague disaster-weary Texas farmers.

After touring the affected area in the Panhandle, Gov. Price Daniel called it the worst grasshopper infestation in 20 years. Unless checked, he said, the hoppers could destroy much of the crops and pasturage in 26 counties.

County, state and federal agencies worked with landowners to get crews to spray hatching area along roadways. State Agricultural Department, Highway Department, National Guard and Defense and Disaster Relief Office are cooperating in the battle. Aim is to try to kill the insects before they leave the hatching grounds and start eating their way into crops for which farmers had high hopes this year.

Another threat is fund shortage. At a cost of some \$3,000 a day for spraying crews, Texas Agriculture Department's emergency funds dwindled fast.

Gov. Daniel expressed hope that some federal assistance may be obtained.

Cox Appeal Denied
Ex-Rep. James E. Cox of Conroe has lost another round in his fight against a two-year prison sentence.

Court of Criminal Appeals, by a 2-1 decision, upheld the trial court conviction on charges of consenting to accept a bribe. Cox's attorneys have one more recourse left — filing a motion for a re-hearing. Since the appeals court recessed June 28, this could not be considered until it reconvenes next October.

Cox's troubles rocked the state last Spring, during the 1957 legislative session. They began when Howard Harmon of San Antonio, one-time head of the Texas Naturopaths, made public a tape recording of a hotel room conversation with Cox. Harmon and state's attorneys contended that the conversation reflected an effort by Cox to shake down Harmon in return for killing an anti-naturopath bill which Cox had introduced in the legisla-

Judge's Opponent Out

One election contest has already been settled some six weeks before election day.

Texas Supreme Court ruled Dist. Judge Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls not eligible to run for the Court of Criminal Appeals against Judge K. K. Woodley. Reason: Judge Purcell has had only nine years experience as a lawyer and judge.

An 1891 amendment to the Constitution requires that the Criminal Appeals Court Judges have the same qualifications as Supreme Court judges. At that time the requirement for the high court was seven years experience. In 1945 the Constitution was amended to require 10 years experience for Supreme Court judges.

Despite the time lapse, the effect of the two amendments is to require 10 years experience for Criminal Appeals judges, according to the ruling in the Woodley-Purcell case.

Result is that Woodley will be unopposed in the primary and win automatic renomination for another six-year term.

Line-Jumping Threat
Another Supreme Court ruling on an election dispute poses an election-day dilemma for Dallas voters.

It held that Grover Cantrell, Dallas labor official and self-styled "Stevenson Republican," is entitled to oppose Cong. Bruce Alger on the GOP primary ticket.

Cantrell's candidacy is interpreted as a move to inconvenience Dallas conservative voters. Election results for 1956 indicate a good percentage of the Dallas voters threw their weight behind conservative Democrats at precinct conventions and primaries, but supported Republican nominees for national offices in the general election. Presumably, unless conservatives are

on hand to vote, Cantrell's friends might scratch GOP-favorite Alger in his own primary.

But it's a two-edged sword that applies equally to Dallas liberals. If they go to the Republican primary to help Cantrell, they can't vote for liberal Democratic contenders for state office nor fight conservatives for Democratic precinct control.

Like A Jury

Defending the State Board of Health's closed door meetings, Comm. Henry A. Holle said, "The board is like a jury. You get the verdict, but you can't get in on their comments."

State Health Board has authority to allocate federal funds under the Hill-Burton Act to match local funds for hospital building. Its policy has been to announce names of hospitals approved to receive funds, but not those rejected or why.

Newsman had been openly critical of the Board for barring the press from its meetings. Holle said minutes of the Board meetings were available to the public after formal approval at the next meeting — three months later.

More Money for Land

Texas Veterans Land Board has made its third \$12,500,000 sale of bonds to finance land purchases by veterans.

This brings to \$37,500,000 the bonds sold since last December. Land Office spokesmen say it gives the program enough money to carry it until August 1959. A total of \$200,000,000 in bond issues was authorized by voters in a recent constitutional amendment.

For a time the program was at a standstill because the Board was unable to find bond buyers who would accept the 3 per cent or less in interest which the state is allowed under the constitution to pay.

Try, Try Again

Texas Supreme Court is again being asked to referee the battle of appointments that has brought the state insurance liquidation to "utter chaos."

Latest deadlock developed as Insurance Commissioner William A. Harrison fired Liquidator J. M. Williamson (in office only 10 weeks) and replaced him with C. M. Landeau, formerly first deputy But Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts, one of three Austin

judges handling insurance receivership cases, refused to accept him as receiver for the cases in his court. He named another attorney. Other two judges accepted Landeau.

On behalf of the Insurance Department, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has petitioned the Supreme Court for permission to file a writ of mandamus voiding Bett's action. His petition charges that Betts usurped powers assigned the Insurance Department. It says the "divided responsibility" of two receivers in one office creates "utter chaos."

In a previous effort to get a ruling that would unshar authority over liquidation, the high court held the judge could appoint a receiver if the Insurance Department failed to do so.

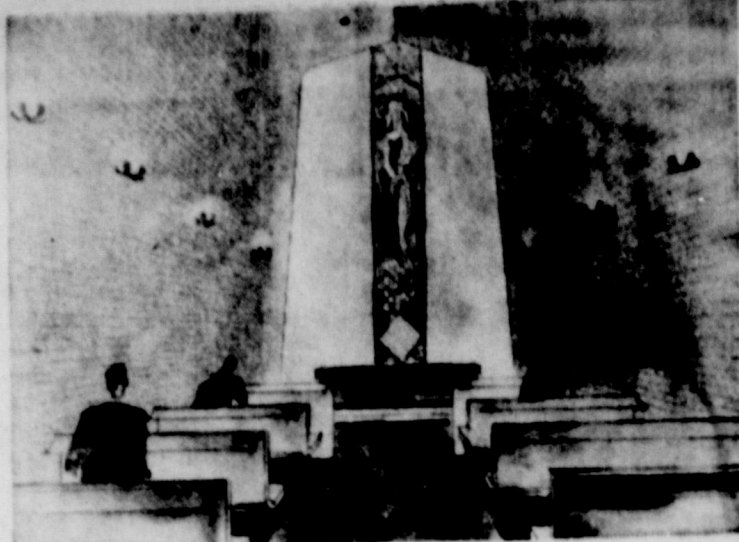

Chapel to be Built Atop Dallas Skyscraper

A sanctuary high above the city for individual prayer and meditation will be included in the public service facilities of the new Southland Center main tower, now under construction in Dallas. "The Chapel in the Sky," as it will be called, will be approximately 500 feet above the ground on the 39th floor of the 42-story skyscraper, tallest building west of the Mississippi River. "To the best of our information, this place of worship is the highest-located within a building in America," said Ben H. Carpenter, executive vice president of Southland Life Insurance Company. The company owns Southland Center which also includes the new 28-story Sheraton-Dallas luxury hotel. Dan C. Williams, Southland Life's president and well known Southwestern religious leader, conceived the idea for a place of prayer in the building plans. "The Chapel will, of course, be entirely non-denominational and available for anyone seeking a moment of peace in a busy day," said Mr. Williams. The Chapel will have stained leaded glass windows and a vaulted, timbered ceiling, large enough to accommodate 35 persons and complete with altar. It is planned for use principally by individuals rather than groups or meetings. It can be reached either by express elevator from the ground floor level or by escalator from the 41st floor which is the public observation area. Southland Center will begin operations in early 1959.

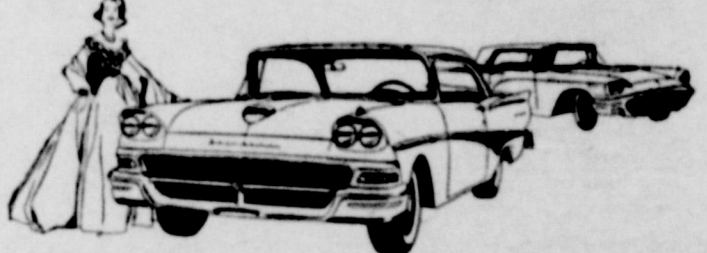

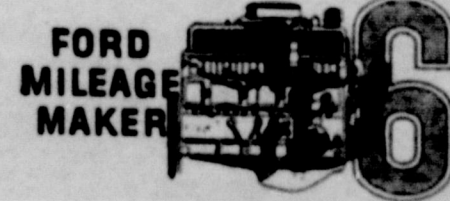
