The Texas Highway Department maintenance crew here has been busy since the first of the week applying a seal coat to U.S. 90 through Sanderson.

WATER DISTRICT **VOTE AUGUST 1** FOR APPROVAL

The board of directors for the proposed water district met on Monday night to discuss possibilities of the water district to be presented to the voters of the district on August 1.

As has been pointed out many times, the voting August 1 will be only for the confirmation of the proposed water district with no other involvements of any kind.

All qualified voters within the proposed district may vote on the proposition Friday, August 1. The bounds of the proposed district include all residents of Sanderson, and take in no houses other than those considered to be within the town. The actual geographic boundries of the proposed district follow certain lines that are not necessarily section lines and may be described more generally to include all of the townsite.

The board of governors for the proposed district went on record Monday night at their meeting as wholeheartedly backing the proposal and seeking the support of the voters in the coming election.

Officials of the T&NO Railroad have been contacted to work out. if possible, a lease or purchase deal on the water works of that company. The San Antonio officials are in favor of the lease to the local water district, but no word has been yet received from the Houston officials. Local directors are in hopes of some report on this matter prior to the time for voting on the confirmation of the district.

If terms coculd be worked out with the railroad company, there are nine wells involved which produce an amount of water approximately equal to the production of 16 wells now in operation by Community Public Service Co. for local users' consumption. A large storage supply is also evailable if an agreement can be reached.

Tentative Plans for District The board outlined the follow ing plans for operation of the water district pending its ap proval by the voters, and subject to the approval of the voters:

The water district would, if the voters approve, hire an engineering firm to make a study of the water utility of the CPS concerning all phases of opera-

The findings of the report are

absolutely necessary before the State Board of Water Engineers would be legally authorized to approve the operation of the district, according to the directors. The feasibility of the district to operate that utility at any cost and under any circumstances would have to be approved by the state board before the district was allowed to take any further steps, the board stated. The approval of these findings

and a foreseeable method of payment for the bonds would also be derived from the information contained within the engineers report and approved before a bonding company would buy the bonds to finance such a purchase. Pending the approval of the

purchase by these two agencies the water district then proposes to enter into agreement with the present owner of the water utility for the purchase of the utility, they said. The board of directors for the

district would then be in position to administrate the operation of the local water utility.

Community Public Service Co. has set a price of \$166,000.00 for their complete utility here. according to the directors. The company estimates they have an inventory of approximately \$2,-Continued to Page 2

SCHOOL TAX VOTE SET FOR JULY 29

Qualified tax paying resident voters will be eligible to vote on Tuesday, July 29, for approval or disapproval of the maintenance tax rate for the Terrell County Independent School District.

The board of the school district is asking voters to approve a \$1.50 per \$100.00 assessed valuation as the tax rafe to apply for maintenance of the independent school district.

The \$1.50 tax will be plus a bond retirement tax now in effect of 33c per \$100 assessed valuation or a total of \$1.83 per \$100 valuation.

The board is asking the approval of the tax rate by the voters in order to have a small additional amount of money for operation of the local district in the coming year.

Voters will vote in their own precincts from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

400 in extra pipe, well supplies fittings, a vehicle, and other items of normal operation, which will be sold at actual inventory

CPS officials also have agreed to permit Jimmy Caroline, local manager, to manage the utility under the district government priding action of the directors.

CPS has agreed, according to the directors, to sell electricity for pumping at a flat rate to all pumps combined, rather than metering each pump, as is now

CPS has presented a financial statement to the directors showing net profit of the past 5 years slong with cost of operation. The report shows that approximately \$17,000 was the lowest net income during the 5-year period and that approximately \$23,000 was the highest net income. The figures included all cost, administrative, operational, maintenance, depreciation, and taxes, in computing the net gain, the directors stated.
