NFIP TO ENTER RESEARCH FIELD
New York - An expanded program that will permit a scientific assault on major health problems of the nation was announced this week by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.
Basil O'Connor, president of the organization outlined its broad program of future attack on disease and disability at a press conference in New York.
"This is our concept for the future: The development of an organized voluntary force in the fields of medical research, patient care and professional education, flexible enough to meet new health problems as they arise, with specific goals initially," Mr. O'Connor said.
The heart of the new program is research. Research will not be confined to a single disease but will attack, initially, at least five areas.
Mr. O'Connor said that the National Foundation as it now will be known would (1) carry on its winning fight against polio, (2) continue its history-making virus research program, and (3) investigation of disorders of the central nervous system, and to these activities would add research and, in the near future, a patient aid program in (4) arthritis and

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.
Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
"Vacancies in the office of Judge of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

State Capital NEWS

in 1876 a wagon with a team of oxen was good transportation in Texas. But on today's city streets and super-highways, the ox wagon would be just a traffic bottleneck.

Some Texans now are saying that the 82-year-old ox wagon constitution is a bottle-neck on the road to development of dynamic 20th Century government. Constitutional revision is not one of the currently sizzling campaign issues. But, quietly and stealthily, numerous people in government, in the bar, in professional and civic groups, the schools and in private and public educational institutions are plugging away in a make-haste-slow-campaign. Principal objective is to get Texans to thinking about what they want and need in a state constitution today.

Their campaign gained official blessing last year when the legislature passed a resolution directing the Legislative Council to do research on the subject and report back in 1959. An 18-member citizens advisory committee was appointed to counsel the legislative study group.

Robert G. Storey of the Law School is chairman; W. Mills of Mission and Mrs. W. Smith of Austin, vice-presidents; and Dan Moody, Jr., Austin, secretary.

Next meeting of the advisory committee is to be held in September. Right now, one member admits that progress toward revision is itself moving at an ox pace. Reason is that those concerned feel strongly that any change should be preceded by an exhaustive professional research. This takes money.

The legislative Council, with a staff of seven, and 11 studies underway, can't go all-out on this thing, but is doing some fact-finding during the summer. A Council and committee are to get money for the work, perhaps by next year, from the legislature and or some private foundation.

Advocates of Constitutional revision advance these points,

among others, as reasons for concern:

1. It's a staggering document, with 133 amendments. If nine more proposed amendments are approved by the voters next November, it'll be 54,000 words. Much of it is regarded by lawyers as properly belonging in the statutes rather than in a basic document like the Constitution. Much is cited as totally useless such as provisions for repelling Indian raids.

2. Like Topsy, Texas' huge conglomeration of agencies, departments, commissions and divisions, "just grew". It's all so loosely put together, say critics, that folks don't know who to blame when things don't suit them. Same indictment is applied to the fiscal set-up. It's a billion-dollar-a-year business, but control is mincemeated among many. State has more than 100 special funds, representing about 85 per cent of state revenue. These can't be touched by the Legislature, even if they are not needed for the purpose for which they are earmarked and are desperately needed elsewhere.

3. Another argument made is that increasing concentration of government in Washington can be halted only if state governments are sufficiently vigorous and adaptable to meet people's changing and growing needs. Some suggest that Texas' present Constitution may be a "strait jacket" on state government.

High Cost of Driving
Texas drivers will have to "pay the piper" next year in higher auto insurance.

State Insurance Board has announced that, effective August 1 auto insurance rates will be substantially higher in most parts of Texas. Average hike will be 32 per cent on comprehensive

coverage, 19 per cent on liability, and 17 per cent on collision. In Dallas County, for example a policy now costing \$108 will jump to \$142.

Premiums paid on the old rate schedule have not nearly met accident claims, said Penn Jackson, chairman of the insurance board. He attributed the insurance companies' "tremendous losses" to four factors:

1. An increasing number of collisions.
 2. Higher cost of repairing today's swanky cars.
 3. Higher cost of hospital and medical care.
 4. Generosity of juries in awarding damages to claimants.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter or charter amendment, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 11 of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby.

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any general, special or primary election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled.

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

School Fund Fight

A rough-and-tumble time can be expected next year when lawmakers consider just how permanent the permanent school fund should be.

Rep. Louis Dugas of Orange has announced he will introduce a bill which would allow the state to use part of the revenue from school lands for current expenses instead of putting it all into the permanent fund.

Dugas was author of a bill last session to divert 1 per cent of the permanent school fund each year to the available fund. State School Board and numerous other school officials have come out strongly against all moves to tap the schools' multi-million-dollar endowment. They compare it to "eating the seed corn".

Report on 'Rainy Days'

Texas Employment Commission's report for the first half of this year showed that 185,000 Texans received jobless benefits. Payments totaled \$38,164,378 for this period.

Average claimant was eligible for 19.8 weeks of assistance, but drew for only 12.7 weeks. "This proves that unemployment compensation serves as a 'rainy day' tideover between jobs," commented TEC Chairman Maurice Acers, "and not as a prolonged dole".

Unemployment picture was still "rainy" in TEC's latest report. Total of 74,734 persons, over twice as many as a year ago, were receiving benefits.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #3-Number Nine on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same be hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:

"Section 5. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (\$0.75) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers whose property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (\$0.75) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

Such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters. The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district heretofore authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation, and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Act shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

"(e) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibility, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinafter provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(f) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and the Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (\$0.75) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of the state.

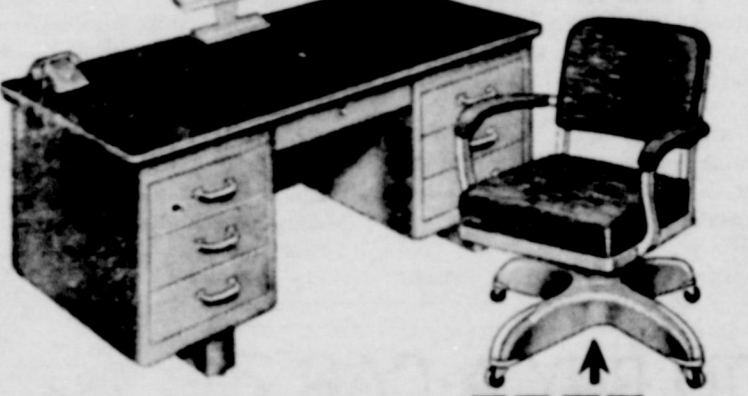
