Collins Coates, 72, Dies Wednesday In Fort Stockton

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Ozona today (Thursday) for Powell Collins Coates, 72, who died Wednesday afternoon in a Fort Stockton hospital.

Mr. Coates, a prominent West Texas ranchman all his life and a ranchman in Pecos and Terrell Counties for 28 years, had been in ill health for several months and had been in the hospital for about a month.

Mr. Coates was a 32nd Degree Mason and had Masonic graveside services.

Mr. Coates was born in Callahan County January 27, 1886, son the late Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Coates. The Coates family came to Texas from Mississippi before the Civil War and settled in Coryell County near Gatesville where they engaged in ranching.

Collins Coates ranched with his father until 1915 when he established a ranching interest of

The ranch he settled on near Ozona contained 7,000 acres and has a well on it that was discovered before the Civil War. The well was the only water in that section for many years.

The original ranch house and an old stage coach station still remain on the ranch, recalling Indian raids, Mexican bandits, and other phases of frontier life. Coates raised sheep, cattle and a few saddle horses.

He later bought the B. T. Corder ranch in Terrell and Pecos Counties containing 191/2 sections with three wells on the headquarters ranch. The ranch is 55 miles southeast of Fort Stockton and 46 miles northeast of

Mr. and Mrs. Coates celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in March of this year with a reception given by their children. Mrs. Coates was the formters, Miss Dollye Coates of Ozona Crockett County.

Mr. Coates was a member of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. and served as county commissioner for Crockett County for many years.

Some opponents have expressed fear of possible tax increase to retire indebtedness, due to increases in cost of operation as a

municipally-owned utility. Proponents of the proposal are of the opinion that each and every one of these possibilities do exist. They are of the opinion. however, that the people will offer an opportunity to find out if the purchase is possible and feasible, and express faith in the duly elected directors to work for the best interest of the people of the district, if any when the time comes to act in a buying and managerial capacity.

The proponents also feel that purchase and management is possible at no additional cost to anyone, pending a continuation of the business under the same circumstances, at the same rates, and in the same manner as the present owners operate.

The present directors, Greene Cooke, Ed Kerr, Jimmy Caroline. M. W. Duncan, and Don Anderson, state that there are no plans at the present for any change of policy of the present operators if the voters should approve the district. They also stated that no plans were pending for any exploration work.



DWI Case Here Draws Fine, Jail

Ramon Cardenas received \$50 fine, three days in jail and 6 months' suspension of his driv er's license after pleading guilt to driving while intoxicated in County Judge R. S. Wilkinson's court here Tuesday morning.

The sentence and fine grew out of a near-serious accident on Monday afternoon when the dump truck, driven by Cardenas, jumped the curb at the corner of Oak and Persimmon and broke off a high-voltage electric power pole. A woman standing nearby was slightly injured when she ran and fell in her efforts to get out of the way of the oncoming vehicle.

The pole was splintered by the impact of the truck and it was broken completely in two about two feet from the ground. Wires strung on the pole kept the pole

Neither Cardenas nor an occupant of the truck were injured. Emergency crewmen from the Community Public Service Co. were called to remove the hazard of the hot wires breaking and falling from the weight of the broken pole and a new pole was

installed to contain the wires. Power was off only a short time as a result of the accident and work of the linemen.

BOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.

Deprepaing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

BK IT RESOLUTION NO.

TEXAS:
Section 1. Section 20 of Article 5
of the Constitution of the State of
Texas is hereby amended so as boreafter to read as follows:
"Section 28. Vacancies In Offices Of
Judges Of Superior Courts To Be Filled

By The Governor.


