It doesn't make sense to willfully fail to stop, to speed, to pass on the highway, to pass illegally or other violations known to be full well that it may cost you more in traffic fines than you can make from local drivers on similar charges of offenses.

The willful disregard for this type of offense is the same as willful disregard for other and more serious offenses. We should be teaching our children, even if we can't learn, that traffic laws are to be respected at all times the same as laws against murder, or assault, etc.

## Two Outposts For Richardson-Bass Are Planned Soon

Two outposts of the Richardson & Bass No. 1 Goode Estate wildcat and gas producer in the Ellenburger formation, have been staked and will begin operations within the next few days, according to reliable but unofficial information.

Continental Oil Co. will drill a test to the Ellenburger on Section 227 on the Brown Estate. Location will be approximately 1/2 mile from the Richardson & Bass location. The rig will be skidded from the Hunt Oil Co. test known as Bustin Canon No. 1.

Rig will be moved from Magnolia Petroleum Co.-Western Natural Gas Co. No. 2 Brown-Basset No. 2 for a Magnolia-Western Natural test to the Ellenburger on the Goode Estate.

The well, to be known as Continental Brown-Basset No. 1 will be 1980 feet from the north and east lines of section 227 in Block Y.

Magnolia-Western Natural No. 2 Brown-Basset has completed drilling operation and installed tubing and will test gas production from the Ellenburger sometime this week.

Operation will be designated Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co. No. 1 Goode-Basset. It will be 1980 feet from the north and west lines of section 228, Block Y and about 1/2-mile from the Richardson & Bass No. 1 Goode.

No official information has been given on the potential of this well, but rumors are that the Ellenburger production will be as good or better than on B-B No. 1.

Leasing interest has been high in that section of the county. Few leases are available at this time according to reports, and premium prices are being paid for available land.

One lease reported recently was 1,607 acres from Bustin Canon at a reported figure of \$150.00 per acre on a five year lease with a \$100 per acre rental. This is the highest price known to be paid for leases in this area.

A lease soon after the first of the year on the Turk ranch in that area was made at a reported price of \$37.50 per acre, a top price for leases in this area at that time.

Indications are strong that renewed and greater operations will be seen within the next few months since many leases of the eastern part of the county expire within the next 18 months to two years.

Exploration work by seismograph crews and thumper crews has continued strong in that area and in the east-central portion of the county.

## Pick-Up Drivers Warned by Officers

State Highway Patrolmen who come to Sanderson have issued a warning to local pick-up owners to be sure they possess a commercial operator's license if they continue to operate the pick-up. They stated that many people thought a commercial operator's license was not necessary if the owner operated the vehicle for transportation or use other than as a commercial or business vehicle, or strictly in compliance with farm plate restrictions.

The patrolmen stated that this was not the case and the use of the vehicle did not govern the type of operator's license necessary, but rather the type of vehicle governed the type of license necessary for compliance with the law.

## Two Teachers Hired For Local Faculty

Supt. Matt Bader announced this week that two vacancies had been filled on the local faculty.

A high school principal and an instructor replacing Gordon Harmon, who resigned last week, had been contacted.

Andrew J. Riess has been hired as high school principal, replacing Thurman White. Mr. Riess has had three years experience as a high school principal and three years experience as a superintendent at Oglesby. He has a M. ## Auto Insurance Rates Go Up August 1

Auto insurance rates went up in Texas on August 1.

Heavy losses were reported by insurance companies as reason for need to increase rates.

The State Board of Insurance heard testimony two weeks ago from its own staff point to an increase of 143 per cent in liability insurance, 22 per cent for comprehensive coverage, 143 per cent for bodily injury and property damage and 123 per cent for collision coverage. These would be statewide average increases, said Angus McDonald, chief actuary for the state board which sets the rates.

Darby Hammond, executive secretary of Southwestern Insurance Service, which represents firms handling auto insurance business in Texas, said claim costs were up because:

1. Accidents were more frequent and more severe.

2. Hospital and medical costs continue to rise.

3. Property and car repair costs have risen.

4. More personal injury suits are being filed and for larger amounts.

5. A public "sock the insurance company" attitude exists with juries who don't realize they are increasing their own insurance.

Fancy fenders, big tinted wrap-around windshields and fluffed up tail fin light assemblies are in large measure why rates are going up. It costs to have these things repaired.

In addition a big rate jump is coming up for unmarried male drivers under 25 years of age. Insurance people say this driver is "not paying his way" in damage claims.

## Proposed Changes In Constitution Told In Brief Form

Last week The Times started the first of four publications of the full text of the proposed Constitutional amendments which will be voted on at the November 4 general election.

The purpose for the state's publishing the amendment proposals is so that every citizen has an opportunity to acquaint himself with the propositions.

A brief digest of the nine different proposed amendments follow.

Number 1 on the ballot provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

Number 2 on the ballot authorizes each county to establish after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

Number 3 on the ballot provides that vacancies in the office of county judge and justices of the peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next general election.

Number 4 on the ballot provides that any district, county, or precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one year of the term for which he was elected.

Number 5 on the ballot provides a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

Number 6 on the ballot provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

Number 7 on the ballot authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

Number 8 on the ballot gives the legislature power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purposes of paying such assistance.

Number 9 on the ballot authorizes the legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas, and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita Falls, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.

## Water Vote Carries 2-1

Voters of the proposed water district including the town of Sanderson confirmed the formation of the district by the Commissioner's Court by a vote of 2 to 1 last Friday.

The vote was 96 for and 47 against.

Directors of the water district will set the date soon for the exclusion hearing at which time all residents within the district who desire to be excluded from the district will be given an opportunity to be heard and their cases considered.

Plans are also under way by the directors to hire a group of engineers to make their appraisal survey to establish worth of the local water utility.

## Rev. B. N. Briggs Dies In Del Rio

Funeral services were held in Del Rio Sunday afternoon for Rev. Beverly N. Briggs of that city. The 91-year-old retired Baptist minister died at his home Saturday morning.

Born in Bexar County, Reverend Briggs came to Del Rio in 1906. He served as pastor of Baptist churches at Lytle, Somerset, Gates Valley and Utopia. For many years he was a missionary to churches at Comstock, Langtry and Sanderson.

His wife, Mrs. Molly Avant Briggs, died twelve years ago. Survivors include four daughters, two sons, 19 grandchildren and 33 great-grandchildren.

## Derailment Monday At High Bridge

## Postal Rate Raise Effective Now

Last Thursday night the 3c letter went the way of the 2c postcard when new postal rates went into effect in postoffices of the nation. Since that time, the new postage stamp valuations have had to be affixed to all mail.

Although changes in postal rates are taking place in nearly all classes of mail, it is the new rates for letters and cards which affects most postal patrons. The new rates are:

First class mail — letters sent to Sanderson boxes, 3c.

Out-of-town, 4c.

To Mexico and Canada, 4c.

Post cards locally or out-of-town, 3c.

Air mail rates — new letter rate, 7c.

Air mail post cards, 5c.

Odd shapes and sizes of third-class mail will carry a minimum rate of 6c. This includes rolls of film.

Unsealed Christmas cards out-of-town or local, will carry 3c postage and sealed Christmas cards will have the new first-class rate of 4c.

This is the first major change in postal rates since 1932 when first class letter rate went from 2c to 3c.
